- _____ 1. Enrolled in 4-H and enrolled in project areas by 11:59 p.m. May 31 at <https://4honline.com/#/user/sign-in>.
- _____ 2. Enrolled ALL horses I might show in 4-H Online by 11:59 p.m. June 1 at <https://4honline.com/#/user/sign-in>. Along with pictures of the horses. *A recent photo of your horse is required for identification. A ¾ angle from the front left or right is preferred, which clearly shows any face and/or leg markings is preferred. If the horse has a brand, the brand should be visible in the photo, or a second photo should be added. Additional photos to more clearly show markings and characteristics may be added, but are not required.*
- _____ 3. Completed the lease form with ALL signatures for any horses I don't own but might show and uploaded the form by 11:59 p.m. June 1 at <https://4honline.com/#/user/sign-in>.
- _____ 4. Completed an approved Youth Horse Literacy event (Horse Safety) before 11:59 p.m. June 1.
- _____ 5. Entered all events that I will be participating in at County Horse Show in FairEntry- <https://faireentry.com> – by **June 16th at 11:59 p.m.** *To participate in the State 4 H Horse Show, youth must first compete in a county level 4-H horse show. They must enter the same classes at the county level that they plan to enter at the state level. No minimum ribbon placing is required, but participation in each class entered is mandatory. If a youth cannot attend their own county horse show, they may compete in another county's show to meet this requirement.*
- _____ 6. Contacted my veterinarian and obtained a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) or health paper within 30 days of horse show and then did the process again within 30 days of State Horse Show if I intend to show there too.
- _____ 7. Brought my horse to county horse show with the CVI to the county horse show at check in.

- _____ 8. Entered all events in Fair Entry- <https://faireentry.com> – by **July 1st at 11:59 p.m.** to show at State Horse Show, **no late entries will be accepted.**

- _____ 10. Contacted my veterinarian and obtained a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) or health paper within 30 days of State Horse Show.

Dress Code:

-Dress code at practice to be able to participate with your horse is boots, long jeans, hair tied back, and appropriate t-shirt. No youth will enter the arena without boots on or long jeans.





-Dress code at the horse show is a cowboy hat, long sleeve white shirt with collar, boots, belt, and western style denim long jeans. If youth do not have appropriate clothes on, they will be disqualified from all classes.

Adults in the Arena/Insurance

All youth participating in the horse project, an extra insurance is paid to cover accidents and injuries, however, no parents that are not Certified 4-H Volunteers are covered under the 4-H Insurance. If you enter the arena to help your child, remember you are entering the arena at your own risk of not being covered under 4-H or county insurance. All parents must stay during practice to watch or help their child in need.

Practice Schedule

Practice will be held every Monday and Thursday from 7:00 PM to 9:00 PM. With a large number of youths in the horse program this year, we will have scheduled practices with designated times for each event. Having our coaches and committee members giving their volunteer time, we ask that horses and youth are practice ready at 7:00 with being saddled, warmed up, or haltered ready for practice to begin. Our coaches are very educated and knowledgeable in Western Events, so during practice time youth will focus on excelling their skills of becoming a better horseman. English, barrels, and poles may be practiced during designated days but not during the practice time of 7:00-9:00. After 9:00, practice ends, the arena will be open, but no committee members or coaches will be assisting.

Classes

All youth competing at Hamlin County 4-H Horse Show are required to show in either Western or English Showmanship to participate in any other events.

Beginners (age 8 to 10) may participate in Junior events if classes are not offered for Beginners such as: reinsmanship, single draft hitch, team hitch driving, barrel racing, pole bending, open end figure 8, draft showmanship, equitation over fences, reining, and ranch riding. **New in 2026 at the county level, is the event of flag race, but not part of the all-around awards. All divisions will be together and pay \$2 at the gate and pay back first three best scores.**

State Horse Show

State Horse Show occurs in Huron on July 13th through 15th. Registration is due July 1 at 11:59 p.m. CDT Fair Entry. Stalls MUST be purchased online at:

Awards

The Hamlin County 4-H Horse Committee sponsors awards for champions in all three ages groups for Western Showmanship, English showmanship, and all around who must be enrolled in Hamlin County 4-H and participate in Hamlin County Horse Show. 4-Her's participate in another county show or not Hamlin County 4-H enrolled are not eligible for these awards. Awards will be recognized and handed out at Recognition Event in November.

Diseases

Horses are susceptible to getting illnesses or diseases that can be minor or severe and being around other horses, being aware of symptoms of the main horse diseases is very important. Below is a list of the main horse diseases to be cautious of, but not all diseases/illnesses are listed.

- Equine Herpesvirus
 - o Herpesvirus primarily causes upper respiratory disease and abortions/stillbirth that are very contagious. The disease spreads by horse to horse contact.
 - o Symptoms in horses can vary depending on the strain and form of the infection, but common signs include fever, nasal discharge, coughing, lethargy, and neurological issues. (University of Minnesota Extension, 2023)
- Equine Influenza





- Equine Influenza is a highly contagious respiratory disease. The virus spreads easily through contact with infected horses and contact with infected clothing, equipment, brushes, and tack.
- Symptoms of fever, harsh cough, nasal discharge, lethargy, and loss of appetite.
- Coughing horses can spread the virus as far as 150 feet, quickly infecting the entire barn. Infected horses can shed the virus up to 14 days post-infection.
- Vaccines to protect horses against horse flu are available at your vet. (Young, 2019).
- Rabies
 - Rabies in horses is a fatal, viral disease of the nervous system, typically transmitted through the bite of an infected animal.
 - The signs of Rabies in horses are:
 - Lameness, colic, painful urination, neurological abnormalities, fever, loss of appetite, blindness, difficulty swallowing, muscle twitching
 - There is no cure for rabies, but a prevention is for all horses to be vaccinated annually for rabies.
 - Rabies is zoonotic which can be transferred to humans from horses. (Equine Disease Communication Center, n.d.)
- Strangles
 - Strangles in horses is a highly contagious bacterial infection that inflames the lymph nodes.
 - It is not spread through the air; the bacteria can spread when a horse coughs or snorts. It can easily spread directly through horse-to-horse contact and indirectly, for example through contaminated equipment, handler clothing and boots.
 - Strangles bacteria can survive for up to six weeks in water which is why it is important to take your own water source when away from the yard such as a bucket.
 - Symptoms: High temperature, looks depressed, loss of appetite and/or not drinking, difficulty swallowing, lowered head and neck, cough, thick and discolored nasal discharge, swelling of the glands under the jaw (lymph nodes), abscesses can burst with highly infectious, thick, creamy-yellow pus.
 - It normally takes 3-21 days after the horse has been in contact with strangles bacteria for signs to develop. (The British Horse Society, 2025)
- Tetanus
 - Tetanus is a potentially fatal disease characterized by muscular spasms caused by a neurotoxin produced by the bacterium *Clostridium tetani*. These organisms, and their spores, are found in the intestinal tract of horses and are abundant in the soil, where they can survive for many years.
 - Treated with antibiotics, usually penicillin, injection of tetanus antitoxin. Horses are kept in the dark, quiet stalls with deep bedding.
- West Nile Virus
 - West Nile in horses is a serious, mosquito-borne disease that can cause inflammation of the brain, leading to neurological signs and potential death.
 - Signs of West Nile can include fever, incoordination, stumbling, falling, weakness, muscle twitching, seizures, drooping lips, lip smacking, head dropping, grinding teeth, and abnormal sensitivity to touch or sound.





- Prevention from the disease includes a West Nile Vaccine as an annual core vaccine to protect horses from infection. (Young, UC Davis Veterinary Medicine Center for Equine Health , 2020)

Disease Precautions

Precautions of not letting your horse get sick is on you as the rider. Some precautions to take not only at 4-H horse practice but when you are around other horses are the following.

- Vaccinate your horses.
- When not riding your horse, tie your horse to your own trailer and not to the arena fence, gate, or other's trailers.
- Do not share buckets and feeders with other horse owners. If you are able and have more than one horse, keep the same bucket and feeder with the same horse incase one of your horses gets sick.
- Do not share bridles with other horse owners along with try not to share bridles and bits with different horses even if you own them.
- Do not let your horse touch the fence, gate, barrel, or poles with their nose.
- Do not let your horse touch another horses nose.
- If your horse is showing signs of illness, do not bring the horse to practice. Call your vet for help.
