Then in 1971 I was blessed to come to Ohio, USA on a student visa with 8 dollars and 25 cents in my pocket. Got a Bachelor's degree in Sacred Literature, another master's degree in Community Counseling, and in my old age got a doctoral degree in Biblical Studies. Worked at the largest Juvenile Court in State of Ohio as a Probation Officer, Probation Counselor and Probation Manager for 30+ years. In 2010 retired from Juvenile

Dr. M. G. Sarngadharan

I started my college education at U C C in 1954. After the Intermediate, I moved on to Madras Christian College for my B. Sc. and to Delhi University for M. Sc. and Ph. D. degrees in Chemistry. After teaching at Delhi University for about three years I came to the

United States in January 1967, to pursue a career in science. I started as a Postdoctoral fellow at Albany Medical College, Albany, New York, and continued in the same program (with the same Professor) at St. Louis University School of Medicine for a total of five years.



In September 1971 I joined National Institutes of Health program at Bionetics Research Laboratories to search for an as yet unknown class of viruses called Human Retroviruses, and to delineate, if found, what relation they might have on human leukemia, or other malignancies or infectious diseases. I was fortunate to be able to make significant, major contributions in this effort, leading to the discovery of the human retroviruses that include the human leukemia viruses (HTLV-1 and HTLV-2) and the AIDS virus (HIV), and in the development of the first (and still used) blood test to identify HIV-infection.

Has been actively involved with UCCAANA for many years. Was instrumental in establishing Vidwan P. G. Nair Endowment and Memorial Research Centre at the Malayalam Dept. at UCC.


Recognizing the urgent need for combatting viral diseases in India, particularly Kerala, the government of Kerala took steps in setting up an institute for research on viruses and viral outbreaks. In this effort I joined a group of experts to advise the Chief Minister for founding the Kerala Institute of Advanced Virology at Thonnakkal, a suburb of Trivandrum.

Thomas Varughese

I had my entire college education at UCC - Preuniversity and B.Sc Physics (1958 to 1962); M.Sc Physics (1963 to 1965). After studies worked for two years in India - Mar Thoma College, Thiruvalla ('65 -'66); St. Stephen's College, Uzhavoor ('66 - '67) and S.N. College, Nattika 1967 (June - August).



AMC, My Mentor

My association with Dr. A. M. Chacko started in 1974, the year I joined U. C. College as Junior lecturer in Physics and continued until he and Sodari Kochchmma left Alwaye for Ahmedabad to live with their son Prasad. During this period spanning over forty years I received his love and affection in great abundance. Looking back, the only regret I have is that I took that love for granted. I continued to receive his love in spite of the fact that very often I failed to appreciate and reciprocate it. He knew somehow that this behavior was not intentional and that it was more or less like the negligent attitude of the son towards the father. We had strong differences in opinion on many issues concerning the college and heated arguments in the decision-making bodies. But care was taken - the initiative almost always came from him - that such things did not affect our personal relationship. A few days before leaving for Ahmedabad he came to visit me. He was physically weak, needed a helper to move about, had no conveyance of his own and more over people were coming to visit him to bid farewell. The fact that in spite of all these, he came and spent almost an hour with me did not surprise me at all because this was the way he always dealt with people and relationships. Such care and concern were not only a reflection of the innate goodness of the man but also of the values that he imbibed at U. C. College.

A few days after I was nominated Principal of the college, Chacko Sir gave me a copy of the article 'Role of Principal in Indian Colleges' written by The Rev. Cannon Dr. P. T. Chandy, former Principal of St Johns College, Agra and Vice Chancellor of Gorakhpur University. Principal of an Indian college, according to Dr. Chandy, is expected to be a wonder creature who is a visionary, a great leader, an efficient administrator, a prolific fund raiser and an inspiring teacher. Moreover, he should always be at hand to don any other role as and when required, even that of the college watchman. Dr. Chacko had great admiration for Cannon Chandy and I always felt that he took Cannon Chandy's advice

very seriously. He devoted most of his time - even taking a chunk off the family share-to the affairs of the college. Sodari kochchamma waiting for her husband at the gate of the Principal's quarter even late into the night was not an uncommon sight. One has to take a pledge before becoming a member of the College Fellowship and one of the items in the pledge is that one's primary loyalty is to the Fellowship and hence to the College. When I took the pledge and joined the Fellowship, AMC and people like him were supposed to be our role models. The thought of living up to the exacting standards set by AMC and teachers of his generation frightened new entrants to the Fellowship like me. I once asked Prof. C.T. Benjamin in the presence of AMC, "Is not my primary loyalty to the family?". Then and there I knew that such heretical thoughts had never ever crossed their minds. Generations of students were the beneficiaries of AMC's exceptional loyalty and dedication to the college.

At the time I joined UCC, a controversy was raging internationally over the Page - three stars of the Sun Tabloid. But there were no controversies over what UCC had at that time, the Page - one stars. Those were the teachers whose names appeared on the first page of the teachers' attendance register. The list included teachers revered in Kerala's academic field like Prof. T.B. Thomas, Dr. V. K. Alexander, Prof. C. T. Benjamin and Prof. Narayana Menon. Of course, Dr. Chacko was one among them. He was then the Professor and Head of the Department of Chemistry. Juniors like I used to keep a respectful distance from them. Observing Dr. Chacko from that distance and later at close quarters we could perceive in his words, gestures and actions a confidence, determination and sense of purpose that came from his strong belief system. He came to the campus as a fifteen-year-old student and had the privilege to learn from the founding fathers and come under the tutelage of Prof. T.B. Thomas. What he learned from them and his experiences on the campus

formed the basis of his belief system. His absolute trust in the divine providence was remarkable. He had his convictions about right and wrong and he always stood to the end by what he considered right. Some people interpreted this as rigidity of stance, but to AMC, knowing what is right and not to do it was nothing but cowardice. A teacher, Confucius said, will not be able to walk with his student till the end of the journey but should be able to show him the road to take. Dr. Chacko knew the road and showed the road to his students. In a society where people increasingly fail to see what is right due to lack of a strong value system or refuse to stand by what is right even when they know it because of fear or servility, Chackos of the world are a rare breed. Dr. Chacko's demise is a great loss to the society not because he would have made valuable contributions if he had lived for a few more years but because we have lost a role model.

I was first elected to the U.C. College Association which is the supreme decision- making body of the College in 1990. AMC was also a member of the body. When his name was proposed to the Board of Directors, he expressed his willingness to step down to give opportunity to younger people. He then proposed my name. I was then the youngest member of the Association. The remarkable thing about his gesture was that it happened at a time when the younger generation had not yet started clamoring for their share of power. The membership of the Governing Board, thanks to AMC, gave me an opportunity to get a grasp on the decision- making process and to work closely with other members who were all well- known persons from different walks of life. This experience stood me in good stead in my later years at UCC.

The proceedings of the meetings of the Association are recorded by two recording secretaries appointed from among the junior members. When my name was proposed to the post, I expressed my reluctance to take it up. There was a reason for this reluctance. The debates and discussions in the meetings were of very high standard with carefully selected words and phrases, fine- tuned arguments and even the strongest of disagreements expressed in the most agreeable manner. In such a scenario I did not consider myself up to the task to be entrusted. Chacko Sir understood my fear. He came and sat my side and volunteered to be the other recording secretary. He would make me write the minutes, read it in the meeting and finalize it before the next agenda item is taken up. At the end of the meeting we would hand over the fair copy of the minutes to the Principal. This we did for the next three years. I was not the only one to have come under his mentorship, I have heard even some of the new generation teachers recounting similar experiences.

On the whole, Dr. Chacko's was a life fully dedicated to the college. It was a blessing to the community and a gift from God for which we should ever be thankful.

Thinking in Rain by Riya Raju Kariath

t was a particularly warm night back in August of 2015. I was up that night playing with my 5-month old baby. I remember receiving that phone call as clear as day. My dad's brother was on the other end, asking me to rush back home as soon as I can. My dad was in critical condition battling for his life. That was only the beginning of the unfolding of God's change in plans for our family.

My daughter and I arrived and were immediately taken to see my dad in the hospital. In the hospital was every one of our family members, my mom, my sister, my dad's siblings. To my utter surprise I did not see anyone of them crying, or losing hope. It was an atmosphere of silent prayer, putting faith in God and hoping for the best. Each one of us was the other's strength. That was a way of life for our family.

Anytime I would talk about having a difficult time or something that I felt I could not fathom was happening to me; my parents would equate that to pouring rain. Being from Kerala, pouring rain is the easiest metaphor a child could understand. Rain would dampen your plans and reduce your visibility to what the future holds. But they never asked me to pray to God to stop the rain. My prayer would be to ask for a stronger umbrella to shield me from the rain or to ask for the ability to dance in the rain so it did not matter. The older I grew I realized this to be the "Attitude of Gratitude".

In the days that passed we learned what my dad had was a Spinal Cord Injury. It was unclear to us even if he survived whether he would speak, walk or have any hand movement. Two agonizing months passed and finally he was out of intensive care. But he was frail, could barely breathe and talk may be five minutes in a day. Knowing the active life, he led as the Principal and later Manager of Union Christina College, Aluva this was not easy. As hard as it sounds we took it day by day, hour by hour, minute by minute.

After a few months at the CMC Vellore Rehabilitation center he regained his ability to talk and his health improved. It also was becoming increasingly clear that he would not be able to walk for a long time. That was heartbreaking, but we never questioned it. Instead the focus was always on how do we make the best of what we had.

In early March, he was back home. We had made peace with what the future held for him, but had he? I understand it was more than a million times harder on him than it was for anyone of us. He seldom talked about it. My mom is his rock and never let a bad thought shade him. It was not the retired life they had planned for, not even in our wildest dreams, but now this was the reality. Nothing could ever have prepared us for this.

A year passed. By then my dad was ready for his first public speaking engagement post his injury. He took the stage, the stage which in the past he would command every week, now in a wheelchair after a year's hiatus. The audience was overflowing in the Hall.

He finally opened up about what was going through his mind while all this was unfolding.

It was a quote from the poem, "The Charge of the Light Brigade" by Alfred, Lord Tennyson:

"

Theirs not to make reply,

Theirs not to reason why,

"


The poem is about the "Light Brigade", a light British cavalry unit, charging against the Russian forces in the Crimean war. The "Light Brigade" men armed with swords was facing a Russian artillery unit in what is called a "Valley of Death", due to a miscommunication. Despite the obvious outcome, they bravely carried out the orders.

Adversities happen in life, almost always it is hard to comprehend why. Our joy and happiness come from not feeling sorry for ourselves but instead choosing to focus on our everyday blessings in spite of the hard times.

It indeed is about learning to dance joyously in the rain, despite the deluge.



Down the memory lane: Rev. T. V. John (John Achan)



He was born around 1888. He completed his M.A. in English and was teaching at Guntur Christian College when he was invited by Mr. K. C. Chacko, one of the founders of UCC, to teach at UCC. He spent the rest of his career there and retired around 1948. Some of

his colleagues were Prof. D. P. Unni, Prof. V. M. Ittyerah, Prof. Aravamudam Iyengar, and Prof. T. B. Thomas. He participated in the Indian independence struggle, as well as in the effort to merge Travancore with India. His wife was Annamma John. In 1934 he visited King's College in London where he conducted the Holy Qurbana in Malayalam.

He is mentioned in the book "Marakkanavathavar" by Shri Nitya Chaithanya Yathi - it was Achan who was instrumental in getting Yathi to become a student at UCC in early 1940s.

Achan died in 1970.
