George
I hope not. <laughter>

All right, George. What's the scariest animal?

George
A rattlesnake.

Grace
Any snake.

Sarah
All right

Grace
Or a worm... or a hose.

George
So you won't be coming into my house.

Sarah

Oh, hi, Roger. Roger, I gotta have you on one of these days. We're doing Spilling Tea with Boomers, which is where I interview older people and hear their wisdom and also some of just their hilarity and today we actually have a unique opportunity to talk to someone from Gen X as well.

So they've already answered questions about their favorite sandwich and what's something they throw away and their scariest animal, which seems to be a consensus that it's a snake.

Sarah

George

Depends on your point of view.

Sarah

Yeah, you're right about that. Jesus does walk on water, but we don't have a whole lot of that in New Mexico. Yeah, he'd have to walk on sand. I think mostly here.

Grace

Sarah

Sarah

George

Oh definitely morning. Morning. No, no doubt about that. I can't get up much beyond nine o'clock.

Grace

Yeah, I'm usually up four or five o'clock in the morning. And I appreciate being up when everybody's quiet.

Sarah

And I can tell y'all I'm definitely a night owl 100%.

George

Well, your texts come in at three o'clock in the morning...

Sarah

I don't text at 3 in the morning. I email. I email because hopefully my hope is that people turn off their email notifications when they sleep.

What is something that people of faith should care more about?

George

The poor? People...people who don't really have anything? Yeah, I guess that's my answer.

Sarah

That's a great answer, George. And there are no wrong answers. Grace?

Grace

Um, community in general is my first thought—you know, making sure that we're taking care of everyone in our community, regardless of who those people are.

Sarah

Yes, wisdom from our elders! Grace thinks this is hilarious because she's not used to being called an elder. But on Tik Tok. I am super old.

Oh, I'm so glad Mr. J that you love this content, even though you're against organized religion. And Brian says widows and orphans is another thing we could care more about. What's something that people of faith should probably care less about?

Sarah

Great answer, Grace?

Grace

Sarah

Grace
Focusing on releasing the past.

Sarah
Focusing on releasing the past. What wisdom we have from these elders who have joined us today! Adele says that to the Gen X, Grace, that they love your hair.

Grace
Oh, thank you.

Sarah
Oh, Brian wants to know if y'all are afraid of death?

George
I would say no. At this point. I think I'm sufficiently at peace with things that Yeah, I'm okay.

Grace
I used to be very terrified of death. But a few years ago, I I got to a place where I felt like I was satisfied with some of the things I've done with my life and felt like, you know, if death came, it would be okay.

Sarah
Hmm. That's pretty cool to hear from y'all. So work buddies would like to know, how would you help people who are afraid of death? And what's next? What would you say to them?

Grace
I would want to know first what exactly their fear is. And I think it would depend on that. You know, like, for me, it was more about not so much what's gonna happen when I die. But for me, it was more about feeling like, there were too many unresolved things in my life, too many things I wanted to do that I hadn't. And so it was that, you know, that aspect for me.

George
