- <u>Listening</u> is the EASIEST form of practicing and must be done every day for best development of aural superpowers
- <u>Experiment with practice times and places.</u> Since nearly everyone is homeschooled at the moment, schedule your practice into your school day.
- I may be setting up a <u>reward system</u> involving points to earn sheet music, audio files, and videos. Stay tuned!

My focus this year is:

## Consistency, Creativity, and Compassion

I've done a lot of soul-searching during the pandemic and I've come to the conclusion that I do have a short list of values I want to impart to my musical protegés.

*Consistency* is how you become better at anything. Repeat your success again and again and it will stick.

*Creativity* is breathing life into otherwise boring memorization. Try something new and be open to different (even silly!) ideas.

**Compassion** must be focused toward our peers *and* ourselves. Music is much more enjoyable when you reach out to make friends, even if they are better or worse players than you are. And speaking of yourself, separate *you the person* from *you the musician*; if you the musician makes a mistake, that error does <u>not</u> reflect on you the person.
