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THE PEORIA MUNICIPAL BAND SUMMER SEASON IN FULL SWING



The Peoria Municipal Band, under the direction of Dr. David Vroman, in their 81st season is now in full swing with concerts Sunday, June 10th at 7:00 p.m. in the Glen Oak Park Amphitheater in Peoria, in the Peoria Warehouse District at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, June 13th and Sunday, June 17th at 7:00 p.m. in the Glen Oak Park Amphitheater in Peoria. The 2018 Peoria Municipal Band Summer Season consists of 24 concert performances by a band of 50 musicians. All concerts are free of

charge and parking is adjacent to the performing venues.

The Sunday, June 10th our concert will take us to the "Sounds of the Stars". Music for the evening will include Star Trek Through the Generations, Star Dust and Star Wars Episode 1 as well several marches and other "starry" selections. In addition, our vocal soloist and the French horn section will be featured during this concert. Come join us as we hope for a clear sky to see the stars, constellations and space.

Wednesday night, June 13, the band will celebrate "Flag Day" at Kelleher's. This concert is at the corner of State and Water streets and parking is plentiful. Bring lawn chairs or sit at the tables provided by Kelleher's. Kathleen Speiden will be featured vocal soloist and the band's principal trombonist, Carl Anderson will be the featured instrumentalist. The band will open this concert with the great patriotic piece, Star Spangled Spectacular by George M. Cohan. Other selections on the concert include: A Colonial Legend, Prairie Dances and Can-Can as well as several marches, pop tunes and Broadway melodies. Carl Anderson, our featured soloist will perform Slide Ride. Let's see how fast that "slide will move"! The band's assistant conductor, Laurel Filzen Etzel will be conducting an American favorite, "Shenandoah" There should be music for everyone to get their toes tapping to start the season off right. Wear your "red, white and blues" to celebrate our flag and country.

The Sunday, June 17th our concert will celebrate "Father's Day". Music for the evening will include Winged Victory, Joy Revisited, Covenant-Fanfare and Celebration as well several other marches and musical selections. In addition, Kathleen Speiden and Carl Anderson will again be featured during this concert. Hopefully the weather will be nice and all the fathers will come out to celebrate their special day.

The Peoria Municipal Band was formed in 1937 through the efforts of Local 26 of the American Federation of Musicians and interested citizens. Prior to 1937 the band was a professional municipal band complete with management and "Soloists of National Reputation". Current band members come from all walks of life; many are currently music teachers in the local schools. They are selected by audition and then commit to a full season of rehearsals and performance. Hundreds of thousands of people have enjoyed their music since 1937. Today, with the support of the city, the band continues the long-standing tradition of excellence in music.

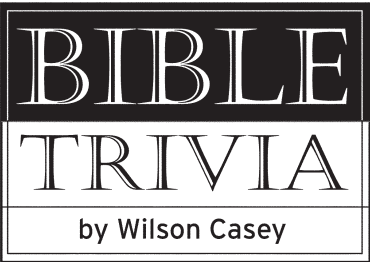

When we met for Sunday morning worship on June 3, we received open Holy Communion and Rev. Then Samuel listened for God's call, and if he hadn't been listening he would have missed all that was happening and what was going to happen. Eli wanted to know what the Lord had told Samuel, God told Samuel that Eli and his sons had been stealing from the offerings and they would be destroyed, and Samuel was called to confront their corruption. Samuel was a trustworthy prophet. God calls all kinds of people to serve Him. God is in the business of calling unlikely people to do His work in the world. God is always with us, but sometimes it takes someone else to get our attention. Who is God speaking through to get your attention? We need to be listening to those around us. Who has God put in your life that you need to be listening to, and speaking to? God is calling each and every one of us. God's voice may be hard to discern, but God will help us hear His call. Let us go into God's world this week knowing that He is calling us to do His work", said Rev. Lafary.

Strawberries — The Perfect Summer Fruit

Strawberries have been considered a tasty and nutritious treat for hundreds of years. Nutritional experts believe that strawberries are as close as you can get to a perfect fruit. They’re low in calories (27 in 100g) and fat-free, but packed with nutrients, including vitamins and antioxidants that bring numerous health benefits. Eating just five strawberries gives you more vitamin C than an orange. The vitamin content in strawberries drops quickly, so you need to eat them as soon as you can after they’ve been picked.

The strawberry got its name from the common practice of growing berries under straw to protect them from winter cold and late spring frosts. A member of the rose family, the strawberry sometimes gives off a rose-like aroma. Many speculate about how the luscious fruit was discovered. It is known that the strawberry goes as far back as the Romans, and perhaps even the Greeks.

The strawberry plant was originally grown in Northern Europe, but wild species also are found in Russia, Chile and North America. At one time, wild strawberries grew everywhere from Canada to the Carolinas and westward beyond the Appalachian Mountains.

Before modern refrigeration, a day of “strawberring” meant a long day of picking, followed by gorging on deli-

cious strawberry treats — pies, tarts, shortcake and all the ripe strawberries the family could consume. Berries that were not eaten were preserved as jam, jelly, sauce, strawberry vinegar and strawberry tonic, a medicinal drink. The remaining berries were dried on flat rocks for several days. These dried berries would be used throughout the fall and winter in breads, cakes, puddings and porridge.

The first American species of strawberry was cultivated in about 1835. Today, the strawberry is the leading small fruit crop in the U.S. It is farmed from Florida to Alaska, with the largest strawberry growing centers located in California and Florida.

When picking or buying packages of strawberries, look for ripe, shiny and brilliantly colored berries without any soft or brown patches. Never buy strawberries that are green or hard, or that look dry, dull or wrinkled. When buying berries packed in a basket, check the bottom to see if there is a juice stain. This means that the strawberries at the bottom are crushed.

Always dispose of any berries that have signs of mildew or are rotten, as they’ll contaminate the rest. Refrigerating strawberries ruins the flavor, and the strawberry aroma is easily picked up by other foods in the refrigerator. Store the berries in a cool place. Strawberries should be lightly rinsed, not washed, before serving, and eaten as soon as possible.

This recipe for Strawberry Flower Cups is an easy way to serve fresh berries as a dessert or to use as a

beautiful decoration. The strawberries are cut to resemble flower petals then stuffed with sweetened cream cheese. It’s a cool, delicious way to showcase these beautiful berries!

STRAWBERRY FLOWER CUPS

| 1/4 | teaspoon almond extract |
| 2 | tablespoons semisweet or milk chocolate, grated |

1. Lightly rinse the strawberries and gently place them in a colander to drain. Cut a thin slice from the stem end of each strawberry to create a base so that the berries will stand upright on the flattened end. Place the berries, cut side down, on a cutting board. Carefully cut each berry into 4 wedges, but do not cut through the bottom. Use your finger to gently press down in the center of the berry so that the wedges fan out just slightly, taking care not to break the berries apart. Set the berries aside.

2. Using a small mixing bowl, beat together the cream cheese, confectioners’ sugar and almond extract until light and fluffy. Gently fold in half of the grated chocolate. Use a teaspoon, a plastic sandwich bag with a small hole cut into the end or a decorating bag with decorative tip to fill the berries with the cream-cheese mixture. Sprinkle the remaining grated chocolate over each berry. Cover and chill until ready to serve. Makes about 32 filled strawberries.

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BEWARE OF DANGEROUS CARROTS!

Carrots are a favorite root vegetable of children and adults alike. This delicious carrot comes in many colors and sizes, but unfortunately, the carrot family has a number of dangerous, poisonous plants in it too.

Two types of hemlock are stomach poisons when eaten. Poison hemlock (*Conium maculatum*) is not native to Illinois and was added to the Illinois Exotic Weed list in 2015. It grows four to nine feet tall with four to six-inch white flowers. It has a purple spotted, waxy stems. This plant is common along roadsides and ditches and has a disagreeable “mousy” odor. The entire plant is poisonous if ingested.

Water hemlock (*Conium maculata*) is considered by many to be the most poisonous plant in the northern temperate zone. Only a small amount of the toxic substance in the plant is needed to produce poisoning in animals or in humans. This native plant grows three to six foot tall with 6-inch white flowers and purple-streaked stout stems. All parts of this plant are poisonous, especially the roots.

The next three dangerous carrots cause photo-dermatitis. Cow parsnip, wild parsnip, and giant hogweed contain an allergen that is activated by sunlight to cause a rash, blisters, or other skin irritations in susceptible people.

Cow Parsnip (*Heracleum maximum*) is a native plant that can reach eight feet tall. Like the hemlocks, its flowers are white, but cow parsnip flowers are larger, growing to 10 inches across.

Wild Parsnip (*Pastinaca sativa*) has large yellow flowers that are about five inches across. It is a stout plant that grows to five feet tall with grooves along its stem.

Giant hogweed (*Heracleum mantegazzianum*) is the worst of the three that cause blisters in the sun. This plant lives up to its name as a giant. It grows 15 feet tall with five-foot leaves and 2 ½ foot white umbel flowers. Its massive size makes it desirable to some home gardeners, but it is a public hazard that causes severe skin irritation in susceptible people. A USDA pamphlet says this plant’s sap produces painful, burning blisters that later develop dark scars that may persist for years. Fortunately, it has only been found in an isolated location in northwest Illinois, and those plants have

been eradicated. Giant hogweed is a federal noxious weed, making it unlawful to propagate, sell or transport this plant in the United States.

Finally, not all carrots are dangerous. Queen Anne’s Lace (*Daucus carota*) is also called wild carrot due to its large, edible taproot. It grows four foot tall with lacy four-inch flowers. This plant is the ancestor of our cultivated carrot, though its roots are white instead of orange.

It’s not too long before his antics get caught on viral video, and he’s dubbed “The Grim Reaper.” A cautionary tale for criminals, he works his way through the list of lowlifes who have done his family wrong. It’s not deep on story intricacies so much as it’s an excuse for creative payback scenarios. In the end, the 1974 Charles Bronson original was better, but for a Friday night shoot-’em-up, Bruce Willis still delivers.

Gringo (R) — David Oyelowo portrays Harold, a pharmaceutical company representative, Nash Edgerton’s comedic crime story set in Mexico. He’s on a business trip to a crime-ridden city dealing as a straight arrow

with criminals and is mistaken for the company president and therefore subject to repeated kidnapping attempts. Somehow, he muddles his way through it all — or maybe he’s the one setting this clockwork caper in motion. The problem is, the parts of this machine are too intricate to figure out, and the many-layered storylines (the hijinks of Harold’s slick bosses, played by Joel Edgerton and Charlize Theron; a pair of happy-go-lucky drug mules, played by Amanda Seyfried and Harry Treadaway; a cartel that can’t shoot straight) don’t make it any easier.

Amanda (Olivia Cooke) is an empty shell who euthanized her own horse and must pretend to have feelings in order to operate from day to day. Somehow these unlikely partners bond over a shared disdain for Lily’s stepdad, whom they hatch a plot to kill.
