There are lots of people on the roads these days. I, Dorothy remember when two other girls and I rode our bicycles to Peoria one day. We rode up to a gas station owned by a friend of ours, shared an orange soda pop, and rode back home. We probably saw a dozen cars, all total, during our ride! I remember buying my bicycle by saving pennies for pulling weeds on the farm! I think I paid \$10.00 for the bike!

The snow this area had is disappearing and the temperatures are ranging in the forty’s and fifty’s in the daytime. Though, I keep my wool blanket on my bed at night.

Hanna City used to have more stores to shop at and most of the construction of new homes has stopped. It is quiet, and we can see further now that the leaves are gone. I, Dorothy, had forgotten how close the homes are across from me (on Clausen Addition). Many years ago, there was a lake between this property and Clausen Addition. There was a cement Dam north of Elbert Court to create the lake. The water in the lake helped the men build the cement road (Rt. 116-Farmington Rd.). When the water was frozen men would cut large chunks out of it and store them in the Ice House here in Hanna City to sell to folks to keep their food safer. This was before electricity in Hanna City. Folks had gardens and bought products from the neighboring farmers. The farmers used to sell their cream (from their cows) to a creamery in Peoria. They took it there in huge milk cans. People living in Hanna City had their own wells for drinking water and “soft water” from their cisterns for washing their clothes. The “soft water” came from the rain water. Now the city provides water. This town looks good!

We don’t see as many kinds of birds and bees, probably due to the chemicals sprayed on the farmers crops to kill weeds. The geese do like to go from lake to lake and they and the hummingbirds migrate in the winter time too, later.

Some upcoming events for Hanna City are a Holiday Bazaar on Saturday, December 1 from 10:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. Also, a Junior High Dance at the Community Building on N. Main Street will be held on Friday, December 7 from 7:00 p.m. – 9:30 p.m. for 6th grade through 8th grade. Cost is \$5.00 each and concessions are for sale.

Reminder that our Little Free Library is available at the Community Building also, and the Farmington Area Public Library District also provides books there on Mondays from 10:00-11:00 a.m.

Another reminder: Our Community Food Pantry will be open in December as usual. However, it will be earlier in the month. Date will be advertised. As an exception to the provisions of this Section, any vehicle may be parked for a period of time not to exceed fifteen minutes while actually engaged in loading and unloading property.
When said parking ban is issued, it shall be made available for announcement to the television and news media serving Glasford, Illinois, and on the Village electric sign board, to advise the residents of the Village of Glasford of the implementation of a "snow parking ban."
Violation of said ordinance will result in the vehicle being towed at the owner’s expense.

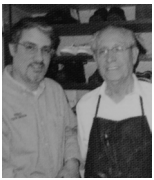
