From the desk of the Mayor:

This past year has been a very interesting year for all of us. Thankfully the threat of Covid 19 has begun to diminish, and things are finally getting back to normal. Due to our dedicated staff, the Town has maintained all our services throughout the pandemic.

We thank Brenda Riley, a life-long resident of Nutter Fort, for her service on council. Sadly, she has resigned from her position and will be greatly missed. Brenda always cared for Nutter Fort and its people.

I am proud to say, Nutter Fort has been pro-active in the services we provide our citizens. Our Public Works Department has added talented employees to aid in keeping up our aging infra-structure-mainly our water and sewer lines. Our sewage projects (we are completing phase 3), are still ongoing and although there has been some inconvenience to our streets, the benefits are well worth it. A lot of our nearly 12 miles of streets were dug up during this time and most have been repaved. We are far ahead of our neighboring towns in updating our infrastructure, these upgrades should serve us well for years to come.

The Town of Nutter Fort has added a 24/7 ambulance service fully staffed with extremely qualified and caring paramedics and EMTs. They began taking calls on the 11/28/2022 and have provided emergency services to many of our residents and those of the adjoining area. The Fire Department added a new 107' ladder truck last spring to replace their more than 30-year-old arial. Nutter Fort Fire has a class 2 ISO rating, something to be proud of! This can lower your homeowner insurance rates. Copies of the certification are available in the office. Our Fire Department is considered one of the best around and has one of the quickest response times in the county.

On May 1st, our police department added 2 officers and their K9s to its roster along with another officer graduating from the WV State Police Academy. The officers are getting a lot of illegal drugs off the streets and keeping our crime rate one of the lowest in the county.

We are indeed blessed to live in a town with such dedicated emergency personnel.

INFORMATION FROM THE CHIEF

In May the police department had an officer, Ethan Kesling, graduate from the police academy and we hired two officers with prior law enforcement experience, Adam Zahradnik along with K9 Gamma and Justin Hetherington along with K9 Crash. We will be looking to hire one more officer soon.

The police department is working hard to keep up with the growing number of calls we handle that involve drugs. We are seeing more and more calls relating to Fentanyl and Meth. Our two new K9s are already having a significant impact on the drug problem in our community.

The police department will be going around and checking properties and streets for dead storage vehicles. We will be issuing tickets and towing vehicles and the owners will be required to appear before the police judge. If you have a vehicle that would be considered dead storage, please remove it immediately. If your neighbor has a vehicle or you know where one is located, you can report that to us by calling our office. We will follow up on the information as soon as we can.

If you have a seasonal vehicle, boat, campers, RV, ATVs, etc. please DO NOT PARK them on the street and leave them for an extended period of time. This causes a problem with parking. Be respectful to your neighbors.

IF YOU HAVE A DOG OR CAT PLEASE KEEP IT ON YOUR OWN PROPERTY.

YOU CAN REQUEST A TRAP FROM THE TOWN IF YOU NEED TO CATCH A CAT RUNNING LOOSE.

Summer is upon us. Please pay attention in the residential areas for children playing and riding bikes. Please also watch your speed. We will be running radar and watching the stop signs along with those who are using cellphones while driving.

The park is open and baseball games are being played on all fields. The park is a very busy place this time of year. We will be patrolling the park and looking for problems. Alcohol is not allowed at the park. The park closes at dark.

If you see someone in your part of the neighborhood and you feel they are acting suspicious, please call 911 so we can have an officer check it out. You may save yourself or a neighbor from becoming a victim of a crime.

As a reminder, all homes must be equipped with a water shut-off valve inside the home per WV State Code §150-7-5. In part, the code states that the customer shall install and properly maintain in good working condition a stop and waste cock of a type approved by the utility on the customer's service pipe immediately inside the foundation wall in a readily accessible location and in a place protected from the possibility of freezing and so placed that it will shut off and drain all plumbing within any and all buildings in the premises. Following these simple guidelines could save you, the homeowner, thousands of dollars in home repairs from future water leaks.

In response to the multiple requests from residents, yard waste is part of our chipper service. This is now on a regular schedule and will coincide with our recycling every second and fourth Wednesday.

We will also be picking up ONE LARGE ITEM on the last Thursday of every month. Please call Town Hall to have your address and item added to the monthly list.

NUTTER FORT FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

The men and women of the Nutter Fort Fire Department continue to take pride in our department and the community that we serve. If you haven't heard the good news yet, the Town of Nutter Fort added Emergency Medical Services in the form of an ambulance to its list of great services the town provides! In today's world, area ambulances are often overwhelmed with a record high "call volume", which could mean an extended wait time should you find yourself needing an ambulance. Nutter Fort's response to this ongoing problem was to be proactive and fund an ambulance service right here in our town. We are staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year with at least one Paramedic. This allows our crews to provide you with the highest level of prehospital care available.

In the Fire/EMS field, organizations enter into "mutual aid agreements". This allows agencies to receive assistance from each other should the need arise. This may mean our ambulance may respond to other communities and other ambulance services may also assist with calls in Nutter Fort should our ambulance be tied up on another call. In the event you dial 911 for a medical emergency, the Nutter Fort Fire Department will still "First Respond" and provide care until the next closest or available ambulance can arrive.

Additionally, the Nutter Fort EMS frequently offers Heartsaver CPR Class and is open to members of the community. Please contact PW Merrill at pmerrill@townofnutterfort.com or call the station at 304-622-5001 and ask to speak to an EMS staff member for information on upcoming classes. You can also use our Nutter Fort Fire Department Facebook page to look for upcoming classes as they are offered.

We are exceptionally fortunate to be able to offer this service to the residents of the town of Nutter Fort. The Nutter Fort Fire Department and EMS Agency will continue to keep the protection of life and property as our primary goal, and we look forward to growing stronger to help better serve the needs of our community!

SAFETY - SMOKE DETECTORS & CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS

If you missed changing the batteries in your smoke detectors on March 12th for daylight savings time, please take a moment to do so. Smoke detectors save lives! Also, make sure that every member of your family is familiar with an ESCAPE plan, in case of a fire. In addition to smoke detectors, carbon monoxide detectors are also instrumental in preventing poisoning or death from carbon monoxide exposure. These items can be obtained at a very low cost and could save your life and the lives of your family! WEST VIRGINIA STATE BURNING LAWS

In accordance with West Virginia State Code and the WV Division of Forestry, beginning March 1 and continuing through May 31 and beginning October 1 through December 31, you are only permitted to burn outdoors from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. This is to help prevent the unwanted spread of fire during the dry spring season. You must also contact the Town of Nutter Fort to obtain a burning permit if you wish to burn brush at your residence.

ISO RATING

The Nutter Fort Fire Department was reevaluated for their updated Public Protection Classification (PPC) by the Insurance Services Office, Inc. (ISO), headquartered in Mt. Laurel, NJ. As of March 2022, the ISO concluded its review of the fire suppression features being provided by the Nutter Fort Fire Department. **The resulting community classification by the ISO is Class 02/2X.** The previous rating that the fire department was held under was a Class 03.

According to the ISO Mitigation website (www.isomitigation.com), ISO collects information on municipal fire-protection efforts in communities through the United States. A Public Protection Classification from 1 to 10 is then assigned upon each department's review. Class 1 generally represents superior property fire protection (best rating) and Class 10 indicates that the area's fire suppression program doesn't meet ISO's minimum criteria (worst rating).

THINGS TO KEEP IN MIND

BUILDING PERMITS – Please check with Town Hall to see if a permit is required prior to starting improvements to your property. Permits are not required for flooring, painting, or minor landscaping unless a contractor or handyman will be performing the work. For your own security and peace of mind, contact Town Hall to verify that a prospective contractor is registered every time you plan on hiring out a job.

BURNING PERMITS – There is a \$5.00 fee to obtain a burning permit. The fire must always be attended to. The area must be cleared down to mineral soil for a minimum distance of 10 feet around items to be burned & if your fire escapes, you are liable for the costs of fighting the fire & any damage the fire may cause. \$1000.00 is the maximum fine for violating the burning law.

CHIPPER/YARD WASTE LIST – To better serve our citizens, public works has a <u>REGULAR</u> schedule for the pickup of both yard waste and chipping. Yard waste is <u>NOT</u> to be picked up with regular municipal waste per the Solid Waste Authority. This service will follow the recycling dates. There is <u>NO ADDITIONAL COST</u> to our residents. If you have questions, please contact Town Hall at (304) 622-7713.

BULK ITEM PICK UP – Our public works department offers a (1) bulk item pick up the last Thursday of every month. Please call the office to be added to the list for pick up. If you find yourself with an item that cannot be picked up because it exceeds our restrictions, please feel free to call Leroy Armstead at 304.669.0540 or 304.695.8976 and discuss a pick-up arrangement. There may be a small fee.

LED SIGN RENTAL – Please keep in mind that the Town Hall LED sign is available to the general public to display announcements, i.e. birthdays, anniversaries and important events. The fee is \$25 on the 1st day and \$10 for each additional day thereafter.

PARKING LOT RENTAL – If you are having an event at Kuz's Korner, the parking lot can be rented for \$25. We also offer a special discounted package of parking lot rental and one day sign rental for \$45.

Your drinking water is **purchased** from the Clarksburg Water Board. The Clarksburg Water Board utilizes **surface water** from the West Fork River.

A Source Water Protection Plan was updated in 2019. The intake that supplies drinking water to the Clarksburg Water Board has a higher susceptibility to contamination, due to the sensitive nature of surface water supplies and the potential contaminant sources identified within the area. This does not mean that this intake will become contaminated only that conditions are such that the surface water could be impacted by a potential contaminant source. Future contamination may be avoided by implementing protective measures. All drinking water contains various amounts and kinds of contaminants. Federal and state regulations establish limits, controls, and treatment practices to minimize these contaminants and to reduce any subsequent health effects.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits of contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of these contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

The source of drinking water (both tap and bottled water) includes rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals, and, in some cases radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring, or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, farming.

Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).
