Mency's Celebration of Life

On May 29, 2018, Mency Renee Cotton went to sleep, to awaken to the Angelic voice of the Lord our Savior informing her that it is time to come home. After a brief battle with cancer, her ultimate wish to be in the comfort of His presence has been granted at the age of 63.

On February 18, 1955, Mency was born to Mary Frances and Sylvester Youngblood both from Birmingham, Alabama. She was the oldest child of two girls and was raised in California. Mency accepted Christ at an early age and grew up in a Christian home with strong family values.

After her mother's death, Mency became the Matriarch of the family. Family was very important to her. Mency and her husband Ben, would host numerous of celebratory gatherings in their home throughout the year. Mency was a perfectionist. During the Thanksgiving and Christmas season, she would prepare a month in advance to create a warm, festive, and cheerful environment. This would include exterior and interior decorations. Mency enjoyed cooking and baking. She believed that people's spirits were raised with the seasonal décor and tasty meals which she prepared with her secret ingredient of love.

In her spare time, Mency volunteered: to feed the homeless, take care

of numerous family members that were sick, or isolated in skilled care facilities, and acted as an advocate on their behalf. This went on for many years.

Mency was a big advocate of education. In 1983, she graduated from California State University Dominguez Hills,

> and earned her Bachelors of Art's degree in Sociology. She accomplished this while working full-time for the County of Los Angeles, loving her husband, and raising her children.

Many years later, she started a Master's program in Social Work at the University of Southern California.

Mency was a true humanitarian at heart, and her deep passion was helping people. She worked in various public service positions for the County of Los Angeles for 43 years. Starting as a medical clerk and advancing to a Mental Health Coordinator II. Her final position allowed her to develop, operate, and manage a group program, which helped people

to rehabilitate their social and life skills. Through her guidance, her clients were better equipped to manage their affairs, and develop healthier personal and professional relationships and start careers. She took exceptional pride in this position. Upon retiring, Mency received a distinguish scroll award from the Los Angeles County Department Mental health for her outstanding service, commitment, and dedication.
