If and when you see them, PLEASE DO NOT REPORT THEM AS LOST AND PLEASE DO NOT TAKE THEM! I can't emphasize enough that they should not be removed. The shepherd depends on them to guide the sheep to their camp every evening. I'm sure many of you will remember the many stories about the dogs from last year.

There are two types of dogs in the world, pets and working dogs. We all know our pets and love them dearly. The same goes for a working dog, however, there is a huge difference. I'd like to cover the working dog.

#### I'M A WORKING DOG



"Hello, I'm a working dog. I'm not much to

look at, tired and run down. I have some scars, I'm dirty, and most the time look homeless.

My master is a cowboy, farmer or in this case a sheep herder. I work for a living, pushing sheep to water, then to feed. There are several of us dogs that watch over the flock and we take turns ensuring they stay put. I cover lots of country in my day, and every now and then, I will run across a person who just doesn't understand my way of life. I look tired, dirty, bruised and sore. But I'm good. I may take a few minutes to play with you, I may stay just out of reach. I'm just sizing you up.

Sometimes I'm given a day off to rest or just take time to travel around. I've been known to find a kind soul, a shady porch or a cool grassy yard to lay. That's when I generally run across humans who don't understand me. They see me as lost, hungry and abused. But I'm not, I have a job to do. Sure, I like the feel of a nice belly rub, a kind pat and a soft bed now and then. But I'm a working dog.

My master sees to it that I have food and water. I may not see a vet often, but that don't mean I'm not vetted. My master does his own vetten'.
