"Epiphany is the day Christians remember the coming of the Magi to visit Jesus, bringing their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

It occurs on Jan. 6 every year, the 13th day of the Christmas season. The word "epiphany," from the Greek word epiphania, means appearance or manifestation.

The arrival of these visitors was a sign that the incarnation of God in Christ had been made known and was recognized by the heavens to the whole world, so that even Gentile wise men from the East came to pay him homage. This is an observance of great majesty, solemnity and awe.

An even more ancient Christian celebration than Christmas, Epiphany originally focused on the nativity, God's incarnation (God made flesh) in the birth of Jesus Christ, and Christ's baptism. After the late fourth century, as Advent developed as a season of baptismal preparation in addition to Lent, Epiphany became associated with baptism. This is why we see images of the three Magi on many older baptismal fonts.

In many Hispanic cultures, Epiphany is a day of great rejoicing and celebration, often kicked off by a parade the night before in which people dressed as the three **Epiphany - Continues on Pg. 4**  January 2021 Edition

The UPS truck pulled up in our driveway yesterday. I went out to greet the driver and get the package I was expecting. As he was handing it to me, he asked, "Do you recognize me?" I looked at him for a second and realized that I did!

He had been a student at the Generation Station Youth Center some time ago. He graduated from Bo Manor in 2007. I recall that he was one of those kids that could've gone either way. He wasn't a bad kid, but he was pretty squirrelly.

I found out that he had been working for UPS for two years. He and his wife have owned a home for the last five years, and they have a six-year-old child. I have no idea what the Generation Station played in this young man becoming a responsible adult, but I just felt good that he was doing so well.

This year has been the most challenging in our 20-year history. When schools went all-virtual in March, we ceased operating. Since then we have struggled to figure out how we can serve area youth and their families. Our staff has delivered goodie bags with snacks and activities and kept in touch with the parents to try to determine their needs.

When school began this fall, we decided that we would try to help kids who were having trouble learning virtually, as well as those who were doing in-person learning and needing extra help. However, just about the time that we thought we might be ready to resume, schools went back to all-virtual learning.

One of the big considerations for us was not putting the ministry in a position where we would be operating but didn't have the financial resources to sustain the program. So we have been biding our time and waiting for the right moment.

Fortunately, the State of Maryland is offering an emergency grant to help serve families affected by the pandemic. We applied for this through the Cecil County Local Management Board. We received preliminary notice that our application will be approved. This means that we can be assured of continued funding throughout 2021. Once we receive final confirmation, we will prepare to open as soon as possible.

We are encouraged by this development, but also will welcome your continued support. The grant covers many expenses, but not all. Thank you as always for your prayers and support for this ministry. When you meet young adults like my UPS driver, you realize how important it is.



We appreciate your feedback and suggestions to make Sunday School fun and informative for all.








## Adult Sunday School Via ZOOM

kings or carrying statues of the three kings pass through the towns and villages throwing out candy and small gifts to all around. Families and children alike look forward to Día de Los Tres Reyes (Three Kings Day) as a time for presents, feasting and celebration. Attending church services that include the celebration of communion is also common in many of these cultures, even for those who may not attend worship regularly.


In England and some other European cultures, Jan. 5 is known as Twelfth Night, the culmination of the 12 days of Christmas feasting and partying. On Twelfth Night, many families gather in homes to celebrate with friends, food, singing and gifts. It is at these Twelfth Night celebrations that "<u>Chalking the Door</u>," asking God's blessing on those dwellings and upon all who live there, is most often observed.


In New Orleans, Twelfth Night begins another season of celebrations that comes to fulfillment at Mardi Gras (Fat Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday). Epiphany itself, Jan. 6, becomes the kickoff day for that season, but is also often observed with a full celebration in church, complete with incense, elaborate processionals, choral celebrations, and Eucharist.

Some United Methodists in the United States, who are not part of these rich traditions, tend to recognize Epiphany on the Sunday nearest Jan. 6. There may be a pageant of the three kings as part of worship that day and a small party afterward."

You need to know you are a part of the bridge that keeps our "guests" afloat when times are difficult. YOU have helped to provide for the least in our community.

Thru at least the Spring of 2021 we will continue to operate under our COVID plan-meaning curb side deliveries of food pantry boxes; services for the pantry by appointment (please direct inquiries to call 410-885 -3244 on Thurs. or Friday mornings between 9:00a-Noon and we will do the rest).

Remember that our Clothing/Home pantry is open to the public! If you like searching for "treasure" in 2<sup>nd</sup> hand stores and consignment shops-you need to drop in on Tuesday mornings between 9:00-11:30a. No more than 2 guests per 15 minute "shopping" cycles. The first 15 items are FREE (though we won't refuse a donation). After the first 15 items-each item is \$1.00! Our donations come in from across the county and sometimes across state lines!
