

These are fair trade certified products. That means they are produced in environmentally friendly and socially just ways. The workers and farmers are guaranteed a fair price, rather than large corporations skimming off most of the profits. The only advertising is word of mouth, so this keeps the pricing in range.

As a representative for Native American Ministries, I was invited to participate in a recent Zoom meeting that included 170 participants from across the country. While the story of "Boarding Schools", a.k.a. Residential Assimilation Schools. It is a part of the American History that is not taught in our schools, and to the best of any attendees recollection has not been taught. Investigations have been underway across Canada relating to the deaths of so many Indigenous children who were taken from their families.

Between 1819 and 1969, the U.S. ran or supported 408 boarding schools, in conjunction with various religions. The federal government still oversees more than 180 schools in nearly two dozen states that serve Native Americans (posted as of May 2022). Most of these schools are located on non-reservation lands. The 1969 Kennedy Report, cited in the Department investigation, noted that rampant physical, sexual and emotional abuse: disease; malnourishment; overcrowding,; and lack of health care at Indian boarding schools are well-documented.

Below is a PBS produced special (shown in Utah) on the topic. I encourage you to consider viewing the report, to 1) better understand the topic which you may not be aware of and 2) to contact your Congressional representative to find out their position on **H.R.5444** - 117th Congress (2021-2022): Truth and Healing Commission on Indian Boarding School Policies Act. This bill has been repeatedly held up from a floor vote.




