



Laetare Sunday or "Rejoice" Sunday falls on the Fourth Sunday of Lent. Historically seen as a day of refreshment during the Lenten fast and austerity, Laetare Sunday was a moment of respite as the Christian Church sang "Rejoice, O Jerusalem" at the beginning of the introit during the Sunday service. In some communities, the paraments are changed from purple to rose (light-purple/pink) echoing the Third Sunday of Advent when the rose colored candle is lit on the Advent wreath. Other traditions include the breaking of the Lenten fast from Sunup until Sundown and consuming strawberry based desserts. All of this is to remind the Christian that the joy of Easter is soon to come. To honor this tradition, incense will be used during tonight's service in order to enhance and heighten the worship experience as we too look forward, with joy, the resurrection of our Lord. Incense is burned during the "Incense Psalm," or Psalm 141, to provide us with a visual image of how our prayers ascend to the heaven and are collected at the footstool of God. During the singing of the psalm this evening, allow the incense to assist in engaging all your senses in worship and rejoice that our God in heaven collects, hears, and answers all your prayers.
