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As we gather, please note that some people prefer to reconnect with their church family and friends in the narthex (lobby area) prior to the service, while others prefer to meditate and pray in the sanctuary in preparation for worship. The ushers will try to keep the glass doors closed so that the joyful noise of church-family conversation in the narthex and the holy silence of preparation for worship in the sanctuary can coexist before the service begins. Suggested prayers to help you prepare for worship can be found on the inside front cover of the hymnal in the pews.

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Our services generally come out of the various settings in the Lutheran Service Book (the hymnal in the pews). We encourage people to have a hymnal for in-home use as well. Contact the office if you would like to order one.

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Most of our services include a corporate confession of sins and absolution (forgiveness) from God through the pastor. Occasionally we have Matins or other services which do not include this brief rite. We always offer individual confession and absolution by appointment and encourage our members to make use of this great gift of God.

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Holy Communion is celebrated each week in one or more of our regular services. In accordance with the historic practice of the Christian Church, our congregation practices close communion, meaning that normally our members and members of our sister (LCMS) congregations' commune here. Please speak to the pastor about exceptions to this general practice. Please also note that this practice in no way intends to comment on the state of anyone else's faith; we simply understand our communing together as also a public profession of unity in doctrine, which not everyone shares. Those who do not commune here may come forward for a blessing (simply fold your arms over your heart to indicate that you are not communing) or remain in the pew during communion and pray, particularly for visible unity in the Christian Church.

Out of respect for God's House and your fellow worshipers, please turn off or silence cell phones prior to this Worship Service. Thank you for your co-operation.

Epistle: Romans 3:19-28

Now we know that whatever the law says it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be stopped, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. For by works of the law no human being will be justified in his sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin.

But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it—the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God's righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over former sins. It was to show his righteousness at the present time, so that he might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus.

Then what becomes of our boasting? It is excluded. By what kind of law? By a law of works? No, but by the law of faith. For we hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law.

PRAYERS OF THE CHURCH



[Adapted from *Luther's Christian Questions with Their Answers* for those who intend to go to the Sacrament.]

As we prepare to approach the Table of our Lord, we examine our hearts and lay them bare before our Lord seeking His forgiveness. Do you believe that you are a sinner?

Yes, I believe it. I am a sinner.

How do you know this?

From the Ten Commandments, which I have not kept.

Are you sorry for your sins?

Yes, I am sorry that I have sinned against God.

What have you deserved from God because of your sins?

His wrath and displeasure, temporal death, and eternal damnation.

Do you hope to be saved?

Yes, that is my hope.

In whom do you trust?

In my dear Lord Jesus Christ.

Who is Christ?

The Son of God, true God and man.

What has Christ done for you that you trust in Him?

He died for me and shed His blood for me on the cross for the forgiveness of sins.



Do you believe, then, that the true body and blood of Christ are in the Sacrament? **Yes, I believe it.**

What convinces you to believe this?

The word of Christ: Take eat, this is My body; drink of it, all of you, this is My blood.

What should we do when we eat His body and drink His blood, and in this way receive His pledge?

We should remember and proclaim His death and the shedding of His blood, as He taught us: This do, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me.

Why should we remember and proclaim His death?

First, so we may learn to believe that no creature could make satisfaction for our sins. Only Christ, true God and man, could do that. Second, so we may learn to be horrified by our sins, and to regard them as very serious. Third, so we may find joy and comfort in Christ alone, and through faith in Him be saved.

What motivated Christ to die and make full payment for your sins? His great love for His Father and for me and other sinners.

Finally, do you believe that the word of Christ's forgiveness I speak to you is from the Lord Himself?

Yes, I do.

Receive the forgiveness Christ won for you by His Passion, death, and resurrection. By the command of our Lord Jesus Christ I, a called and ordained servant of the Word, forgive you your sins, in the name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit.



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Buxtehude and the Cantata

The word cantata comes from the Latin word *cantare* which means to sing. It was a term first applied in seventeeth-century Italy to secular music for one or two voices with accompaniment. In Germany, the preference was for church cantatas that incorporated Biblical texts or familiar chorales (hymns). German composers also expanded the cantata form into multiple movements and added more independent instrumental parts.

The cantata heard today by composer Dietrich Buxtehude (c. 1637-1707) is a fine example of a single-movement church cantata from the end of the seventeenth century. It is built upon the phrases of the German choral *Erhalt uns Herr bei deinem Wort* ("Lord, Keep us Steadfast in Thy Word" - *LSB* #655) and "Grant Peace, We Pray in Mercy Lord" - *LSB* #778. Between the phrases of the chorale, Buxtehude composed lively *ritornello* parts for two violins. In music of the Baroque era *ritornelli* are recurring sections that give structure to the musical forms.

In his day Dietrich Buxtehude held one of the most prestigious church musician posts in all of Germany. He was both organist and general manager at the Marienkirche in Lübeck, a north German city which enjoyed great prosperity from the shipping trade. As a composer and organist Buxtehude exerted a strong influence on the music of Johann Sebastian Bach. The young Bach was so interested in learning from Buxtehude that he made the 200-mile journey from Arnstadt on foot to visit him. Wishing to absorb as much as possible from Buxtehude, Bach remained in Lübeck for almost four months, much to the frustration of his employer who had only approved of a four-week leave of absence.

In Bach's hands the church cantata developed even further in size and complexity. His cantatas are all multi-movement works employing freely written texts alongside of familiar chorales. He also incorporated an even greater variety of instrumental resources and vocal techniques more commonly found in Baroque opera.

In our time the term cantata is applied to wide range of choral music, though it usually refers to an extended work for choir and/or solists based on sacred texts.
