- The telephone was patented by Alexander Graham Bell on March 7, 1876, and Monopoly was invented on March 7, 1933.
- Birth Month: March babies are associated with daffodils.
- Calendar Quirk: Every year, March and June finish on the same day of the week.
- Historical Events: The Eiffel Tower opened in March 1889, and the Girl Scouts were founded on March 12, 1912.
- Weather Lore: Often described as coming in "like a lion" and going out "like a lamb," representing the transition from winter storms to spring.
- Observances: March is National Umbrella Month and National Reading Month.
- March is named for Mars, the Roman god of war, because this was the time of year to resume military campaigns that had been interrupted by winter.
- March's Full Moon, the Worm Moon, reaches peak illumination on the morning of Tuesday, March 3, 2026. There is going to be a full lunar eclipse, also known as a Blood Moon.





Genealogy



Planting a garden is a sign of hope for tomorrow. Spring time in the Arkansas Ozarks continues to show the beauty of nature after a cold and harsh winter. It was once common to see a farmer plowing the cool spring soil using a mule. Mules were the draft animal of choice for several generations in the Ozarks. The sure footed and strong animals plowed fields, pulled wagons, and skid logs over the rugged Ozark terrain. A mule is a hybrid animal, the off spring of a male donkey and a female horse. Mules and donkeys are known for their sturdy build. Today mules are still used in the military, park services, outdoor outfitters, etc. the mule enables the rider to reach inaccessible regions while carrying provisions. And so, like the garden that rises again each spring, the mule stands as a reminder: endurance, patience, and steady purpose will always have a place in the Ozarks.
