

2022 Mazda Miata debuts with Kinematic Posture Control brake torque vectoring

It also ditches the automatic transmission option on all but the Grand Touring trim level.



Mazda's fourth-generation Miata is still kicking for the 2022 model year. While that makes us happy -- Miatas are wonderful cars made of pure joy – it's not exactly getting huge, world-altering changes out of the deal, according to an announcement Thursday.

Of course, while the changes aren't massive, there are a couple of good ones. Chief among these is the addition of something that Mazda is calling Kinematic Posture Control. If you're like me, you read that and assumed it meant the Miata is getting some wild self-adjusting seats, but nope, that's not it at all. Instead, it's Mazda's take on brake torque vectoring. What is brake torque vectoring? It's where a vehicle uses its ABS system to apply braking force to a single wheel to help encourage sharper cornering. Mazda is also using it to negate some body roll, which is neat, too.

Other significant changes include Mazda's decision to make the Miata's six-speed automatic transmission only available on the top-level, luxury-focused Grand Touring trim. This means that the Miata Sport and Club trims are now manual only. We're not mad at this in the slightest since the excellent six-speed manual is the only way we'd want to experience this little roadster.

So, what do all these changes add up to in terms of cost? The good news is that things aren't dramatically more expensive than on the 2021 cars. The base Miata Sport with its black soft-top roof will start at just \$28,315, including Mazda's \$1,015 destination fee. That's an upcharge of \$490 over last year, and part of that comes from a \$20 increase to that destination fee.

In 1848, a twenty-three-year-old apprentice millwright boarded Europe bound for America. His name was Carl Hilmar Guenther.

Hilmar traveled through the Midwest before embarking down the Mississippi River to Louisiana and, ultimately, Texas. During this time, he was involved in a variety of work experiences including lumbering, farming and flour milling.

In America, Guenther had found that "You seize the opportunity that presents itself." Three years after his arrival, with the financial help from his parents, he did just that, building a flour mill seventy-five miles northwest of San Antonio on the Live Oak Creek in Fredericksburg, Texas.

Business flourished and Hilmar expanded and improved his mill over the next several years. But in 1858, drought so depleted the crops that he had little grain to grind and little water to drive the wheel. So, Guenther decided to close the mill and relocate his business on the more powerful San Antonio River. He purchased seven and three quarter acres of land just below the center of the city. In 1860, after the mill was erected, Guenther began to build a home for his family.

Stones were quarried from an area near what is now the San Antonio Zoo for a single-story residence. The mortar joining these stones was made from rocks gathered downstream. The roof was made of metal sheets. Here, Hilmar and his wife, Henrietta Dorothea Pape, set up a home and raised seven children.

The mill prospered. Guenther replaced millstones with steel rolls to grind grain. Waterwheels gave way to electricity as a source of power. Building expansions took place over the years and Guenther's Mill was renamed Pioneer Flour Mills in 1898.

In 1902 Erhard Guenther, Hilmar's youngest son, became president of Pioneer Flour Mills. He also undertook a major remodeling of the family home. The changes that he made gave The Guenther House the look it has today.

How Will MX-5 Miata be Electrified?

The Mazda MX-5 Miata is in its fourth generation, with the current ND model designation, arrived in 2016.

Given the usual product cadence at Mazda, the next MX-5, which will likely be classified the NE generation, should arrive around the middle of the decade, and Mazda has confirmed that the new sports car will be electrified. The news should come as little surprise as Mazda has said it aims to have a fully electrified lineup by 2030.

Fans of the MX-5 shouldn't worry about the future car being weighed down by a heavy battery as electrification can mean a simple mild-hybrid setup, a technology Mazda plans to implement in future models. A mild-hybrid setup is essentially a starter motor that can act as a generator to recover energy under braking or coasting, with this energy stored in a small battery to be used to power ancillary features and sometimes to aid the engine during high-load situations.

Mazda is also well aware of the need to stick to a lightweight ethos for the next MX-5. In its statement, the automaker said it will strive to make sure the MX-5 remains a "lightweight, affordable, open two-seater sports car."

Mazda announced a highly modular platform known as the Skyactiv Multi-Solution Scalable Architecture, which the automaker said would be used for a host of models launching between 2022 and 2025, including five hybrids, five plug-in hybrids, and three battery-electric cars. However, the automaker said the platform with longitudinal engine mounting, like that used by the MX-5, will be reserved for larger vehicles. This suggests Mazda might modify the current MX-5's platform for use in the next generation of the sprightly sports car. The platform, which is unique to the MX-5, can trace its roots to the original NA generation launched for 1990.
