President's Message

Hello everyone,

It's been pretty hot these past few days and a little hard to go out and enjoy our MX-5s. With the weather being as hot as it has been, it's important to think about the needs of our cars and how to stay safe ourselves.

According to MotorBiscuit, this is what high heat can do to our cars if we don't take the proper precautions:

- Extremely hot temperature can damage the rubber of tires, especially if they are improperly inflated. Heat causes them to dry out and can cause a blowout. If your tire is over-inflated, the center of your tire will wear faster than the outer edges and vice versa. Check your tire pressure to make sure they are riding on a more even surface area.
- The battery of our car is composed of both water and acid. When temps start to heat up, the water in the battery evaporates faster, leaving the lead plates exposed. When the weather turns cold again, your battery will no longer have the amperage to start the car. Make sure to keep your car in the shade as much as you can.
- A hot engine needs all the lubrication it can get, so making sure you change the oil when necessary is important in the summer months. If you are taking more road trips in the summer, more frequent changes may be necessary.
- Low coolant levels in high heat can kill your engine. Also be aware that if you have a damaged radiator or hoses, coolant may leak causing your engine temp to rise even more. Always keep an eye on the vehicle's temperature gage.
- Gas evaporates quicker in a hot vehicle than it does in a cold one. Keeping your car in a garage or shade as much as possible
 will improve your fuel economy.
- It's also a good idea to keep a summer emergency kit in your car. Water is a must to stay hydrated until you can get to a safe place. Sunscreen, a first-aid kit, a flashlight, a blanket for shade, flares, hazard signs, tire sealant cans, jumper cables and non -perishable snacks are also good to have.

Headaches, dizziness, feeling nauseated and feeling confused are signs of overheating. Please pay attention to what your body and your car is telling you and get help when you need it.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN, aka "Where the heck are Joe and Cheryl?"

Joe and I spent 38 days and 6,700 miles on a road trip to Oregon and back. For that long of a trip we didn't take the Miata, we rented a nice comfy sedan. We enjoyed the mountains of New Mexico and Arizona, visited Red Rocks Canyon National Conservation Area outside of Las Vegas, Death Valley National Park, Yosemite National Park, Lake Tahoe, Redwood National Park and Cape Disappointment State Park in Washington. We spent two weeks in Oregon enjoying the entire coast line as well as many wineries in the Willamette Valley ("it's Willamette dammit" is their slogan). Coming home we drove along the Columbia River and through Idaho, where we visited Shoshone Falls Park *AND* the spot where Evel Knievel attempted his 1974 jump of the Snake River, both in the Twin Falls area. In southern Utah, we visited Goosenecks State Park and Natural Bridges National Monument. Our last major stop was Monument Valley at the Utah/Arizona border. While I took a lot of scenic photos, here are four of my favorite "road trip" pics.

Moki Dugway

The breathtaking Moki Dugway winds 1,200 feet from the top of a mesa to the valley below, on three miles of graded gravel at an 11% grade. Constructed in 1958 as a route for transporting mined materials from Fry Canyon to a processing mill in Mexican Hat, Utah. This unique stretch of road, which has literally been carved from the face of the cliff, connects Utah Highway 95 with US Highway 163. Along the dugway route is a place to pull out and get a fantastic view of Valley of the Gods.



Forrest Gump scenic view

This spot on Hwy 163 heading toward Monument Valley is from the scene in the movie where Forrest decides to stop running across America and go home.

This view is driving west on the way to Natural Bridges National Monument from US Hwy 191.



Death Valley

This road is known as Artists Drive in Death Valley NP. We were most surprised at how beautiful this park is and while there in early May it was only 81 degrees.



Martin Panhandle Tour

We were planning a vacation to Northern Texas last month. While we were at March Miata Madness in Jefferson, TX, we were fortunate enough to spend some time getting to know new club members Dan and Denise Arras, who are also members of the Lone Star Club.

We were planning a trip to Caprock Canyon, Palo Duro Canyon, Cadillac Ranch and the Buddy Holly Center. Dan and Denise were doing the Mural Challenge and they had one mural left – Quit quay, TX. Since we were traveling the same way, we decided to travel together.

We started off on historic 6th Street on Route 66 in Amarillo. The historic area is filled with shops, record stores, and of course restaurants.

Next up was Cadillac Ranch, a quirky art "sculpture" installation outside of Amarillo. Created in 1964, the installation consists of 10 Cadillacs buried nose first in the ground, and visitors can spray-paint art of your choice on any of the Caddys.

Next up was Bill's Backyard Classics, also in Amarillo. This place will take you back in time. Bill's Backyard Classics is a museum dedicated to vintage cars dating from the 1920s to present. Displayed are street rods, military jeeps, power wagons, smart cars and Corvettes (not ONE Miata). Overall, a great attraction!

Caprock Canyon State Park and Trailway were our next stops. Bison were roaming the plains in the front of the park. We drove through and headed toward Bison roam the plains of the park. There are a number of places to pull off and enjoy the canyon.

Next, the second largest canyon in the country lies in the heart of the Texas Panhandle: Palo Duro Canyon State Park. With a descent of some 800 feet to the canyon floor and more than 16 miles of paved road, Palo Duro Canyon State Park offers fantastic scenic views, historical sites and markers, miles and miles of trails and the obligatory gift shop. Due to heavy rains part of the park road and trails were closed the day we went, though we did find places to get out of our cars and venture out to.

Our last stop was the Buddy Holly Center in Lubbock. Filled with Buddy Holly memorabilia, and large oversized Buddy Holly glasses located on the front lawn of the museum, we took the photo op sitting inside the lenses.

Also located on the grounds of the center is Jerry Allison's original home. Jerry Allison is best known as the drummer for the Crickets, Buddy Holly's band, and co-writer of their hits "That'll Be the Day" and "Peggy Sue." Although not at it's original location, Alison supervised the reproduction of any interior items that were on display in the house to make sure they were placed just like they were when he and Buddy were kids practicing in his bedroom.

Miata Trivia

Recently, I decided to research some Miata Trivia. Here are a few of the morsels of the endeavor. Make sure you have this information handy for the when the edition of Trivia Pursuit - Miata Game comes out!

First, I provide a practice question to get you prepared: What's the difference between a Ferrari and a Miata? Answer: I don't have a Ferrari in my garage.

Now for the real questions.

1. How did the Miata get its name?

The Miata name came from a German word meaning "reward." Only a few components were recycled from existing models. The body was tidy and the chassis featured front and rear independent control arm suspensions, a first for Mazda.

2. What does MX-5 Stand for?

MX-5 stands for Mazda Experiment and project number 5.

3. What is the rarest Miata in the world?

The Club Sport is the rarest Miata ever made, with less examples built than McLaren F1s or Pagani Zondas.

4. Why is the Miata considered a girls' car?

The Miata's styling, up until the current (fourth) generation, was very rounded, soft, and "cute" compared to more "manly" cars like the Corvette and the Mustang.

5. What does the Miata logo mean?

The symbol stands for Mazda's determination to "pursue ongoing improvements to drive powerful, continuous growth", expressed by a pair of wings shaped like a letter M in an oval. The V-shaped wings are also suggestive of Mazda's flexible thinking, creativity, vitality, kindness and resilience.

6. What is the rarest Miata color?

It's Laser Blue. It's the rarest color that Mazda ever built. There's not many of those out there! "

7. Is the Miata a classic car?

The original Mazda Miata is now old enough to be considered a classic car. FYI, usually, the classic car designation applies to vehicles over 20 years old. Antique cars are over 45 years old, and vintage cars are built between 1919 and 1930.

8. Why did Miata replace its pop-up headlights?

The first-generation MX-5 was the only model to feature pop-up headlights, from the second-generation on Mazda removed them for pedestrian safety concerns.

9. When did Miata reach 1 million units sold worldwide?

The Miata MX-5 equaled 1 million units sold in 2016. In Miata's over-30 year existence, it has become the world's best-selling sports car.

How many answers did you know? If you knew 5, you are above average Miata-smart. If you knew 7, you are Miata-excellent. If you answered 8, you are Miata-outstanding. If you knew 9, you are the next Paul Wilson.

The trivia game made me think of a saying that goes something like this: "Money can't buy me happiness, but I'd rather cry in a Miata!"
