### How did I go from a Honda S-2000 to a Mazda Miata?

My first entrance into the sports car ownership world was a 2003 Honda S-2000. My first Honda vehicle was a Honda 360 purchased when I was relatively newly-married. It was a fun vehicle to drive and endeared me to the marvel of Honda creations, and I've owned a number of Hondas over the years.

My ownership of the motorcycle ended abruptly one day, when I returned home after a Sunday ride and parked in the driveway. Just then, Helenan was returning from a neighborhood bike ride with our 10-month-old-son Charles on the back. Well Charles was a walker and immediately toddled over to my Honda 360 and put his hand on the shiny (very hot) tail pipe. We spent the rest of the day time in the emergency ward with him, and realizing he would have a scar that will be a lasting memory of the event for his whole life (he is 50 now).

The motorcycle was sold within a few weeks and I didn't think about it again until the millennia came. I thought, now that the kids are grown and on their own, I mentioned to Helenan that I was thinking about getting a motorcycle. She must have been prepared for that moment, because she said responded quickly with something like "Ed, did you know that Honda was coming out with a sports car? I'll never ride on the back of your motorcycle, but I'd ride in a sports car!" That's all it took, I immediately ran to the nearest Honda Dealership (which happened to be one of my clients), and within a few days, I was a Honda sports car owner. I loved the car and drove it as my only vehicle for years. Then George Lucas introduced me to the Miata Club, invited me to a Roundup, and ultimately converted me into a Miata (2012 NC) enthusiast.

But I have to admit I missed the S-2000 styling, and when the Miata ND model was released, I was taken in by the mimicking of the styling of the S-2000. I had to get a 2017 Miata ND, a "marriage" of the S-2000 and Miata MX-5 hoods. I couldn't have been happier.

I've been a little sad that Honda ceased making the car, and I did a little research to find out why the S-2000 was retired:

- \* A big factor was the increasingly stringent emission regulations implemented globally.
- \* Honda shifted its focus towards developing more environmentally friendly technologies to meet the demands of a changing automotive landscape.
- \* As the automotive market evolved, Honda moved toward a growing demand for vehicles with enhanced comfort, advanced technology features, and broader practicality.
- \* A major reason was that very little of the S-2000 vehicle is shared with other Honda models and this increased its manufacturing costs and it never sold in large enough numbers globally to be profitable.

Many would say the Honda S-2000 is a more impressive car than the Miata from a technical and performance perspective. Next month, however, I'll focus on why Miata has been so successful and is one of the best driving cars in the world.



## The A, B, C, D's of Miatas, as I see it.
