Canada Trip Excursions

Lisa and I really enjoyed our trip to Canada for the 30th anniversary of the Underground Miata Network (UMN) in Ottawa. For those of you who might be wondering, no you don't drive on the other side of the road like you do in England. The hardest thing for me to get used to was the top speed you could drive, converting from kilometers per hour to miles per hour, was 60 mph! Many times, I felt like I could get out and walk faster!

Anyway, there were, give or take one or two, 14 runs each day (Friday and Saturday), all leaving from the parking lot of the local baseball team located right next door to the host hotel. We signed up for Brewery and Cheese on Friday and Upper Ottawa River on Saturday.

The UNM likes its ice cream. They also like their beer, so they combined the two, thus making the Brewery and Cheese run very Canadian. This tour took in two of their favorite stops: Beau's All-Natural Brewing Company and St. Albert Cheese Co-

operative.





They chose some very winding, curvy roads for this tour, reminiscent of our own Hill Country roads that we love. The roads wound through many small villages that featured what the Canadians call popsilos – basically murals on farm silos.

Beau's All-Natural Brewing Company offered tours – explaining how they make beer, as well as tastings.

Next was our lunch stop at the St Abert Cheese Cooperative, which has been operating since 1894. The coop offered a wide assortment of cheeses made on site. One of these dishes is cheese curd, made on-site. They gave us a tour of the factory, which was very interesting.

After the tour was lunch and they encouraged you to try poutine, which is an appetizer or dish of French-Canadian origin consisting of French fries topped with cheese curds and brown gravy.

On Saturday was the Upper Ottawa River tour through the rugged Ottawa Valley. Like the Canadian voyageur ancestors in search of beaver pelts, we drove up the Ottawa River (west) to Portage-du-Fort, taking both the North (Quebec) and South (Ontario) shores. While in Quebec, we passed Luskville, Norway Bay, Bristol and Quyon. On the Ontario side was Armprior (known formerly as "The Prior") and Braeside. AT the terminus was a spectacular view of the Ottawa Valley. Our lunch stop was in Galvan's Hotel – an old style hotel and tavern and "Gateway to the Pontiac," as this area of Quebec is known.





Do you tailgate?

Well....DO YOU tailgate?

One of the objectives of the new Run Committee is to provide information about safety issues when on a run. A critical one is to avoid tailgating and maintain a safe distance from any cars in front of you. In connection with that I received some interesting information from Ed Smith. Ed's a stickler for having safe, but fun, driving experiences. He sent me these observations on following distances.

You should keep a safe 3-second gap between you and the car in front of you to give you adequate time to react and come to a safe stop. One way to determine that distance is to observe the car ahead of you as they pass by a stationary object, then count three seconds and see if you pass by the same object. Adjust your speed accordingly. If you are too close, your reaction time may be cut significantly. Also, if you are too far behind, OTMs (Other than Miatas) will break into the Miata run, causing you to drop further behind. The important safety factor is that, in 3 seconds at:

60 MPH, you will travel 264 feet (equals 20 Miatas) 30 MPH, you will travel 132 feet (equals 10 Miatas) 15 MPH, you will travel 66 feet (equals 5 Miatas)

Are you a tailgater? Surely, you have driven too close to the vehicle in front of you at some point in time, especially if you drive an SUV or sports car. Per Safelite, studies have shown that family and economy cars tailgate less than sports cars and SUVs by a ratio of two to one.

In fact, the studies compared the amount of tailgating in various U.S. states and found that these five states exhibited the *worst* tailgating, i.e., finding it difficult to maintain a safe following distance:

- 1. Colorado (25%)
- 2. Georgia (20%)
- 3. Pennsylvania (20%)
- 4. Michigan (19%)
- 5. Texas (19%)

The truth is that <u>tailgating is dangerous</u> and causes thousands of vehicle accidents every year, as well as numerous fatalities. So don't be like the comic George Carlin when he once said, "Have you ever noticed that anybody driving slower than you is an idiot, and anyone going faster than you is a maniac?" Be safe, keep your distance.

Radio Tutorial

Please read this, very IMPORTANT

Editor's note: I often hear folks say, "Nah, we don't need a radio" Well, the key word in that comment is "need". Last weeks run had enough people attend, and the leaders, relay and sweep NEEDED their radio as 4 cars missed a turn. Before you say, "So, they found us, right?" If you ever lead a run or are an integral part of that run, you DO need a radio! Ed Smith has been a club member for longer than I can remember and unlike some veterans, Ed realizes how important radios are on runs. Thanks for this article, Ed!

The Bluebonnet Miata Club uses two-way radios on all its runs to keep the members safe and informed of upcoming turns, hazards in the roadway, oncoming traffic and other safety issues. Typically, the only people transmitting are the Lead car, plus the Relay and Sweep cars. Others are free to comment whenever they wish but there is usually little of that.

Every car is asked to have a radio turned on to the channel the lead driver designates. That is usually channel 7 but can change. You can purchase a two-way radio at many retail stores such as Walmart, BassPro, Cabela's or online from Amazon and others. They are reasonably priced at about \$50, with many brands to choose from: Midland, Dewalt, Motorola, Baofeng, Cobra and almost all have rechargeable batteries. Be cautious of radios listed as "HAM" radio as they may receive on the FRS band but may not transmit on that band. Ask around to get feedback from other club members as to which radio they prefer.

When selecting a radio, be sure it can both transmit and receive on the FRS (Family Radio Service) and GRMS (General Mobil Radio Service) bands. FRS band and is limited to 2 watts transmit power on channels 1-7 and 15-22. GRMS band allows up to 50 watts of power on channels 15-22, but it requires an FCC license to transmit at those frequencies. Some radios will limit the power output based upon the channel you are using; other radios give you the opportunity to set the power output in the programing.

The FCC (Federal Communications Commission) license application process is simple. There are no tests, and a 10-year license costs about \$70 and is renewable for an additional fee. The official website for the FCC Universal Licensing System (ULS) is https://wireless.fcc.gov/uls/.

Tom Matano, called the 'Father of the Mazda Miata,' has Died





Respected car designer Tsutomu "Tom" Matano has died at 76 years old on September 20, 2025.


Tom Matano held several design-related positions at General Motors and BMW early in his career, but he's best remembered for designing Mazda sports cars in the 1980s, including the original MX-5 Miata.

Matano was born in Nagasaki, Japan, in 1947. He studied engineering in Japan and moved to the United States in late 1969. His trip across the Pacific was an unusual one: Instead of taking a plane, he traveled across the ocean on a freighter owned by his grandfather's company. Matano enrolled in the Art Center College of Design in Pasadena, California, in 1971 and landed a job at General Motors in Detroit shortly after graduating. The sketch that got him hired was "a futuristic-looking rendering of a 1974 Pontiac."

General Motors later transferred Matano to its Holden division in Melbourne, Australia. His next stop was Munich, Germany, where he worked for BMW and played a role in shaping Series the 3. He left because he didn't like the cold weather in Munich.

Luckily, his next gig took him to a part of the world where the winters are much milder: Irvine, California, where Mazda's North American arm operated a design studio. Armed with talent and a strong work ethic, Matano rose through the ranks in Mazda's North American division. He started as Chief Designer, later became Vice President of Design and Executive Vice President of Western Operations, and ultimately moved up to Executive Designer and Director. He moved back to Japan in 1999 to work in Mazda's headquarters and entered the new millennium as head of global design

Editors note.: In 2009, at the Miata World II gathering n Grapevine, many of our members had the pleasure of meeting and talking with Mr. Matano at the Texas World Speedway. Some even got his autograph inside their trunks! We all have a lot of reasons to appreciate this man's life. RIP Matanosan


....and in November
