

Becoming a Disciple of Jesus...

Becoming a Disciple...

Let's look at the earliest of the disciples and some of their experiences of Jesus.

Take a look at the disciples actions in the following passage from Mark:

¹⁴ Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, ¹⁵ and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news."

¹⁶ As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. ¹⁷ And Jesus said to them, "Follow me and I will make you fish for people." ¹⁸ And immediately they left their nets and followed him. ¹⁹ As he went a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John, who were in their boat mending the nets. ²⁰ Immediately he called them; and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men, and followed him.

Think of other stories that take place at the same time as this, found in other Gospels, that show us more about the calling of the disciples. What can you learn from them?

The home of Peter was located just a few yards to the right of this picture and the shoreline of the Sea of Galilee about 100 yards away.

FINDING A SAFE PLACE...
