# We met (or exceeded) all of the goals set last year, except one!

No luck yet, but we did find a recycling box whose profits go to a community hygiene bank. (Less than 20% of our clothing is discarded in this way.)

# **The Clothesline Success Story**

2023 was an exciting year of growth and development for the Community Clothesline. Thanks to a donation from **The Lions Club of Brockport**, we had the funds to file for our 501c3 title with the IRS. This bestows official non-profit,tax-exempt status on the organization and allows our partners to declare tax deductions for financial and in-kind donations.

The Lewis Tree Landscaping Company graciously funded a year's lease on a storage unit to house our rapidly expanding inventory! Brockport Carpeting donated carpeting to keep the storage unit clean and dry. The Hygiene Bank of Clarkson provided additional shelving, and The Brockport Lions Club purchased the storage totes.

## Like they say, it takes a village!

We now collaborate with 42 service organizations throughout Western New York. We envision The Community Clothesline not as a clothing shelf, but as a distribution hub. Clothing shelves are wonderful resources, (we collaborate with many!), but we saw the need for support services for the community organizations throughout the Greater Rochester Area. Social workers, case

managers, program directors, etc. simply do not have the staffing, time or money to coordinate the collection, sorting, and redistribution of donated clothing to their clients. And many of those clients cannot access the clothing shelves. We serve individuals and families, but our main focus is providing the management piece of the recycling and redistribution for service organizations.

Clothesline clothes are always free. Organizations place their orders and we pull from our inventory and deliver directly to the individuals or groups. We also participate in public events like health fairs and street outreach, and operate "pop-up" shops in under-resourced areas.

## **New Endeavors in 2023**



**Shower Boxes!** This year, the Father Tracey Advocacy Center received a grant to acquire a mobile shower bus that will schedule stops throughout the City of Rochester, providing a hot shower to the unsheltered or anyone in need. The Clothesline created "shower boxes" to distribute. Each box, labeled by size and gender, contains a fresh, clean outfit comprised of underwear, t-shirt, sweatshirt, and sweatpants and socks. We also provided flip-flops and towels for the shower program.



## Baby Boxes, Too!

The Clothesline creates baby boxes for new and expectant moms. Each box contains an outfit with accessories like booties, bibs, hats, wash-cloths, etc., plus an infant book and toy.



## **Upcycled Crafts!**

This past fall, the Clothesline was invited to participate in the **Town of Henrietta's** *Make A Difference Day.* Shirley Wiegert, our volunteer craftsperson who specializes in recycling and upcyling used textiles, ran a workshop for the kids, building hand puppets from donated socks! Near Christmas, Shirley made snowmen from used socks to give out at **Rush-Henrietta School District's** family night for newly arrived immigrants.



## **Year-round Employee Clothes Drive!**

In addition to funding our storage unit, **The Lewis Tree Landscaping Company** keeps a Community Clothesline donation box in their of-

fices. Everyone on staff has been extremely generous; we have picked up numerous carloads of both new and used clothing.

## **Teen Trends!**

The Clothesline distributes our more youthful fashions to the clothes closets at All-City High and East High in Rochester. We also collaborated with Brockport Baptist Church to bring prom dresses to Young Womens College Prep Charter School.

# **On the Horizon**

## **GOALS FOR 2024:**

- Pursue one central office/warehouse for all facets of running the Clothesline
- Research grant opportunities
- Obtain an intern
- Increase volunteer staff, formalize training
- Increase collaboration with churches
- Expand services in rural areas/migrant programs
- Develop Spanish language marketing materials
- Create presentation materials

Our number one goal for 2024 is locating a larger space in which all the needs of the Community Clothesline can be served. We currently store our inventory in three different places, all of which are unheated! On a typical day, we drive ten miles between these storage areas, pulling the necessary order items, stuffing our cars full, driving back to our homes to sort, or bundling up and doing it on-site in the elements. When we first started two years ago, working out of our homes was not an issue, but now that we serve so many, we need a single, large, dry space to house all our inventory with heat and lights and the room for volunteers to work. This would allow our operations to run much more efficiently. Please let us know if you or your organization knows of a possible site.

Now that we have received our 501c3 status, pursuing non-profit grants is possible. We have experienced first-hand the very real need for this service in our communities. With more resources, we know we can do more. The Community Clothesline is a wonderful, joyful endeavor; we expect 2024 to be another year of continued growth and success.
