SYNOPSIS

This is a thrilling, coming-of-age adventure about Lydon (21), an impressionable South African farm boy who aspires to explore the world, but lacks the courage to take the first step. Until he encounters the magnetic Mozzie (21), a death-defying Australian backpacker who convinces Lydon to tag-along on his quest to surf every country up the war-torn west coast of Africa.

On the road, Mozzie's western entitlement sparks backlash from authorities, culminating in their false arrest in the Democratic Republic of Congo for plotting to assassinate the President. Detained indefinitely in a corrupt and inhumane Intelligence Agency prison, Lydon suffers the cost of blindly following others. So with the help of a South African Diplomat, he secures their release on the condition they are deported home.

But Mozzie breaks out of the embassy safe house to continue on illegally, triggering Lydon to confront him by the crocodile-infested Congo River and ultimately turn the tables... becoming the shepherd for Mozzie to follow.

AN Aussie surfer survived 25 days in a notorious Democratic Republic of Congo prison cell after a travelling adventure went horribly wrong.

It took an extraordinary diplomatic effort by three nations — and his determined mum — to make sure Jayden Irving made it safely home.

The 22-year-old from Carrum Downs feared he would die in the hellhole that harboured mass murderers, war lords and the central African regime's political enemies.

In a chance meeting in a South African hostel near the country's surfing mecca of Jeffreys Bay, he convinced Lydon Alves to join him.

On their seven-month journey the surfers managed to talk and charm their way into areas where most white foreigners were forbidden.

They travelled like locals spending three days on the back of an over-crowded truck with their surfboards as they took the long road inland through the Democratic Republic of Congo.

When they reached the beach they set up camp in Museud.

two days of imprisonment in Kinshasa. With his strength wavering he knew he needed to take drastic action. He faked

needed to take drastic action. He faked a seizure in his prison cell, forcing guards to provide him with medical attention and a meal of beans and rice.

Twice Mr Irving came close to freedom. Both times he was released from detention, boarded a boat to cross the river Congo into the next country and each time the boat was recalled for him to be arrested again.

It was after that he managed to get word to his parents. The receipt of that

LYDON ALVES • 21 • SOUTH AFRICAN

A Brits boy, Lydon was brought up in a very traditional patriarchy - three generations under the one roof - with his strict, well-meaning grandpa at the helm. This meant he was raised a devout Catholic who did as he was told.

It also meant his entire life was mapped out for him. Since his grandpa was a farmer, and his father was a farmer, Lydon was destined to continue their proud legacy. Having lived a very sheltered life, including being homeschooled through his secondary years, Lydon found no reason to question the status quo or look beyond his insular existence.

After a lean year, Grandpa realized the family needed to diversify, so he instructed Lydon (then 20) to study a Ranger course and found him a position at a nearby game park; only ever meant to be a fallback. Lydon flourished, as he encountered tourists from around the globe who expanded his mind with their cool accents and even cooler travel stories. This experience gave birth to a wanderlust. A fuse waiting to be lit...

Enter Mozzie, a young, irrepressible Aussie traveller who takes Lydon under his wing, sweeping him off on an unexpected adventure.


On the road, Lydon discovers there's fun to be had in going with the flow and comes out of his shell. The rite of passage inspires, delights, and tests him like nothing before; ultimately pushing him within an inch of his life and putting him at odds with Mozzie.

In the end, Lydon comes to realise that he deserves whatever life *he* chooses. Blindly following others is not only the coward's way, it's potentially dangerous. For as long as he can remember he'd been a sheep... throughout this journey he becomes his own man. Even if it means charging towards confrontation, breaking the rules, and defying others' expectations.

Ironically, what Lydon learns about life is that people are more likely to respect him for speaking his truth. If they don't, at least he will respect himself. And isn't that more fulfilling?

JAYDEN "MOZZIE" IRVING • 21 • AUSTRALIAN

Mozzie grew up in the Victorian surfing mecca of Phillip Island. As a child, he dreamed big and showed little regard for authority. Just ask his teachers. But his silver-tongue kept him out of any serious trouble. When he turned 12 his idyllic existence was thrown into turmoil upon learning his brother had cancer. Fortunately, his brother got better. Forever the survivor. But where did that leave Mozzie?

Determined to make something of himself, he devised an expedition to hitchhike up the West Coast of Africa - from South Africa to Morocco - surfing every country along the way. All the while, hinging his self-worth on the success or failure of this death-defying endeavour... a recipe for disaster. And that's when we meet him in the story.

Mozzie wants someone to tag along for validation, and Lydon takes the bait. He is charmed by the magnetic Aussie - who effortlessly projects self-assurance and reckless abandon - everything Lydon lacks. But there is a dark underside to Mozzie...

One that reeks of entitlement. You see, Mozzie is accustomed to getting his own way and strives to control situations. But as the proverb goes: "Africa doesn't adapt to you, you have to adapt to Africa". And so Mozzie is constantly at odds with his surroundings. His quest quickly becomes an unhealthy obsession... that spirals into addiction. For someone who preaches "Life's a journey" he is hell-bent on reaching the destination at any cost; even if it means knowingly breaking the law, or putting both their lives at risk.

Surprisingly, Mozzie's reckoning doesn't come in the form of gun-toting Military Police, or time spent in a top security prison... it comes from Lydon. Who imparts that it's good to follow your own path (something he's recently learned) but not if it disregards the needs of others.

If Mozzie accepts that, he might even come to appreciate that his worth has nothing to do with finishing the trip... It has everything to do with the quality of his heart.















BRETT • 50s • LYDON'S FATHER

When he was in his late 20s, a travel opportunity came knocking... but it wasn't the adventure he hoping for. Conscripted to fight in the Border War, Brett travelled to Angola where he experienced horrors he would never forget. No matter how much he'd hit the bottle.

Upon his return he closed down. That fun-loving part of him was gone. All he had left to keep him going was his wife and newborn son. And so he put all his energy towards caring for them, the only way he knew how... By caring for the family farm.

Years later when Lydon confronts him with his passion to travel throughout Africa, it brings up a kaleidoscope of emotions: regret, shame, but above all, fear of losing the thing that matters to him most... Lydon.

LIS • 50s • LYDON'S MOTHER

Going to war was Brett's duty. Staying loyal to him in the aftermath was hers. As the cool-headed parent, Lis expertly played the role of mediator in the household. She believed Lydon needed space to grow into who he is supposed to be. Her husband believed Lydon needed direction and discipline. So she treaded lightly, softly encouraging Lydon to find himself; a quiet allie.

When her son has the opportunity to travel up the West Coast of Africa, she sees it as a chance for him to self-realise and lends her full support. Yes, she worries about him when he's gone, but for the most part her heart rejoices for him: he's finally living his life on his own terms.

LYDON'S GRANDPA • 70s

Grandpa migrated from Portugal for a better life and found one on a small farm in Johannesburg, South Africa. He bought the ticket, took the ride, and fate rewarded his leap of faith and tireless work ethic with a loving family and a sustainable business. Grandpa didn't amalgamate easily to South African culture. He brought his Latin tendencies and traditional values with him. But age has softened him.

When we meet him he is in the twilight of his life, segueing from tyrannical dictator to supportive Grandpa. And time is precious... A cancer is growing inside him. So when Lydon expresses his desire to go on an adventure - as he himself did by flying to South Africa - Grandpa gives the taut nod of approval.

Throughout her 20s Charlise learnt French as a second language and daydreamed about becoming a diplomat stationed in Paris, sipping cocktails by the Louvre. But life had other plans.

Every young diplomat is given a hardship post, where they are sent to a 3rd world country. It's a proving ground. During her placement, a light bulb went off... it's places like this where she can do the most good. And so from that moment on, if there was ever an assignment that had other diplomats running in the opposite direction, she would accept it with open arms. Such was her compassion.

But don't for one second mistake that for softness.

She's anything but: strong, brave, manipulative and ruthless in her pursuit of justice. A pitch-perfect judge of character, in an instant she will know you better than you know yourself. And if the job calls for it she won't hesitate to use that information against you.

Better than anyone, she understands the corruption and hostile political climate of the DRC. But she also sees beyond that. To the individuals. Who are caring and compassionate.

So the thought of two privileged westerners selfishly traipsing around their country, flaunting their wealth and devil-may-care attitudes, doesn't sit well with her. If that is in fact why they are there in the first place.

One thing's for sure, she'll get to the truth.

CAPTAIN ZEUS • 50s • DRC

The Democratic Republic of the Congo was locked in a decade long civil war until 2003, and is still plagued by violence from Rebel Groups. So it's little wonder that war is Zeus' life.

A grizzled, career military man, Zeus worked his way up the ranks to become a feared and well-respected Captain. In his world, corruption and extortion runs rife. And he is not immune. Zeus doesn't see it as wrong. He sees it as getting his deserved slice of the pie. The West sure takes their piece. Zeus is very aware of Africa's past. And carries the pain of it.

Zeus works for the Agence Nationale de Reseignements (ANR), a government intelligence agency of the DRC. It has 11,931 employees, organized into three departments, sub-divided into directorates, divisions, sections and offices.

And it is notorious for human rights violations.

Officially their role is to ensure security of the state. Unofficially, it's to do the bidding of their dictator, President Kabila. This means elliminating threats to his regime. Their method? Spying on the people.

Undercover operatives are everywhere; watching journalists, opposition politicians and university lecturers. They even pose as taxi driver's, and if locals speak ill of the President they lock them up... or worse.

At ANR Detention Centre they beat, starve and psychologically break prisoners. They're known to force inmates to stare at the sun until they go blind.

Too often, prisoners are kept in endless purgatory: never given a trial date, nor hope of release. ANR are Judge, Jury and Executioner, and they trade on fear and intimidation. Families of those who have died in ANR custody stay silent, for fear of persecution.

Their prison cell structure is hierarchical, separated into three tiers. The poor are kept in an overcrowded cage. The white-collar criminals are in a "2nd class" cell, where they are given more food and exercise per day. And the "VIP cell" caters to one or two high profile criminals.

Zeus works within The Department of Homeland Security (DSI), and is responsible for internal intelligence and state security, working with the relevant prosecution services: the Navy and the National Police.

Within the department, he is part of the Special Branch Investigations and Research unit, involved in the arrests of journalists and opposition politicians.

Zeus is based at the ANR Detention Centre, but often travels to Banana Naval Base to conduct business.


This is where he first encounters Mozzie and Lydon. They represent everything he loathes about the West.

Will he condemn them for what they represent?


Or learn to put aside his deep-seeded prejudice and treat them as individuals?

LACHLAN RYAN • WRITER/PRODUCER



When not cutting social content for his fellow countryman Chris Hemsworth, Lachlan Ryan is writing and directing up a storm.

At 23, Lachlan wrote, produced and directed the theatrically released sporting comedy REVERSE RUNNER, executive produced by Stephen Herek (director of MR. HOLLAND'S OPUS). It was distributed nationally on all home entertainment platforms and was the highest grossing film of all time... at Colac Cinema, which may or may not be Lachlan's home town (pop. 12,457).

Lachlan most recently wrote, produced and directed the short DOG DATE AFTERNOON, a family comedy that screened at Heartland's Indy Fest, Flickerfest and Top Dog Film Festival. He previously directed the Screen Australia funded BIG CITY, which moved hearts and minds at Tribeca, LA Shorts, Urbanworld, Short Shorts, Austin Film Festival and MIFF (as part of the prestigious Accelerator Lab for emerging directors), winning Best Drama and Audience Choice at Freshflix.

Lachlan also co-wrote and directed the season finale of ANTISOCIAL, a high-concept lowbrow web series that amassed more than 10 million views online.

During his time as Drama Development Manager at The Film Company (LITTLE FISH), Lachlan associate produced the Australian family comedy ODDBALL, working closely with Practical Pictures' Craig Perry and Sheila Hanahan Taylor (FINAL DESTINATION, AMERICAN PIE) to create a box office hit. He has been a shooter-producer at WTFN Entertainment (one of Australia's largest independent production companies) and has won multiple festival awards for his shorts.

Alongside his film projects, he has three chickens, two golden retrievers, and one daughter in development.

Jayden Irving is a Creative Arts graduate of La Trobe
University. Whilst studying, Jayden was headhunted to
join broadcast media and livestream company MY
SPORT LIVE, shooting events such as State sports,

Producer and Livestream Director for NRG TV.
However, his dream was always to be a stuntman...

Now, Jayden has been a graded stunt performer for over 7 years with a myriad of International credits. He is currently working in Thailand as the lead stunt double to Charlie Hunnam in the TV Adaptation of the international best selling book, SHANTARAM.

Jayden AKA Mozzie also happens to be the real life subject of this film, and as such, has incredible first hand knowledge to share with the production.


TYGE LANDA • DOP/PRODUCER


