Fortunately, both Bunco and Layla have found homes but check out Rosey, John Wayne, and Pretzel!


It's not over yet folks, shelters across the country are full to the brim and more dogs are dying due to lack of space.

Here at HSIMC we are not far away from capacity, with only a few open kennels left we need fosters and adopters to come help so we can keep meeting the needs of the animals in our community.

In addition, we are very low on funds and with more animals coming in this year than prior years, we need our community to rally around the rescue community and help out by volunteering, fostering, adopting, donating and spreading awareness of the crisis shelters are facing.

Sir Charming the Resilient

Charming was found in Lakeport back in February and we were all in love with him from the moment we met him. A really big cat with an even bigger heart, Charming quickly became a staff and volunteer favorite.

A few weeks after joining us, we noticed him limping when using his right rear leg. A quick visit with our vet and some X-rays later, it was discovered that Charming had an old fracture in his leg that hadn't healed correctly and was causing him discomfort.

We were faced with two options: amputate his leg or try to repair it. Thanks to Dr. Holmes at Wasson Memorial, we were able to do the latter!



It was a long healing process, but he slowly started getting his strength back in his leg. He became the unofficial cattery greeter, rubbing up on everyone who came to visit in hopes of scoring some love.

His forever family was one of many to fall for this dreamboat of a cat and decided they couldn't go home without him. Now he's getting all the love he rightly deserves.

Our Experience with Feline Panleukopenia



This year we had our first onsite encounter with Feline Panleukopenia (FPV) in at least 6 years. We had taken in two cats, one pregnant and one with a litter of young kittens, who had carried the virus into the shelter with them. Luckily, due to their new status and with young kittens, contact with them was limited to prevent spread of illnesses from other cats or vice versa.

Two weeks after their intake, the first symptoms of Pan Leuk came up and we immediately tested all the litters in the room. The room was isolated and treatment on the affected kittens was started immediately.

With careful treatment and isolation, there was very minimal loss of neonatal kittens who were too young to be vaccinated. All adult cats and older kittens were not affected.

Feline Panleukopenia is very similar to Canine Parvovirus in the way that it attacks its host's body and hides out until the animal begins to fade. It is very contagious and unfortunately due to that fact many shelters euthanize all infected and exposed cats and dogs with either of the viruses.

Did you know that Panleukopenia has a 90% survival rate in cats and kittens when treatment is started early and done properly?

Panleukopenia can also be prevented by vaccinating your cats and kittens, even if they only live indoors. The vaccine is fairly cheap and easy to find at most feed stores, and there are many mobile vets that can help you keep your cat up to date.

Isa Browne & Janelle Schmidt - Where It All Started

Isa Browne is 70 years old and lives in Potter Valley. Her husband, Ivan Browne was lead singer of The Lemon Pipers, whose gold record in 1968 was "The Green Tambourine". Ivan and Isa's band played across the US before settling in Mendocino County in 1984. These were the first things I learned about her. But her passion for saving animals is the driving force in her life.

In the early 80s, Isa with her friend and co-founder, Janelle Schmidt, started in a tiny office on Clara Ave. in Ukiah. The incorporation papers for the Domestic Animal Protection Society – "DAPS" were drawn up by Dr. Sara Rice, Mendocino Animal Hospital, Dr. Dave Crew, Yokayo Vet Clinic and Jane Ball, attorney.



The sole focus of DAPS was for spay and neuter services. They sold used books and had a rummage sale room to raise shelter funds. They trained and appointed four CA state humane officers to respond to animal abuse and neglect complaints. Isa worked closely with sheriff and police departments on local animal abuse issues. But she also lobbied in Sacramento for animal legislation to prevent animal use in research.

This led to nationwide Senate Pet Protection Act S1457 and companion bill HR778 which prohibits federally funded shelters from selling homeless animals to the research industry. They had a very committed and active volunteer board and a huge membership group. During this time, the board of directors were Cathy Ortiz - Treasurer, John Record - President (also CA state humane officer), Louis Rohlicek - board member and Isa Browne - secretary.

In 1989, with membership approval, the name was changed to the Humane Society for Inland Mendocino County and the goal was to build an animal shelter. In 1990, they lost their small office in Ukiah and moved into the home of their office manager, where they remained for a year and a half.

In 1991, they received a large donation from one of their members, Beatrice Breese, to purchase property to build a shelter. The benefactor required that the shelter be built between Ukiah and Willits to make it accessible to the largest population in inland Mendocino County. Isa located the property at 9700 Uva Drive location which met Bea Breese's wishes and where HSIMC now stands.

Isa has spent the last 18 years at the Main St. Veterinary Clinic in Lakeport. She also honored us by being the HSIMC Grand Marshall in the Black Bart Parade on July 2nd. Isa wanted her story to stay positive and not linger on all the dark times she experienced and the battles she fought trying to make her dreams come true in Mendocino County. Her ultimate goal was always to:

"Create a kinder world for animals and a less painful one for those who love them".

Story from an Volunteer / Adopter

I was a proud owner of 4 Doxies, 3 girls & a boy. One of them was my wish, a runt girl. Unfortunately, due to a medical error, I had to put her down at a young age. Before I did, I held her in my arms and told her that she could come back any time. We loved each other so much.

To get through this difficult time, I started helping the HSIMC with special events plus stopping by once a month to donate funds I created. About a year and half went by.

It was early May when I stopped in, about 4pm, to make a donation. All of a sudden this tiny emaciated black Chihuahua (she was found in the forest the day before) flew into my arms after climbing up & over a puppy fence to get to me! She wouldn't let me put her down...Brakes were on!!!

STAFF SPOTLIGHT

Emily Jones: Animal Care Technician



I started working here in December 2020. I saw a FB job posting. I volunteered at the shelter when I was in high school, and it was my dream job to work here. I actually started working the day I interviewed!

My job involves overseeing care of the cats. I assist with adoptions, meds, feeding and greeting potential adoptees, assessing their applications, and ensuring that the cat they choose is a good fit for their home life.

I love my co-workers. We have an amazing team and I get to cuddle and interact with sweet cats and kittens all day long!

The hardest part of my job is dealing with sad surrenders, cats with severe medical issues especially when they don't make it. Sometimes, it's frustrating when you've worked through cat illnesses and then something else comes up and we have to start all over with healthcare.

When I'm not working, I enjoy video games. It distracts me from all the activities at work. I like dinners with friends and hanging out with my animals. I have a dog that I got as a teenager and a cat that I got from the shelter.

My idea for shelter improvements would be to have a paid or volunteer receptionist. We all recognize how difficult it is for the public to communicate when everyone here is focused on the care of the animals.

We encourage people to come to the shelter during our open hours as that's the best way to get your voice heard.

Rafael Batres: Animal Care Technician

I assist with intakes, daily care, meds, feeding, nightly routines, adoptions, surrenders, medical transports to / from vets.

I started working here in September 2019, just before Covid hit. We had to continue working through Covid with very few employees and little to no volunteers. We still had animals coming in. The shelter had to shut down and by adoption appointments only with a very high level of sanitation and caution. We had lots of adoptions and we worried about returns after Covid, but we haven't really seen that.

I volunteered in other shelters when I was younger. But they were very corporate environments, and were more concerned about the financial bottom line, than the welfare of the animals. I'm so proud that whatever we are doing is a path to success. It works! Most employees are here because they truly love what they're doing. And I truly love what I'm doing!



It's scary to think of not being here. But I never wanted to work in a different environment. I appreciate the open and honest communications within the dog management. I know what's expected of me and like being able to work independently but also as a team member.

When I was younger, I wanted to move away from my family and get out and experience the world. But now when I'm not at work I enjoy being with my family. We do a lot of outside activities together - hiking, going to the lake, movies, biking. And I love spending time with my 2 dogs and 1 cat.

If I could suggest anything to improve the shelter it would be to have a better winter process. We're not an inside shelter like many of the urban shelters. We're a very rural shelter. We hate leaving dogs outside in bad weather. I realize that it all takes time and money, and we're working towards that. But I would love it if every animal could be inside at night.

I love animals, I've always loved working with animals. I've had other jobs that were inside, but I always knew that working with animals was my passion. I'm excited to be starting back to school in fall to finish my degree as an animal technician.

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What We're Doing

It's always a busy time at HSIMC, lots of new cat and dog intakes, with this year's kitten season especially active. But, as always our team of employees and volunteers are actively behind the scenes improvising and coming up with new and innovative ways to manage activities. I'd like to share just a few of the activities that we currently have underway.

1. We use a product called Rescue to sanitize and clean our cat facility, this is a solution that needs to be precisely measured and diluted with water to form a mixture. Too little solution makes it ineffective, too much doesn't add any increased potency, it's just wasted material. The price of Rescue along with everything else has increased and was putting a nice little dent in our budget.

We noticed over a period that the usage of Rescue had increased, and it just didn't seem right. The employees got together to examine this issue and concluded that the procedure in place requiring manual measuring and mixing was prone to humane error and causing the over usage of materials.

The solution adopted was to install a dispensing station that pre-mixes the solution from an inline water system, eliminating the potential for measuring errors. This saves employee time, no more stopping to measure and mix, reduces the possibility of waste through over usage and we believe it will help to save HSIMC several hundreds of dollars per year. Just a simple, but very effective example of how we plan to implement improvements.

2. Another big project that we have recently undertaken is how we view our electrical power consumption. Much of our grid infrastructure is very old and potentially a safety issue. Our first phase will be to upgrade and expand capacity and provide us with the flexibility to isolate power to each of our buildings. We will install new larger electrical panels, new breakers and do some general wiring clean-up. Our eye is on future expansion, and we will ensure that to-day's work supports the needs of tomorrow.

Next phases will be a standby generator with transfer switch and SOLAR PANELS. As you might imagine HSIMC is a large consumer of energy, we have already begun the conversion to LED lighting and should have this 100% converted very shortly.

We want to minimize our power expense and reduce our carbon footprint. Yes, solar will require investment, but we expect a fairly short payment period and then NO electrical bills for many years into the future. By now you may have seen the fundraiser for this 1st phase, and we always appreciate your generous support.

- 3. On the construction side, we do a lot of cleaning and sanitizing of food and water bowls for cats and dogs. At the cattery, most of this cleaning is done in a makeshift outdoor area which is exposed to the elements. On tap to begin very soon will be building an enclosed area with washing facilities and proper drainage.
- 4. Next time you visit the center, take a look around, we have new and very colorful signage for all of the buildings, plans to install benches in shaded portions of the dog walk fields (these benches will be available for sponsorship) upcoming tree trimming/maintenance and many other projects scheduled to improve the safety and brighten up our facility.

Next issue, I hope to share some exciting news about a community initiative sponsored by HSIMC to launch animal education and outreach to our younger citizens. *Stay tuned!*
