FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

Our community in Redwood Valley, along with so many neighboring communities, suffered devastating losses during the recent wildfires. Although we were in fear for the shelter initially, we were one of the lucky residents. Headed up by our Shelter Coordinator, Monica Carnahan, the shelter animals were evacuated when the fire jumped Highway 101 into Reeves Canyon just a few miles north of the shelter. We wish to thank all of the volunteers who pitched in to help in the wee hours of the morning to get all of the shelter dogs and cats to safety. Originally taken to both Blue Ribbon Pets and the county shelter, the animals were soon relocated to the loving home of Morgan Young Knight and her children, where Monica and her daughter also reside. With the assistance they received from shelter staff and volunteers, and each of their children, the animals were loved and cared for around the clock. The animals were all returned to the shelter within a few days, safe and sound.

So many people who have been supportive of the shelter animals over the past 25 years have suffered and our hearts continue to go out to each and every one of you. Because our supporters, staff, board members, volunteers and community faced such tragedy, we made the decision to cancel our annual Wine, Kibble & Bids dinner fundraiser and focus on helping those affected by the loss of loved ones and family pets, wildfire devastation and evacuations. Please accept our condolences.

We would like to extend our heartfelt wish for a safe holiday season filled with healing and lifted spirits in our community and neighboring communities. We are thankful for our friends and feel fortunate that we are able to continue with our mission of helping displaced pets in our community.

May 2018 bring only tail wags and kitty purrs.

Two years ago, an itty bitty, teeny weeny, tiny black kitten came to the shelter. She was extremely ill from exposure and starvation. However, fate dropped her into the magical hands of a very determined and kind-hearted woman named Taffy. Lo and behold, it recovered, as have many who Taffy has nursed back to health over the almost twenty years she has been volunteering at the shelter. Taffy, and her husband, Terry, have volunteered for many years, helping in whatever capacity was necessary, with Taffy focusing on running the cattery (sometimes single-handedly), and Terry bringing wonderful attention to our little slice of heaven of a shelter through radio ads that he and Jim Mayfield recorded to beautiful ads in the Hometown Shopper and Cost Cutters circular. Well, long story short, that little ragamuffin had touched Taffy and Terry's hearts more than the hundreds before and "Whiskers" became a permanent part of the Montgomery family. With teary eyes and thankful hearts all we can say is Whiskers decided to return the favor. It was the persistency of Whisker's meowing, running around the room and jumping on and off the bed, that made Taffy get out of bed the night of the fire. Their house was already surrounded in flames and as they backed out of their burning garage and down the hill from above Golden Vineyards . . . their arrival to safety because of that little black kitty. Guess fate really did bring Whiskers to Taffy.



SAYING GOODBYE TO SHI AND ARGUS

Twelve or more years ago Shi, a young, black and white collie-cross female, was surrendered to the shelter. She, unfortunately, had some significant "issues" and it was determined over some time that it would be unsafe for her and the public to adopt her out. Instead, this beautiful girl had her forever home at the shelter. She loved people and many people loved her, interacted with her, spoiled her, took her on long walks, and would just sit and brush her. Joan Wade was Shi's biggest fan. For a number of years Joan would come almost daily to take Shi out of her kennel to be walked and given special attention. After Joan's passing many other volunteers stepped in to make sure Shi continued to have special treatment. Earlier this spring it was obvious that Shi was failing and in pain. She was put to rest on May 21 and a celebration of her life was held at the shelter by many of her friends. Two of her favorite things were her stuffed kongs and her little swimming pool.

We were still having trouble looking at Shi's empty kennel when Argus left our world at age 12 due to cancer. He had been a magnificent presence at the shelter since 2009, when he showed up dragging a heavy chain around his neck. He was a big, exuberant Malamute cross. He was adopted out twice, but Argus liked to live life with "zest" so he was a bit too much of a challenge that adopters couldn't overcome. So, he became a very loved dog at the shelter and a staff and volunteer favorite. He loved everyone, and despite undeniable power, was as gentle as a lamb when trotting down the path on a walk. Building a higher fence kept him contained, but with his introduction to Bella, she truly became his saving grace and he became hers, also!

LOUIE TO THE RESCUE

Someone once said that "The meaning of life is to find your gift. The purpose of life is to give it away". Well, our loveable Louie struggled a bit in the beginning finding his gift. Or, maybe it was the people in his life who struggled understanding what his gift was?! But the connection was made when representatives from "Field of Dreams", a training facility for the Natural Disaster Search Dog Foundation located in Oregon, came to meet Louie. After seeing Louie on our website and meeting him, they felt confident that he was a great candidate for the FEMA dog rescue program. After a few training exercises, their gut instincts were right. Some of you may have seen video of his rubble pile training that we shared on Facebook. Well, he not only passed his training at the facility in Oregon, but was transferred to the national headquarters in Roanoke, Virginia where he passed further testing and his physical with flying colors. Louie has not only found his gift, but as a FEMA search and rescue dog, his "purpose" will be lending aid to victims of natural disaster. We are proud and very happy for you Louie. Carry on dear fella.



MEET & GREET HAVEN

With wonderful imagination, and clever brainstorming, weekly dog walking volunteer Denise Mattos, her husband, Robert, and son, Cris, took it upon themselves to create a fun and functional "meet and greet" area for our small dogs. The area is shaded in the summer and dry in the winter and is located next to the small dog kennels. Cris was able to facilitate a donation of a 15 x 30 ft. roll of turf and generously paid for its delivery to the shelter. An anonymous source purchased a load of crushed granite, which was delivered free-of-charge thanks to Ron and Lisa DenBeste of DenBeste Landscape Supplies. Once all the materials had arrived, Robert Mattos and Tyler Benetto set to work prepping the area with the crushed granite in over 100° heat, soaking the ground as required and tamping in the materials. Final stages were done by Manny Cervantes, who set the turf, and William Breen, who helped with the finish work. The entire project was funded by donations, kind hearts & "love for the dogs" people power.
