
All of the arrangements for this visit were organized by these youngsters with only minimal help from their teacher. My how times have changed!

Tales from the Ukiah Dog Park How we met Simon, my dog's best friend by Justine Frederiksen

I had no intention of going into the dog park the day we met Simon. Still a brand-new dog owner who was nervous about everything, I was especially afraid of letting my completely untrained, 60-pound tornado off her leash anywhere in public, even inside a securely fenced area.

But as I tried to walk past the park, a sweet-looking dog ran up to the fence. Though he was very interested in meeting my dog, and she was just as interested in meeting him, I tried to remain outside.

I told his owner all my fears, but she just smiled them off, assuring me everything would be fine — and something about Noreen convinced me to take Ripley inside to play with Simon. That was not only cool, but one of the coolest things ever. Because we all fell in love that day: The dogs with each other, the humans watching them play.

Immediately, Simon and Ripley began wrestling and chasing each other like they were already the best of friends. And they stayed the best of friends for the next 10 years.

They bonded so well because they were both about a year old, and both herding dog mixes: Ripley a blend of German and McNab Shepherds, and Simon a cattle dog mixed with lab.

Herding dogs can play fast and rough, often intimidating other dogs who don't like to be chased, corralled, or even nipped, but Simon and Ripley got along so well that his owner Noreen and I began meeting regularly at the dog park so they could play.

Soon the dogs invented their own game we called The Ball Game. Simon would lie down with a tennis ball in his mouth, then Ripley would lie down next to him and try to pull the ball out. Simon would growl playfully, his stumpy tail wagging, as the dogs pulled on the ball, their heads bobbing back and forth. As the game progressed, Simon would lie on his back to give Ripley better access to the ball, while still keeping it firmly in his mouth.

When Noreen and I learned we lived only two blocks from each other, we started hosting playdates in our backyards, where the dogs were free to run, wrestle and play the Ball Game without interruption from other dogs. Sometimes Ripley would get the ball out, but most of the time the dogs were happy just to lie there together, "making out," for as long as us humans wanted to watch.

Over the next 10 years, Noreen and I walked our dogs together many times a week, so Simon and Ripley enjoyed hundreds of evening strolls together. We also traded pet-sitting duties, with her making many a road trip possible for my husband and me because of her volunteering to check on our cats. And those are just some of the countless good things created by that first play session in November of 2012.

Sad-but-happy update: I'm sad to report that Noreen died in early 2022 of cancer, but I am also happy to report that her daughter quickly found Simon another home. One of her friends in Oregon has a small child and wanted to adopt an older dog like Simon who was calm and already trained.

I miss both Noreen and Simon and I am very sad that Ripley and Simon don't get to see each other anymore. But I am so grateful for all the time we got to spend together and cannot thank Noreen enough for convincing me to go into the dog park that first day.

Postscript from Justine:

My dog Ripley, who is a female, was originally adopted from HSMC as a puppy. She was part of a litter of McNab mixes that came to the Redwood Valley shelter in late 2011/early 2012. I actually ended up meeting a male littermate of hers once, another chance encounter at the Ukiah dog park!

Ripley (not her original name) later ended up at the Ukiah Shelter when she was about a year old, which is when my husband and I adopted her. As for her pal Simon, I know he was also adopted from a shelter, but it wasn't the HSMC.

GIMP (Harley) - The little tripod that could!

Gimp was spicy and feisty when she first came to us, but she was also in really rough condition, so we definitely forgive her. One of her rear legs was broken and infected beyond saving, and the other was broken in two places that were repairable.

She had an extended stay with our friends over at Wasson Memorial, and they took great care of her! Gimp spent time recovering in a foster home and they fell in love with her and finalized her adoption in September of this year.

Her new name is “Harley” because her remaining back leg is utilized like a kickstand to keep her upright. She has many new friends and just loved her adopter, they are inseparable.

We are so happy to hear how beautiful Gimp’s (Harley’s) life is now!

Duke Finds a Family...

Our first adoption of the month was the one and only DUKE!! And just like that every single one of our hopes and dreams for this boy came true! But there is a lot more to this photo, and we want to tell you the story of what it really took to get Duke to this happy moment...

Duke's owner became terminally ill and could no longer care for him. He landed at a shelter with no skills to cope and ended up on the euthanasia list. He had many people looking out for him at that shelter and they refused to let him die, for that we are so thankful.

They reached out to us for help, and we agreed to pull him into our rescue and honor his owner's dying wish by trying to find Duke a home of his own. But it wasn't going to be easy.

Duke had spent months in a small kennel and by the time he arrived in our care he was rapidly deteriorating due to the stress of shelter life. Duke is a smart boy and he simply couldn't cope with being isolated in a cage. He was reactive to everyone who came to see him and spun in circles biting his tail to the point where we thought we would have to amputate it. Our staff and volunteers were worried sick and did our best to keep him happy but it wasn't working...



Then along came Glen.. Glen became Duke's Pet Pal and showed up every day for over a month to take Duke out for a walk and to enjoy time out of his kennel. Glen gave Duke the consistency and attention he needed to begin to transform. We saw him change right before our eyes. Every day with Glen produced a happier healthier Duke.. then one day Glen decided it was time to foster Duke and the real transformation began!

Outside of the shelter Duke thrived, the spinning stopped, his tail healed, he knew love again and he showed love right back. He learned how to play, and he is especially tender with Glen's mom, their sweet moments together brought tears to our eyes! There was no denying that Duke belonged in this home and lucky for Duke his foster family agreed. But that wasn't the end of the magic that was happening.

As much as Duke's life was being saved he was also helping Glen in his own way. Here is a note that Glen sent us shortly after he knew that Duke was there to stay:

"I wanted to say thank you to your team for the gift of helping me with the Duke. He has added so much to my life it's hard to put in words...I was as shut down as he was when I first met him.

Now we are walking every day, he sleeps with me, he checks on my mom and miss Elsa (although Elsa doesn't interact very much when he tries to get her to play)...after losing my Jack Russell Brewtus I didn't have a constant companion any longer...I was a bit lost...

Duke has erased all of the sadness...from many different issues...and without you two and your **"Pet Pals Program"** it would not have happened...I am going to try and register him as an emotional support animal because he truly is serving that purpose.

I am convinced that the Duke saved me from becoming a closed off hermit type old guy...I was headed in that direction...Anyway, from the bottom of my heart, thank you..."

Duke's story is the prime example of why HSMIC is so important to our community and the animals and people who need us!

Letter from our Board President

It's been another busy quarter as we participated or hosted a number of summer events, HSIMC was honored to be the Grand Marshall at the 60th annual **Black Bart** Parade in Redwood Valley, we participated in the **Bissell Foundation Summer Clear the Shelters** event, where over 10 days we adopted out 50 cats and dogs. Our **Kritter Karnival** was postponed from Sept 18 until Oct. 2 due to RAIN. KK is our biggest fundraising event of the year and as usual was a lot of fun. This year was extremely successful, the food was terrific, all the youngsters and adults had a great time and our very own Tom Allman served as MC. During this event we recognized all of our fosters and volunteers, but also singled out some of our more active participants, presenting them with a small token of appreciation for all of their help over the years.

We also continue to see very high demand for animal rescue, at any given time, dependent on how many pets are being fostered, we have anywhere between 250 to 350 cats and dogs under our care. When these high occupancy rates are realized there is very little choice but to limit further intakes until we can adopt or foster out more animals. This has occurred several times during the quarter as we reached our support capacity. We also experienced some very hot summer days where it is extremely difficult for our outside dogs to be comfortable in the heat. When any of these situations occur, we can always count on our community to support HSIMC as we attempt to work our way through these bottlenecks. For this assistance we are truly grateful and appreciative. There is always a need for fosters and volunteers, so come visit us and see how you can help. You will have a lot of fun, get lots of love and get a great deal of satisfaction for your efforts.

During this period, the HSIMC management team and the Board of Directors, in addition to all of the other activities that must be addressed, spent a considerable amount of time in determining goals that we would like to achieve in the near future. As you can imagine our potential list was quite long, as there are many things that need to be accomplished. In the end, we agreed to focus our energy in 3 areas:

- Grants – increasing our access to local and national funding

MISSION

We are looking at **The Great Reset** for our shelter.

As many of you may have heard, we made a plea for help - asking our community to rally for HSMC and our rescue community once again.

The past two years, we have pushed our facility and staff to the limit but have been unable to financially sustain the level of growth we have experienced. Calls for help in our community and surrounding communities have continued to increase, and our team has worked tirelessly to accommodate the number of animals needing help.

Other shelters around us are also feeling the pressure and are at capacity, overwhelmed and overworked; the needs for the homeless animals in our community are immeasurable and with limited resources there is only so many we can help.

In an effort to reevaluate, reorganize, and financially recover, we have halted all intakes for 6 weeks and we will reevaluate our situation in early November. We are looking at the long-term goals of our shelter, the needs of our community, and what we can realistically handle with our current resources.

When we look at best shelter practices, the goal is to keep animals in their home and out of the shelter and offering support to the community with pet pantry items and counseling has helped in many cases where surrendering an animal was considered. We will continue to offer this type of support to our community and hope it will continue to provide means to keep animals in their current home.

We have also implemented courtesy postings for our community to utilize as additional platform to assist in rehoming their animals - the application and animals available for adoption by owner can be found on our website: <https://mendohumanesociety.com/adoptions-by-owner>

We continue to follow APA Guidelines, American Pets Alive is a leader in the rescue community, to ensure we are keeping with best practices for the wellbeing of our animals and to ensure strong processes and procedures for the overall health and wellbeing of our dogs and cats as well as efficiencies in our processes.

During this period of evaluation and reset, we will focus on the animals currently in our care and work towards finding homes for our longer stay residents and special needs animals.

We would like to thank our:

- community of supporters for your continued support and understanding through this period of reset
- volunteers for continuing to advocate for the animals and helping with daily tasks, events and supporting our staff
- staff for rolling with the changes our shelter is facing and being open minded to moving forward in this ever-changing environment
