IT WAS A DAY! A "CAREAVAN" DAY!!! 🛲 🎌 🐾

Thanks to the incredible efforts of Dr. Burns and the team at Mendocino County Animal Care Services (MCACS), the NEW Mendocino County CAREAVAN made its debut journey to HSIMC! During this action-packed day, 23 cats and 11 dogs received spay/neuter surgeries, helping pave the way for 14 much-needed adoptions and preparing 20 more animals for their forever homes.

At HSIMC, every pet is spayed or neutered before adoption—a cornerstone of our mission to reduce pet overpopulation. This special surgery day gave us a much-needed boost as we work to finish the year strong.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to the CAREAVAN team—Dr. Burns, Sarah, Bliss, Maggie, Julie, and Sharron—along with our dedicated HSIMC staff, fosters, and volunteers. Your collaboration made this busy day seamless and successful.

IN MEMORY of ALFONSO: A COMMUNITY'S FIGHT to SAVE A LIFE



This past quarter, HSIMC faced a heartbreaking challenge that highlights both the immense love in our community and the difficult realities of animal rescue. Alfonso, a stray puppy who came into our care, tested positive for parvovirus—a devastating illness that can quickly claim the lives of young, under-vaccinated dogs.

When Alfonso's diagnosis was confirmed, our team acted swiftly to protect the other animals in our care and provide him with the best chance of survival. The options were stark: turn him away, euthanize him, or take immediate and costly action to save his life. True to our mission, we chose the third option, putting Alfonso at the forefront of our lifesaving efforts.

With the support of our wonderful community, we raised over \$6,000 in just a few days to begin his advanced treatment. He received monoclonal antibodies and fresh frozen plasma at Wasson Memorial Clinic, along with round-the-clock care from our team. For a moment, hope flickered. But despite every effort and intervention, Alfonso's condition worsened. His little body could not fight off the disease, and he passed away, surrounded by love and care.

Alfonso's story is a testament to the lengths we will go to for every animal who comes through our doors, no matter the odds. It also underscores the importance of community involvement and preventative care, like vaccinations, to protect vulnerable animals from diseases like parvo.

We want to thank everyone who donated, shared his story, and cheered Alfonso on. While we couldn't save him, his fight reminded us why we do what we do: every animal's life matters. And even in loss, your support helps us continue our mission to make a difference for the animals who need us most.





OFFSITE ADVENTURES! 🛸 🛹 🍩

HSIMC's leadership team headed out to attend an important meeting in Lake County this morning! Every year we receive hundreds of calls for help from our neighboring county and their success is very important to us. When they struggle, we struggle, and right now, like most of us, they are facing an overwhelming homeless pet problem, with very limited spay/neuter resources. But the community cares and this is a problem they want to solve!

It was exciting to be in a room full of animal lovers with many familiar faces and 40 people in attendance, all hoping to "fix" these problems! Way to go Lake County!

Today's meeting was all about Pet Fix - Lake County, a new collaboration between the <u>Clearlake Animal Association, SPCA of Lake County</u> and <u>Dogwood Animal Rescue</u> <u>Project</u>, based in Santa Rosa.

This core team from the three nonprofits have been working on logistics with Animal Balance for a few months, and are very excited to be able to offer low-cost spay/neuter programs to the community of Lake County!

A NEW INITIATIVE to keep dogs in homes - GOODPUP!!



Humane Society for Inland Mendocino County is excited to announce our partnership with the GoodPup dog training app! GoodPup offers customized, affordable, positive dog training that you can access from the comfort of your home, at a time that works for YOU.

We are really excited about the possibility of better-behaved dogs! (And fewer dogs that need new homes due to behavioral issues.) GoodPup offers one week of free training; there is no obligation, and users can cancel at any time. Here's what else to know:

• If you've ever adopted a dog from HSIMC, you can sign up for the GoodPup app, and get a lifetime discount off their services. (This is good for HSIMC fosters, volunteers, and staff members, too.)

For everyone who keeps up with GoodPup beyond the first week of training, HSIMC will receive \$40 from the company – whether the dog is from us or not! These funds will help us with our behavior program so we can continue to support the needs of our dogs who are onsite or in homes (Remember, that first week is free.)

We live in a rural community with limited resources to sound training techniques. We love that this virtual training experience can help people and their pups from the comfort of their own home.

We hope this helps some puppies learn how to be good dogs, and also helps some old dogs learn new tricks! Thank you, GoodPup!

One of our most successful fundraising efforts this year was the wreath-making project, led by **Cindy Huhn** and supported by our dedicated **elf volunteers**. In total, we created 144 wreaths, 35 swags, and dedicated over 300 volunteer hours, raising over \$9,000 for the shelter. This project is a perfect example of how donations of greenery, bows, and labor can translate into much-needed funds to support our mission.

Like many shelters, we continue to struggle with limited resources—whether it's donations, space, or adoptions. While we've had to limit intake and the number of animals coming through our gates, we're still focused on our blessings: our sweet, loving animals, many of whom have found their forever homes. Thank you to everyone who made space in their homes for a new family member!

What We're Doing/Mission

Thank you all for being part of our nonprofit rescue community and for continuing to follow our journey. As we close out another year, we reflect on the challenges we faced, the progress we made, and the lives we changed together.

This past year, we faced significant hurdles, particularly in securing enough spay/neuter appointments for our shelter animals. Additionally, we experienced a notable bottleneck with animals not moving out of the shelter and into homes. Large dogs, in particular, are becoming increasingly difficult to place, resulting in longer lengths of stay. This is not an isolated issue-many rescues and shelters across the country are grappling with similar challenges. The topic was a key focus at the 2024 Animal Welfare Conference, which part of our leadership team had the opportunity to attend. It was a valuable experience to connect with peers, share strategies, and seek solutions to this growing concern.

We also continue to face the overwhelming demand for assistance—both for animals and people—while navigating limited resources. Our team works tirelessly to meet this need, but the strain of balancing an increasing number of incoming animals with fewer leaving the shelter has been deeply felt. This imbalance underscores the critical need for more robust resources and community-driven programs to address these systemic issues.

These challenges ripple out to everyone in our community who seeks help from an overburdened system. We understand the frustration and heartbreak that can arise when resources fall short. That's why we ask everyone to remember that we are all in this together. Supporting one another with kindness and understanding can make a tremendous difference. While the challenges are significant, the strength of our community lies in its compassion and willingness to collaborate. Let's commit to lifting each other up as we navigate these difficult times together.

Together, we can build a stronger, more resilient community for both people and animals. Thank you for your continued compassion and support.

Key Accomplishments of 2024

<u>Employee Growth and Development:</u> One of the highlights of this past year has been the establishment of a fully funded training program for our staff. This fund has allowed our team to expand their knowledge of animal welfare through specialized courses and workshops. Additionally, we've implemented quarterly training sessions for all staff members, ensuring everyone stays updated on best practices in rescue operations. These trainings have already shown great promise in enhancing the quality of care we provide.

<u>Team Restructuring for Greater Impact</u>: As a small team, we each carry significant responsibilities. Recognizing the need to optimize our efforts, we restructured some of our roles. Becca, formerly our Dog Kennel Manager, has been promoted to Lifesaving Programs Manager. This new role allows her to oversee and coordinate critical lifesaving initiatives across the shelter. Her leadership has already brought increased consistency and innovation, helping both our staff and animals thrive. We also started a pilot program in 2024 to begin cross-training our dog and cat office teams to provide team collaboration and support.

<u>Community Engagement:</u> Thanks to your support, we've continued to raise awareness about the importance of adoption, fostering, and responsible pet ownership. Our seasonal campaigns, volunteer programs, and outreach efforts have inspired many to join us in our mission to save lives. Our leadership team is also finding ways to support outreach programs offering low cost or free services to the community. Our leadership team volunteered at a free microchip and vaccine clinic in Lake County and have plans to attend at least one of the Pet Fix clinics happening throughout 2025 in Lake County.

Looking Ahead to 2025

As we look ahead to 2025, we are filled with hope and determination. Key initiatives include:

<u>Advancing Staff Training</u>: Our leadership team is excited to attend Animal Expo 2025, where we will continue to build our knowledge base, this helps keep HSIMC operating as a progressive shelter by staying up to date on all things animal welfare. These opportunities allow us to stay at the forefront of best practices and bring innovative ideas back to our organization. We are also dedicated to providing ongoing education for our team and we aim to continue these efforts, expanding on cross-training to build a more collaborative and resilient team. This approach will enable us to work more efficiently and effectively, ensuring that every member of our team is equipped to handle the diverse challenges of animal welfare.

<u>Upgrading Animal Housing</u>: Another exciting initiative for the coming year is our commitment to upgrading our animal housing areas. These improvements will help us meet ASV (Association of Shelter Veterinarians) guidelines, ensuring that the animals in our care have safe, comfortable, and enriching environments. These upgrades are a vital step in our mission to provide the highest standard of care possible.
