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Tiftarea Celebration With Will Graham Reset For February



The Tiftarea Celebration with Will Graham has now been rescheduled for Feb. 5-7 at the UGA Tifton Campus Conference Center. Originally set for this past March, the free, evangelical outreach was postponed because of the coronavirus pandemic. The decision to move forward in February was reached jointly by celebration organizers and the venue. "Over the past several months, as we've looked at postponements in Tifton and in other cities, I've returned many times to Proverbs 19:21: 'Many are the plans in the mind of a man, but it is the purpose of the Lord that will stand,'" said, Graham, son of pastor Franklin Graham and grandson of evangelist Billy Graham. "God's timing is perfect, and the coronavirus didn't take Him by surprise. We had our

own plans, but they are nothing compared to His purpose. With so many people now searching for hope, peace, and comfort, we believe God has something big in store for the Tiftarea — something beyond what we could ask or imagine." Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic and subsequent quarantine, Graham has shared his Gospel message digitally through online celebrations, including a live outreach last week. The livestreams, which have featured award-winning musical artists such as Crowder, The Afters and Aaron Shust, have been viewed more than 820,000 times in more than 75 countries. More than 2,500 people have indicated making a decision for Jesus during the online messages. The Tiftarea Celebration will be Graham's first post-coronavirus in-person evangelistic outreach. "We are cautiously excited about the opportunity to move forward with the Tiftarea Celebration," said Bob Hickling, who is directing the local celebration on behalf of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association. "Together with UGA Tifton, we have been monitoring the coronavirus situation both locally and nationally, and feel that Feb. 5-7 offers a prime opportunity to meet. In uncertain days, we need the hope of Jesus as much as ever."

Tift Rec Director Craig Sowell Receives GRPA Hall Of Fame Award



Tift County Recreation Director Craig Sowell, at left in photo, has been named to the Georgia Recreation and Park Association (GRPA) Hall of Fame. Sowell was presented the Hall of Fame Award at GRPA's recent state conference. He has been with the county recreation department for 36 years and has been director since 1993. He told the Tifton Grapevine that it's "very humbling to be included in the Georgia Recreation and Park Association Hall of Fame past recipients. With support of God, my family, county staff and employees, citizenry, along with other recreation professionals that cared enough to nurture me along the way, together this recognition was possible." Sowell said that "numerous recreation directors in Tift County – Mr.

County Joins City In Requiring Masks In Government Buildings



It's official – face masks are now required in all Tift County and City of Tifton government buildings. The County Commission this week joined the city, which had passed its resolution in August, to require masks in county facilities. The county began discussing the issue a month ago and approved the resolution this past Monday. Its

ordinance is in effect for the next three months. Officials have noted that local mask ordinances were prohibited until Aug. 15 when Gov. Brian P. Kemp lifted his ban on local governments deciding the issue. Until then, Kemp "strongly encouraged" the use of masks or face coverings but had issued an executive order preventing local governments from issuing mandates more or less restrictive than the state's.

Did you know that Chocolate makes up about three-quarters of a trick-or-treater's loot, according to the National Confectioners Association? That's an awful lot of chocolate. Sometimes you may have so much candy that you don't know what to do with it. In the event that you have so much candy, separate chocolate out and keep it in a cool, dark, dry place. Milk chocolate is good for no more than 8 to 10 months, while dark lasts up to two years. Hard candy will also keep in a cool, dry place for about a year. Store your soft candies in a covered dish away from direct heat and light. Enjoy them within six months.

Did you know that Candy Corn has been made with the same recipe by the Jelly Belly Candy Company since around 1900? What's in that recipe, exactly? Sugar, corn syrup, and marshmallow. One serving (about 30 pieces) has 140 calories, the equivalent of three miniature Hershey bars. The National Confectioners Association reports that more than 35 million pounds were manufactured in 2005, amounting to almost 9 billion kernels.



Reading To Your Children

Books and Bubbles is a fun day at The Margaret Jones Public Library every Tuesday at 10:30am. They enjoy time together reading and doing activities. The staff encourages you to keep books around and read whenever you can. You are providing the building blocks for language while developing a love of reading for your children. Reading is an important skill that needs to be developed in children. Not only is it necessary for survival in the world of schools and universities, but in adult life as well. The ability to learn about new subjects and find helpful information on anything from health problems and consumer protection to more academic research into science or the arts depends on the ability to read. Futurologists used to predict the death of the printed word but, ironically, Internet has made reading more and more a part of people's daily lives. The paperless society is a myth. The computer's ability to process and analyze data means that endless variations on reports and other types of documents can be and are generated. Internet, itself an enormous new source of information and recreation, is based on the humble written word. To effectively utilize the web and judge the authenticity and value of what is found there, both reading and critical thinking skills are of prime importance. The more children read, the better they become at reading. It's as simple as that. The more enjoyable the things they read are, the more they'll stick with them and develop the reading skills that they'll need for full access to information in their adult lives. Reading should be viewed as a pleasurable activity - as a source of entertaining tales and useful and interesting factual information. The more young children are read to, the greater their interest in mastering reading. Reading out loud exposes children to proper grammar and phrasing. It enhances the development of their spoken language skills, their ability to express themselves verbally. Reading, by way of books, magazines or websites, exposes kids to new vocabulary. Even when they don't understand every new word, they absorb something from the context that may deepen their understanding of it the next time the word is encountered. When parents read aloud to children, the children also hear correct pronunciation as they see the words on the page, even if they can't yet read the words on their own.





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
