
Know Your Risk Factors for Heart Disease

Heart disease is the leading cause of death for both men and women, according to the National Centers for Disease Control. February is American Heart Month. "In the United States, someone has a heart attack every 40 seconds. Knowing your risk factors for heart disease is vital," said Southwest Health District Health Director Dr. Charles Ruis. Tobacco use, high blood pressure, high LDL cholesterol, lack of physical activity and diabetes are key heart disease risk factors that individuals can do something about, he said. Smoking is known to cause disease in the coronary arteries (the vessels that supply the heart muscle with oxygenated blood, Ruis noted. "When these vessels become obstructed, a portion of the heart or the entire heart may cease to function – in layman's terms, a heart attack," he said. Tobacco should not be used by people who want to optimize their health, Ruis said. High blood pressure usually has no symptoms, so he recommended having it checked on a regular basis. "Your healthcare provider should measure your blood pressure at least once every two years if you have never had it or other risk factors for heart disease," he said. "If you have been diagnosed with high blood pressure – also called hypertension – your healthcare provider will check your blood pressure more frequently to ensure you have the condition under control." He noted that patients who have high blood pressure might be advised by their healthcare provider to make some lifestyle changes or to take medication. High cholesterol is another area of concern when it comes to heart disease, Dr. Ruis said. "Your healthcare provider should check your blood levels of cholesterol periodically," he said. Those who have already been diagnosed with high cholesterol or who have a family history of the condition may have it checked more frequently. "If you have high cholesterol, medications and lifestyle changes can help lower the levels, thereby reducing your risk for heart disease," Ruis said. "Another factor that can affect your risk of heart disease is diabetes," he said. "If your healthcare providers thinks you have symptoms of diabetes, they may recommend you get tested. If you do have the condition, monitor blood sugar levels carefully and talk with your healthcare team about treatment options." The healthcare team may recommend changes in lifestyle to help keep blood sugar under control and reduce the risk for heart disease, Ruis said. "If you have one of these high cholesterol, high blood pressure or diabetes and take medication, always follow your doctor's instructions carefully," Ruis said. "Never stop taking your medication without talking to your healthcare provider." Exercise is important to the health of the heart, he continued. "The human heart is about the size of a person's clenched fist and it never takes a vacation," Ruis said. "It pumps blood 24 hours a day," he said. "Regular exercise can help keep the muscle of the heart strong and help keep the coronary arteries from becoming obstructed. Many experts recommend two and a half hours of exercise per week." Ruis said along with regular exercise, a heart-healthy lifestyle includes:

Eating a heart-healthy diet (limiting salt and excess calories)

Avoiding tobacco products
Maintaining a healthy weight
Limiting alcohol use

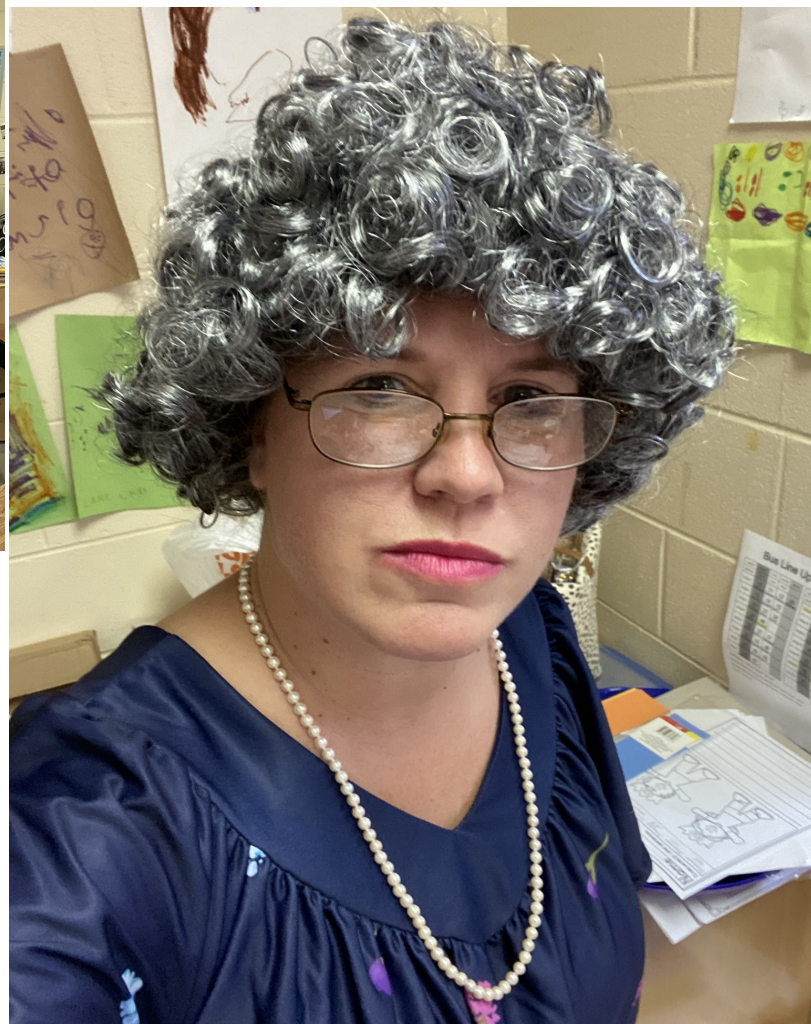

Kicking Off National Nutrition Month

March will be National Nutrition Month and part of leading a healthy life means eating a healthy diet and being physically active. A recent CDC study highlights when, where, and how U.S. adults and children are eating a healthy diet. Those who are not getting enough fruits and veggies can take small steps towards meeting recommended amounts, including adding more fruit to your usual breakfast routine or adding vegetables to your meals. Eating a diet rich in fruits and vegetables can help reduce the risk of many leading causes of illness and death, add important nutrients to your diet, and help with weight control. The recent study shows that adults get most of their fruit during breakfast and snacking whether they eat recommended amounts or not. Those who are not getting enough could aim to add more at breakfast or through snacks such as eating a small apple or banana. On the other hand, children tend to eat fruit throughout the day. Children who need more could add extra fruit to their breakfast, lunch, or snack routines. Dinnertime tends to be when adults and children eat most of their vegetables. However, for those who are not eating enough vegetables, try adding vegetables to your lunchtime salad or sandwich (e.g., tomato slices or baby carrots) or mixing them into what you are having for dinner (e.g., adding broccoli into your pasta).

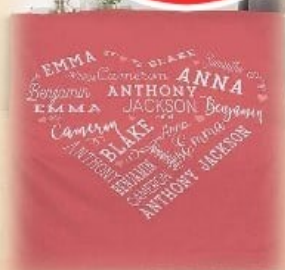

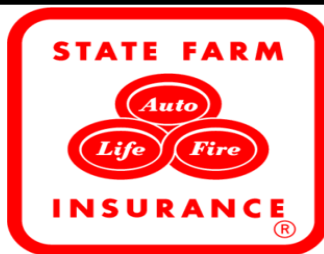

Georgia Peanut Commission Seeks National Peanut Board Nominees

TIFTON, Ga. (Feb. 15, 2021) - The Georgia Peanut Commission seeks eligible peanut producers who are interested in serving on the National Peanut Board. GPC will hold a nominations election to select two nominees each for member and alternate to the National Peanut Board during a meeting on Thursday, March 11, 2021, at 1:00 p.m. EST at the commission headquarters in Tifton, Georgia. All eligible peanut producers are encouraged to participate. Eligible producers are those who are engaged in the production and sale of peanuts and who own or share the ownership and risk of loss of the crop. Andy Bell of Climax is the current Georgia National Peanut Board member and Casey Cox of Camilla serves as the alternate. The terms for the current Georgia board member and alternate expire Dec. 31, 2021. The United States Department of Agriculture requires two nominees from each state for each position of member and alternate. The National Peanut Board will submit Georgia's slate of nominees to the United States Secretary of Agriculture, who makes the appointments. The National Peanut Board encourages inclusion of persons of any race, color, national origin, gender, religion, age, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation and marital or family status. City Council Delays Action On False Alarms, Lets Mask Mandate Expire



Tifton City Council on Monday delayed making a decision on imposing new fines for repeated false fire and police alarms, and decided to allow the city's face-mask ordinance to expire this weekend. Council postponed a decision until next month on false alarms. Officials said they don't want to penalize businesses but need to place on a deterrent on those who have faulty alarms that keep going off and are not repaired. The city is looking at imposing a \$250 fine on businesses on their fourth false fire alarm, and a \$1,000 fine each time thereafter. Officials said some businesses have repeated false alarms, usually late at night, which cost the fire department more than \$15,000 in overtime last

year. False alarms also potentially put fire department personnel and motorists at risk as the department treats each alarm as a real emergency and responds accordingly. City Manager Pete Pyrzenski said a six-month review showed 166 calls for false alarms with 88 of them after hours. He said the fire chief will work with businesses and use his discretion regarding whether or not they should be fined. "The fire inspector will go to the businesses after every false alarm to see what it is," said Fire Chief Bobby Bennett. "I hope we don't write one ticket. ... This is about fixing fire alarms." Mayor Julie B. Smith said she is OK with the \$250 fine but subsequent \$1,000 fines on businesses with faulty alarms are "too excessive." Councilman Jack Folk responded: "Are we trying to get some action on this? Are we trying to get them to do something about it?" The city proposal would also place a \$250 fine each time on businesses for repeated false police alarms beginning with the fourth time. Officials said that costs involved with a police car responding to alarms is much less than with a fire truck responding. Police Chief Steve Hyman said his department also has issues with repeated false alarms from some businesses, noting that one business has had 66 false police alarms in the past year before repairs were finally made this week. At Monday's meeting, council decided to let the city's 30-day face-mask mandate expire Feb. 20 as cases of COVID-19 continue to decline in Tifton. Under state guidelines, a mask ordinance cannot be enforced if the number of cases falls below 100 per 100,000 population. For the past two weeks in Tift County, there were 83 cases per 100,000 population, according to state health officials.

TRMC, Other Rural Hospitals Receive “Georgia Heart” Funds

GEORGIA HEART HOSPITAL PROGRAM

*Helping Enhance Access
to Rural Treatment*

Georgia's rural hospital tax credit program Georgia HEART – “Helping Enhance Access to Rural Treatment” – recently awarded donations to 14 hospitals, including Tift Regional Medical Center. The total \$140,000 in donations were made from Windham Brannon, a CPA firm based in Atlanta. The funds are designated to specifically help rural hospital facilities across the state. Georgia allows income tax credits to individual and corporate taxpayers who contribute to qualified rural hospital organizations. Besides Tift Regional, other hospitals receiving the funds are: Colquitt Regional Medical Center, John D. Archbold Memorial Hospital, Monroe County Hospital, AdventHealth Murray (Murray Medical Center), Polk Medical Center, Upson Regional Medical Center, Union General Hospital, Stephens County Hospital, Jefferson Hospital, Burke Medical Center, Piedmont Mountain-

side Hospital, Wayne Memorial Hospital and Washington County Regional Medical Center. “Today more than ever, rural hospitals are strongholds in their communities,” said Danielle Epps, healthcare practice co-leader at Windham Brannon. “They conveniently provide much-needed care, yet, too many struggle financially,” especially during the pandemic. “There are nearly 2,000 rural hospitals in the U.S., including about 60 here in Georgia, that serve large parts of our population,” Epps said. “It’s vital that they remain profitable so they can continue to provide much-needed services to those in their respective communities.” Nine Georgia rural hospitals have closed since 2008, and two of them closed at the end of 2020, according to Becker’s Hospital Review. A 2017 Georgia Board for Physician Workforce report, the most recent available, showed that: 75 counties didn’t have an OB/GYN, 63 counties did not have a pediatrician, 54 counties did not have an emergency medicine physician and eight counties had no physicians at all.

Celebrating Dr. Seuss Day

Theodor Seuss Geisel was born March 2, 1904. He was an American author, political cartoonist, poet, animator, book publisher, and artist, best known for authoring more than 60 children's books under the pen name Doctor Seuss, abbreviated as Dr. Seuss. His work includes several of the most popular children's books of all time, selling over 600 million copies and being translated into more than 20 languages by the time of his death, September 24, 1991. Geisel adopted the name "Dr. Seuss" as an undergraduate at Dartmouth College and a graduate student at the University of Oxford. He left Oxford in 1927 to begin his career as an illustrator and cartoonist for *Vanity Fair*, *Life*, and various other publications. He also worked as an illustrator for advertising campaigns, most notably for FLIT and Standard Oil, and as a political cartoonist for the New York newspaper *PM*. He published his first children's book "And to Think That I Saw It on Mulberry Street" in 1937. During World War II, he took a brief hiatus from children's literature and worked in an animation department of the United States Army where he produced several short films, including *Design for Death*, which later won the 1947 Academy Award for Best Documentary Feature. After the war, Geisel focused on children's books once again, writing classics like *If I Ran the Zoo* (1950), *Horton Hears a Who!* (1955), *If I Ran the Circus* (1956), *The Cat in the Hat* (1957), *How the Grinch Stole Christmas!* (1957), and *Green Eggs and Ham* (1960). He published over 60 books during his career, which have spawned numerous adaptations, including 11 television specials, four feature films, a Broadway musical, and four television series. Geisel won the Lewis Carroll Shelf Award in 1958 for *Horton Hatches the Egg* and again in 1961 for *And to Think That I Saw It on Mulberry Street*. Geisel's birthday, March 2, has been adopted as the annual date for National Read Across America Day, an initiative on reading created by the National Education Association.
