Rhythm & Ribs BBQ Festival Gearing Up For Sellout Weekend



TIFTON – The 2022 edition of the Rhythm & Ribs BBQ Festival, sponsored by Coca-Cola, has been set for Saturday, March 5 and event organizers are excited about another big day at Fulwood Park. "The festival and BBQ competitions get bigger every year, with more people coming out to shop and enjoy the entertainment," said Angela Elder with the Tifton-Tift County Tourism Association. "Our prize money for both the professional and backyard competitions are among the best in Georgia. The festival has been recognized state-wide as one of the best events in our region and we're looking forward to another great year." More than 60 total barbecue teams are registered to compete between the professional and backyard competition. Teams from all over know that the Rhythm & Ribs is the competition to be at. The professional competition is sanctioned by the Georgia Barbecue Association as teams from all parts of Georgia and surrounding states will be cooking at the park. Professional teams will be

competing for the Grand Champion trophy and \$3,000 in prize money. The Reserve Champion will win \$1,500 and a trophy while the top 10 in each category will receive cash prizes. The professional competition is sponsored by AgriSupply and Carolina Cooker. In the backyard competition, the Grand Champion will receive \$1,200 and a trophy. Added this year is a Backyard Reserve Champion who will receive \$600 and a trophy. Cash prizes are also awarded to the top five finishers in each category. In both competitions, competitors will compete in Pork Loin, Pulled Pork, and Ribs categories. South Georgia Banking Company is the backyard competition sponsor. The festival will still feature the great entertainment all day long, at no charge. Hannah Dasher and the Legendary JC's will co-headline the entertainment on the Coca-Cola Main Stage. Recording artist and TikTok celebrity, Hannah Dasher, will kick off the evening portion of the festival at 6:30 p.m. She is quickly becoming a household name with her viral TikTok series, "Stand By Your Pan." Raised in Springfield, GA, Dasher took cues growing up from a diverse lineup, including the likes of Alan Jackson to Aretha Franklin. After graduating the University of Georgia, Dasher moved to Nashville and has been working her way up ever since. She now has her own music, a traditional- cut artistry, bold lyrics and a can't be duplicated style and personality. Dasher is fresh off the road with Reba McEntire. The Legendary JC's will be closing out the night in style when they take the stage at 8:30 p.m. This is the band's second time on the main stage at Rhythm & Ribs. They are known for wowing the crowd with their brand of soulful rocking blues. The Legendary JC's consist of several top central Florida musicians. The musical entertainment begins at 10 a.m. on Saturday with Derrick Dove and the Peacekeepers, followed by the Pine Box Dwellers at 12:15 p.m., Scott Warren & the Booze Mountaineers at 2:30 p.m., and Lizz Faith at 5 p.m. The BBQ Awards


ceremony is scheduled for 4 p.m. On Friday night, the Kickoff Party will feature the County Line Band at 6 p.m. and the Tyler Neal Band at 8 p.m. Also on Saturday, there will be entertainment on the Community Stage, sponsored by Hargray Fiber Internet. Chris Lantz with Extreme Sculpting Chainsaw Carving will be demonstrating his craft throughout the day. Chehaw Park will also be on hand with some animals and educational displays. Finally, a King Chapman, a magician, will be strolling the park offering shows. There will be unique shopping, with over 100 vendors filling the park. The KidZone, presented by The Party Station, will include inflatables, water balls and the spider jump. Chaos, the mechanical bull, will also be back for those who dare. 





Lecture Focuses On Political Activism & Women Immigrants

Dr. Elizabeth Medley will speak on "Rise of the Resistance: Immigrant Women's Political Activism from Ellis Island to the Modern Era" in the second lecture of a three-part series at 6 p.m. March 3 in Ernest Edwards Hall at Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College. Medley's lecture addresses a mural exhibition entitled "Coming to America – The Immigrant Experience Featuring the Lost Mural of Ellis Island" which opened Jan. 18. Medley is an assistant professor in ABAC's School of Arts and Sciences. "I am going to talk about just one event, the 1902 kosher meat riots," Medley said. "It focuses on Jewish immigrant women in New York City who certainly would have come through Ellis Island and their protests of what they saw as price gouging meat. "It is a really unusual story because usually when there are food riots it is because there is no food. In this case, there is food, just not the right food. As conservative Jewish women, they had to serve their families kosher foods." Medley said she was attracted to this story because it focused on Ellis Island immigrants and an unusual set of issues related to food and protests. "These are also women who often did not speak much English, certainly did not vote, and within their own communities did not have much power," Medley said. "However, as wives and mothers, they saw this issue of food prices as something that they should be able to speak against as the nutritional providers for their homes."



SRTC Begins Civil Engineering Degree Program In Tifton

For the current spring semester, Southern Regional Technical College (SRTC) has launched a civil engineering technology degree program in Tifton. The six-semester course will prepare students for a variety of engineering-related career paths. A recent economic study funded by the Technical College System of Georgia projected a 10% growth in civil engineering occupations through 2029. During 2020, Tift County experienced a significant increase in engineering-related jobs. Currently, the Ga. Department of Transportation has approximately 600 job vacancies related to civil engineering. Tammy Barnes, drafting technology instructor at SRTC-Tifton, serves as the faculty for the program. Albany Technical College faculty will provide additional instruction through an eCampus partnership. After earning her drafting technology degree from the former Southwest Georgia Technical College, Barnes had worked with the Moultrie city engineering department, spending eight years designing roundabouts, sidewalks, roads, and parks. Levi Warren of Camilla is on track to be SRTC's first civil engineering graduate. He is pursuing the degree to improve his contribution to Agri-Comm, his family's agricultural construction business. Already, he says, the program has given him a better understanding of the design and engineering of the peanut elevators, grain bins, dumpers, and warehouses that his family builds.

Blood donation is a community responsibility. While you're reading this, did you know a local patient needs blood? Blood is needed every two seconds. About one in seven people entering a hospital needs blood. Blood is always needed for treatment of accident victims, cancer patients, hemophiliacs, surgery patients and o the recent COVID-19 patients. Blood cannot be manufactured. Only 37 percent of our country's population is eligible to give blood, and less than 10 percent of those who can donate actually do donate annually. What if everyone eligible to donate became complacent and decided they didn't need to donate because someone else would? What if there wasn't enough donated blood available when you, a loved one - anyone - needed it? The blood supply comes from caring donors like you. It takes about one hour of your time. When you give blood, it gives someone another smile, another hug, another chance. It is the gift of life. In order to give, there a couple of things you need to know. You must be in good health. You must weigh at least 110 pounds. (You may have to weigh more, depending on your height). You must meet screening criteria which is determined by your medical history, a drop of blood from your finger to estimate hematocrit level, pulse, blood pressure and temperature. You can safely give eight weeks (56 days) after your last whole blood donation. Be a Hero, Give Blood.

Tifton Getting \$3.8M For Water, Sewer Upgrades; Area Communities Also Getting State Grants



The City of Tifton is getting nearly \$3.8 million from the state to improve its water and sewer system, Gov. Brian P. Kemp's office said Tuesday. The funds are part of \$422 million that Kemp announced for water and sewer infrastructure improvements across the state. Several Tiftarea communities are also receiving funds. Area projects include replacing the water tower at Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College and updating water/ sewer systems in Ashburn, Adel, Alapaha, Arabi, Fitzgerald, Ray City, and Irwin County. The governor said the funding grants will ensure communities in "highneed areas" have reliable and safe drinking water and wastewater systems. "Because we remained focused on protecting lives and livelihoods throughout

the pandemic, Georgia is now in a position to make strategic, transformational investments in our state's water and sewer infrastructure," Kemp said Tuesday. A state committee worked with the Office of Planning and Budget to prioritize the projects to be funded, he said. Tifton is receiving \$3.77 million. In the city's proposal to the state, the money will be used to replace "old, leaking pipes" in the water system, replace aging fire hydrants, make major upgrades to the wastewater treatment plant and lift stations, replace deficient pipes in the stormwater drainage system that cause sinkholes, and incorporate GPS data with city systems "providing for quicker and more accurate responses to facility failures such as leaks and pipe breaks." The Center for Rural Prosperity and Innovation, on behalf of ABAC, is receiving \$758,477 to drill a new well and install a new elevated water tank on the ABAC campus. The current water tank is inadequate "to meet required fire flow," and the current well is more than 50 years old and has no backup. Among other communities receiving grants for water/ sewer projects are: Alapaha, \$750,000; Arabi, \$4,510,685; Ashburn, \$1,680,000; Adel, \$946,100; Fitzgerald, \$2,542,348; Irwin County, \$358,400; and Ray City, \$840,000.



New Tifton Youth Center Named For Coach Bateman



The new Tifton youth center under construction in South Tifton will be named for the late Tift County High coach Anthony G. Bateman, Tifton City Council decided Monday night. Coach Bateman, or "Bate," was an assistant football, basketball and track coach. He had been part of the Tift County coaching staff since 1991, but Bateman was a Blue Devil all his life. He was part of the Class of 1986 at Tift County High School. Bevond athletics, he had touched the lives of many stu-

dents. Bateman, 52, died in 2019 of a sudden, unexpected heart attack. "This is an honor that we all in our family will cherish for the rest of our lives," Bateman's widow Freda told City Council. "I'm so proud to know that Bate made such a positive impact in the lives of our youth in this community." Also at Monday night's meeting, City Council appointed Dr. Tonja Tift as executive director of the Tifton Urban Redevelopment Agency and appointed Elizabeth Torres as assistant city attorney.

Former State Sen. Ed Perry Seeking Return To Senate

Former state Sen. Ed Per-

ry of Nashville has announced he is running to return to the Georgia Senate to represent District 13, which includes Tift County. State Sen. Carden H. Summers, R-Cordele, is the incumbent in District 13. Nashville and Berrien County were added to the district at the end of last year following redistricting. Perry was a state senator from 1982-92, serving as a Democrat. He had served in the Ga. House of Representatives from 1980-82, and was a city commissioner and mayor pro tem for Nashville during 1975-78. He currently is the owner and operator of Perry Vineyards and Horse Creek Winery. In a press release, Perry was described as a conservative small business owner, decorated veteran, and longtime community leader running to "defend South Georgia's way of life against the overreach of Atlanta." "For far too long, South Georgia has been ignored and taken for granted. Now more than ever, District 13 needs a fighter who will stand up for our way of life," Perry said. "Whether it's the radical Atlanta special interests trying to impose their way of life onto South Georgia or the attempted leftist indoctrination of our children we see in our schools, it's past time to stand up and say enough. I'm not running to be a compromise candidate or support whatever way the wind blows on a particular issue. I'm running because I am going to fight for our home and preserve it for generations to come." Born and raised in Berrien County, he graduated from Valdosta State and served in the Air Force during the Vietnam War. Perry said he has been involved in agriculture for 50 years, and has owned several small businesses and created jobs in South Georgia.







CASA Speaks For Kids In Foster Care, Coordinator Tells Rotary



Local children are being removed from their homes every week for physical abuse, sexual abuse, and neglect, Julie Mitcham, advocacy coordinator for CASA, told the Tifton Rotary Club on Wednesday. CASA, or "Court Appointed Special Advocates" for children, began its local program in 2001. "The No. 1 reason for neglect and abuse is drug abuse," Mitcham said. "Parents are abusing drugs in the home in presence of children." The Georgia Division of Family & Children Services (DFCS) will go into to a home and investigate those reports, and suspects are brought to court under Judge Render Heard. In such cases, children involved are placed in the state's custody. "We are a nonprofit organization with six employees and currently 45 volunteers," Mitcham said. "We train volunteers to speak on behalf of children in fos-

ter care through the through the juvenile court system in Judge Render Heard's circuit." There are currently 69 children in foster care in Tift County, 39 in Worth, 35 in Irwin, and 12 in Turner County for a total of 155 children currently in foster care, she said. A single case worker may be assigned 12 to 20 cases, so a CASA volunteer provides the children with an advocate looking out for their interests. Thirty CASA volunteers can support 75 children, she said. "Our CASAs handle one case at a time. The goal is for every child to have an advocate." When possible, they work for reunifying parents with the child, if the parents are getting the therapy or help they need. Another alternative is guardianship with a relative. More than 1,000 children have been served since CASA began, Mitcham said. Volunteers participate in a five-week training that is now a combination of in person and online training. Currently they range in age from a 22-year-old to retirees. CASA is also hosting its third annual Cash for CASA fundraiser in which 350 tickets are available for donations of \$100 each. A winning ticket for \$10,000 will then be drawn at 8 p.m. March 5 at the Tifton Rhythm & Ribs BBQ Festival.
