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


Frank McGill, 95, Helped Save Georgia Peanut Farms



J. Frank McGill overhauled peanut production in Georgia and beyond, his impact increasing the income of peanut farmers across the state by billions of dollars over the last 50 years. His innovations revamped struggling farms and helped the state's peanut productivity to explode by more than 2,000 pounds per acre in less than two decades. He shaped federal farm legislation, worked with 21 countries on five continents to establish peanut research and education programs, and he helped developing countries grow peanuts to fight famine and disease, all while investing in people he met along the way. Former President Jimmy Carter, upon being inducted into the Georgia Agricultural Hall of Fame in 2018, recognized McGill for mentoring him in peanut production when Carter took over his family farm in 1953. McGill, 95, died at his home in Tifton on March 3, following a brief illness. A private funeral was held at First United Methodist Church of Tifton. The youngest of five children, he was born in Chula, Ga., in 1925 to a peanut farmer with a seventh-grade education and a dream to see his children finish college. When the oldest son ran out of money during his senior year at the University of Georgia during the Great Depression in 1933, he packed for home. School officials had a better idea. They offered to take produce and meat in lieu of tuition, making a lasting impression on 8-year-old Frank McGill. "I wanted to know more about a place that would reach out to

my brother and make a way for him during the Depression years," he wrote in his autobiography, "From the Mule to the Moon." He accompanied his father to Athens to deliver sweet potatoes, butchered hogs and homemade syrup. His brother finished his degree. McGill graduated from Tift County High School in 1942. He got a draft deferment because he had two brothers serving in World War II and served instead from 1945 to 1947 as a radio operator in the United States Air Force. After the military, McGill completed an agronomy degree in two and half years, graduating from UGA in 1951. He became the Georgia extension agent at the Coastal Plain Experiment Station, now the UGA Tifton Campus, where he pioneered the role of peanut specialist. He earned a master's degree in agronomy at UGA in 1962. With his science training and people skills, McGill bridged the gap between research labs and peanut farms. He taught classes on every aspect of peanut production, visiting farmers to give hands-on assistance. "What he did was revolutionary," said Donald Chase, board member of the Georgia Peanut Commission and chairman of its research committee. McGill's contributions led to a combined income boost for Georgia peanut farmers of more than \$250 million a year since 1952, he said. Chase, a third-generation peanut farmer in Oglethorpe, Ga., credits McGill with transforming his family's farm. Chase's father and grandfather were struggling with their crops in 1969, when they sought McGill's help. Their yield increased 100 percent in one year. McGill devised the "package approach," an integrated bestpractices system that starts at ground preparation and ends with marketing the produce, which is now used by most peanut farmers in Georgia and taught by the UGA Extension Service. After 31 years as an extension agent, he worked more than 20 years as a consultant for clients including Mars Inc. and the National Peanut Laboratory. He served as technical advisor to the National Peanut Growers Group and the U.S. Senate Agriculture Commission, helping craft the Agriculture and Food Act of 1981. He received the United States Department of Agriculture Award for Superior Service in 1977, Georgia Peanut Hall of Fame induction in 1982, Georgia Agriculture Hall of Fame in 1996, Lifetime Achievement Award by the American Peanut Council in 1999, and the UGA College of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences Medallion of Honor in 2019. Accolades did not overshadow McGill's humility, humor, or interest in others. He paid tuition for needy students, gave devotionals at nursing homes, sought out the homeless for hiring, and sent friends and coworkers handwritten notes of encouragement. His "Up with Peanuts" Scholarship at UGA has provided financial assistant for more than 100 agriculture students since he established the fund in 1984. "He brought together good science with being a good person," said Chase. Survivors include his wife of 67 years, Janet Reed McGill of Tifton; son Mark McGill of Tifton; daughters Becky McGill Barber of Marietta, Ga., Laurie McGill Bolen of Tifton, and Kelly McGill Dean of Sandy Springs, Ga.; 15 grandchildren, and 11 great-grandchildren. McGill left handwritten instructions that memorials be made as "random and unexpected expressions of love and compassion to others on a continuing basis."



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It's Time to Organize!

Organization doesn't just happen—it's a result of conscious actions. Practice this method until it becomes second nature reports All You magazine. Start by tackling a particular room armed with a trash bag, a giveaway box, a box for items you want to sell and a box for things that belong in another room of your home. Make quick, unemotional decisions: If it's broken, obsolete or redundant, get rid of it. Sort through all the items that will stay in the room, matching like with like. It is always great to clean up and out after each season. Keep things packed and organize which will make it easy to find when you need it and it makes it easy to store. And always remember when packing things up that you label all the boxes and containers!



Gov. Kemp: Over 900k Seniors Vaccinated, Georgia Ahead of National Average in Senior Vaccinations

MARCH 06, 2021 - Atlanta, GA – The Georgia Department of Public Health's COVID-19 vaccine dashboard reported Sunday afternoon that over 900,000 Georgia seniors had received at least one vaccine dose and 81% of all statecontrolled doses had been administered. According to American Community Survey population estimates, with a total of 1.4 million people over the age of 65, Georgia has vaccinated 64% of its senior population. The national average of seniors receiving at least one dose, according to CDC and American Community Survey data, is 58%. "Georgia continues to beat the national average when it comes to vaccinating our most vulnerable citizens," said Governor Kemp. "Due to those over the age of 65 accounting for 77% of Georgia deaths due to COVID-19, our vaccination distribution plan prioritized them early - before the CDC recommended doing so - in order to save more lives with the limited doses the state received from the federal government. "Starting tomorrow, given the expanded supply of vaccines and the significant progress we have made in protecting our most vulnerable, more high-risk Georgians will be eligible to receive the vaccines. Please go to myvaccinegeorgia.com to register for an appointment with one of our four stateoperated mass vaccination sites, connect with your local public health department, or view appointments offered by over 2,000 private healthcare providers at dph.georgia.gov."

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
One Movie Ends Filming In Tifton As Another On Way



Just as the movie "Gasoline Alley," starring Bruce Willis and Luke Wilson, wrapped up filming this week in Tifton, Alexander Kane with TMG Studios One announced that another film with the same caliber of actors will start filming here in early April. The working title of the next film is "Purple Hurricane," which also happens to be the name of the Fitzgerald High School sports teams. In the synopsis of the movie, "a very successful aging mob-enforcer is getting ready to retire," said Kane, a Fitzgerald native. "A final job goes horrifically wrong, and he finds himself wanted by the very cartel he worked for." Filming begins April 5 or 6 and will take place again in Tifton and Fitzgerald. "We are lining up a dozen films for the area, as Hollywood and the big-time shot callers in the industry have realized the value of shooting in our little part of the world with the amazing team we have assembled," Kane said. Kane said he had as many as 100 people working on the recent film at any given time. "Many of them will be sticking around (Tifton and Fitzgerald), preparing for the next film," he said. Several have even moved here, such as Austin Taylor, an actor, writer and assistant camera operator, and Tyler Eckles, director of photography, writer and director. Both are from Tennessee, but live in Fitzgerald now. "I need to acknowledge my wife," Kane said. "Brittney Roberts is a founding member of (Fitzgeraldbased) TMG and she works as a 'second second.' She handles the talent, 'cause they all love her." Kane said the whole film crew and actors, including Willis, "wear the Fitzgerald logo with the word FAMILY, because we are proud that we are a film family, and it's not just a job to us. "Everything went amazingly with our shoot as the

people of Tifton, Fitzgerald, and Valdosta helped out and supported us beyond expectations," Kane said. "Gasoline Alley' is the story of two seasoned detectives who lean in on a suspect they feel is involved in a triple homicide only to find out nothing is as it seems," he said. The film release is likely in early 2022. "Everyone loved the experience of filming in South Georgia and specifically Tifton," Kane, a producer of the film, told the Tifton Grapevine.



ABAC Gets State Grant For New Nature Trail Boardwalk

The Nature Study Area at Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College will get a new boardwalk thanks to a \$2,097 Wildlife Viewing Grant to the ABAC Foundation from the Ga. Department of Natural Resources. "The Nature Study Area on the ABAC campus is one of only two public nature trails in Tift County," said Dr. Mark Kistler, dean of ABAC's School of Agriculture and Natural Resources. "This grant will allow our students in natural resource management, under the supervision of the faculty and staff in the Department of Forest Resources, to make needed repairs and improvements to the boardwalk along the nature trail." The grants program, funded by the Georgia Nongame Wildlife Conservation Fund, helps develop and enhance wildlife viewing options with an emphasis on state Wildlife Action Plan spe-

cies and habitats. Georgia's Wildlife Action Plan is a comprehensive strategy to conserve and preserve animals, plants, and places before they become more rare and more costly to restore.

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
More Vaccinations Start on Monday

Starting tomorrow, March 15th, Georgians aged 55 and older and individuals with disabilities and certain medical conditions will be eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine in Georgia. A complete list of health conditions that qualify for vaccination effective March 15th can be found on the Georgia Department of Health's (GDH) website. Other groups currently eligible to receive a vaccine in Georgia include:

- Health care workers (physicians, nurses, lab technicians, EMS)
- Law Enforcement, Fire Personnel, and First Responders
- Residents and staff of long-term care facilities
- Individuals aged 65+ and their caregivers*
- Educators and staff (Pre-K, K-12, DE-CAL licensed or exempt childcare programs)
- Adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their caregivers*
- Parents of children with complex medical conditions

(* Caregivers provide care to people who need assistance with everyday tasks. Care recipients can live in residential or institutional settings, range from children to older adults, and have chronic or disabling conditions.)

While our state is on the right track towards the number of vaccinations, it is important that Georgians continue to follow CDC guidelines and practice social distancing, hand washing, and wearing a mask. I also am continuing to encourage each Georgian to consider getting the vaccine when it becomes available to them. You can see statistics on vaccines in the graph below.

Peanuts Important Part Of Tiftarea



Consider the peanut. It is part of our daily lives, especially here in South Georgia. "Georgia grows over half of the U.S. peanut crop with a farm gate value of over \$600 million. The economic impact of the Georgia peanut farmer to the state's economy is about \$2 billion to our local communities in South Georgia where peanuts grow," says Don Koehler, executive director of the Georgia Peanut Commission. March is National Peanut Month, an observance to "celebrate the bounty of peanuts," Koehler tells the Tifton Grapevine. "Peanuts are heart healthy; they are high in protein; they have a positive influence on other health issues like Type 2 Diabetes and some types of cancer. Because of these and other factors, peanuts are considered a 'Superfood."" Armond Morris, a Tifton peanut farmer and chairman of the Georgia Peanut Commission. says that "peanuts are Georgia's official state crop, and the state boasts the largest share of peanut production in the U.S. at nearly 53 percent for the 2020 crop." In honor of National Peanut Month and the impact of Georgia's peanut industry, the General Assem-

bly proclaimed March 1 as "Peanut Butter & Jelly Day" at the Georgia state capitol. As usual, the National Peanut Buying Points Association office based in Tifton – Tyron Spearman is the executive secretary – grilled PB&J sandwiches at the capitol last week. "It was actually held across the street in what they call the Sloppy Floyd Building due to Covid," says Angela Elder in Spearman's office. "We did about 500 sandwiches, which is down from our normal, just due to the change in location." During the event, the Georgia Peanut Commission and the Peanut Proud organization donated 10,080 jars of peanut butter to the Atlanta Community Food Bank. Georgia is not only No. 1 in peanut production but also in peanut butter production. According to the General Assembly, the peanut industry supports the livelihoods of more than 150,000 Georgians. The state has approximately 4,500 peanut farmers in 76 counties who harvested 800,000 acres of peanuts last year, yielding an average of 4,100 pounds per acre.
