

Tifton, Georgia – March 2, 2021 – Ruth's Cottage and The Patticake House announces the date for the 17th Annual Champions of Hope Sporting Clays Tournament to be held on Saturday, April 17, 2021 at Big Creek Plantation in Irwin County. This event benefits Ruth's Cottage and The Patticake House in support of their victim assistance programs for those who have been harmed by family violence, sexual assault, and child abuse. Formed in 2002, the organization is a state certified triple program, the only one in South Georgia and only one of three in the state. The 2021 awardee will be named midday during the April This year's event will be 17th tournament. held at a new location of Big Creek Plantation. 





WCHS Receives Grant to Explore Black Soldier Flies for Local Farmers



WCHS received a \$15,000 grant from Monsanto to explore the practical use of black soldier flies for our local farmers. Students from Environmental Science, Agriculture, Chemistry, and Algebra classes are working together to create habitats to house black soldier fly larvae in order to study their use on the farm. The cross-curricular study is examining the life cycle and sustainable properties of these flies as they break down animal waste in a chicken coop and ultimately become a high protein, nutrient-dense food source for livestock. Through the course of this

experience, students will analyze data such as temperature, weight, protein, and fat in an effort to determine the practical use of these flies for our local farmers. We are excited to see the farreaching impacts of this study on our local community, and are grateful for the support of our stakeholders and partners, such as The Critter Depot who are generously donating the larvae for our study.

USDA Extends Application Deadline For The Quality Loss Adjustment Program

WASHINGTON, March 5, 2021 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is extending the deadline from March 5 to April 9 for agricultural producers to apply for the Quality Loss Adjustment (QLA) Program because of recent winter storms and some clarifications to program rules. This program assists producers who suffered crop quality losses due to qualifying 2018 and 2019 natural disasters. "Because of recent winter storms and some program updates, we want to provide five additional weeks for producers to apply for the program," said Zach Ducheneaux, Administrator of the Farm Service Agency (FSA). "I want to make sure eligible producers have the opportunity to apply and to work with our team members to help with any questions. We recently clarified policy to ensure producers who sold grain to the feed market due to quality issues are adequately compensated." The QLA program assists producers whose eligible crops suffered quality losses due to qualifying drought, excessive moisture, flooding, hurricanes, snowstorms, tornadoes, typhoons, volcanic activity, or wildfires. Eligible crops include those for which federal crop insurance or Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) coverage is available, except for grazed crops and value loss crops, such as honey, maple sap, aquaculture, floriculture, mushrooms, ginseng root, ornamental nursery, Christmas trees, and turfgrass sod. Additionally, crops that were sold or fed to livestock or that are in storage may be eligible. Assistance is available in counties that received a Presidential Emergency Disaster Declaration or Secretarial Disaster Designation, or for drought, a county rated by the U.S. Drought monitor as having a D3 (extreme drought) or higher. Producers in counties that did not receive a qualifying declaration or designation may still apply but must also provide supporting documentation. FSA will issue payments once the application period ends. If the total amount of calculated QLA payments exceeds available program funding, payments will be prorated. FSA began accepting applications on January 6 and has received more than 8,100 applications so far. To apply, contact your local USDA Service Center. Additional information is also available at farmers.gov/ quality-loss. Producers can also obtain one-on-one support with applications by calling 877-508-8364. While USDA offices are currently closed to visitors because of the pandemic, Service Center staff continue to work with agricultural producers via phone, email, and other digital tools. To conduct business, please contact your local USDA Service Center. Additionally, more information related to USDA's response and relief for producers can be found at farmers.gov/coronavirus.

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Celebrate March - National Peanut Month

The Georgia peanut industry joins together to celebrate National Peanut Month in March and donate peanut butter to the Atlanta Community Food Bank.

TIFTON, Ga. (March 5, 2021) - The March is National Peanut Month, a time to celebrate one of America's favorite foods! The Georgia peanut industry kicked off the celebration this week by hosting the 2021 Georgia PB&J Day in Atlanta, Georgia. During the event, the Georgia Peanut Commission and Peanut Proud donated 10,080 jars of peanut butter to the Atlanta Community Food Bank. Peanuts and peanut butter were promoted during the event by industry partners serving grilled PB&Js, country-fried peanuts, peanut candy and more. Governor Brian Kemp presented a proclamation recognizing March as National Peanut Month while Sen. Larry Walker III, chairman of the Senate Agriculture and Consumer Affairs Committee, and Rep. Robert Dickey, chairman of the House Agriculture and Consumer Affairs Committee presented resolutions recognizing the importance of Georgia's peanut industry. "Peanuts are Georgia's official state crop, and the state boasts the largest share of peanut production in the U.S. at nearly 53 percent for the 2020 crop," says Armond Morris, chairman of the Georgia Peanut Commission. "Georgia's 4,500 peanut farmers contribute approximately \$2 billion annually to the state and local economy." Sponsors and exhibitors include the Georgia Peanut Commission, National Peanut Buying Points Association, Georgia Agribusiness Council, Georgia Farm Bureau, Georgia Federal State Inspection Service, American Peanut Shellers Association, The Peanut Institute, Premium Peanut, Southern Ag Carriers, The Hershey Company, Peanut Proud, Atlanta Community Food Bank, Loyal Q and Brew and Just Bakery of Atlanta. As part of the celebration, peanut butter valued at \$10,000, was presented to the Atlanta Community Food Bank. The Atlanta Community Food Bank provides food and grocery products to more than 700 nonprofit partner agencies with hunger relief programs throughout 29 counties in metro Atlanta and north Georgia. According to Ben Burgess, corporate relations manager with the food bank, the need for food assistance is not going away. "A recent study of our service area showed that 80,600 people are served each week by programs supported through the Atlanta Community Food Bank. Peanut butter is a very nutritious and important product to those clients because it has a stable shelf life," Burgess says. "One jar can make several meals for a family or individual in need. This donation will help the nearly 20 percent of Georgian residents and the one in four children who are food insecure in the state." Coincidentally, March is National Nutrition Month - a great time to recognize the nutritional value of peanuts. One serving of peanuts is a good source of protein, vitamin E, niacin, folate, phosphorus and magnesium. Peanuts are naturally cholesterol-free and low in saturated fat. "They've shopped, dined, utilized a local caterer, and rented buildings for sets, and we really want to celebrate those dollars coming in circling back into retaining jobs and into turning our local economy," McLaren said. "On a personal note and as a Tifton born and bred, I am thrilled to see downtown Tifton on the big screen. You may even catch a few local faces in the movie," she added. Among the possible "local faces" is Hayward Fowler of the FUN Channel, who did a small part as a TV reporter reporting on a triple homicide. Fowler said he ad-libbed his 15-second role. Another local face you may catch in the background of some downtown scenes is ABAC student Haley Wathey, who told the Tifton Grapevine that she was in the "right place at the right time" to get chosen as an extra in the film. Wathey, who is in her second year at Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College studying natural conservation resources law enforcement, said she was downtown Friday night getting photos of the movie-making when a crew member spotted her and asked her to be an extra. She said she was in a couple of scenes in the background as they filmed at Shady Lane Drive-In, and she got to meet all of the cast and crew. "It's definitely once a lifetime," Wathey said. "I never would expect myself experiencing this, especially in Tifton, Ga.," the Tampa native said. "It's been one crazy ride for the last couple of days." Among the local sites and buildings used in the movie is Mayor Smith's home in Tifton's Historic District. And the mayor's husband, Doug Smith, played golf with Bruce Willis at Spring Hill Country Club. No one is saying who had the better score on the golf course. Among other actors who have been in Tifton during the past week for the film are Devon Sawa, a veteran TV and film actor whose credits include "Hawaii Five-O," "MacGyver," "NCIS: Los Angeles," "Nikita," and the movies "Casper," "Hunter Hunter," "The Fanatic" and many others. 
ABAC Returning To "Normalcy" In Fall



Dr. David Bridges, president of Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College, says ABAC students can expect a return to normalcy for the 2021 fall semester when it begins Aug. 11. "Our plan is to return to normal operations in the fall," Bridges said. "I want our existing students to know that, and I particularly want incoming freshmen to know it." Along with the other 25 institutions in the University System of Georgia, ABAC offered only online classes for the final weeks of the 2020 spring semester and the entirety of the summer term, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Students during the 2020 fall

term took a mix of online classes and in-person classes. Now in the middle of the 2021 spring semester, ABAC students take mostly in-person classes with some online classes. "I want students taking inperson instruction in a safe environment this fall," Bridges said. "We will make available a limited number of online classes for those students who still may not feel comfortable sitting in a lecture hall." Thinking beyond the classroom, Bridges said "I want students living in on-campus housing, going to club meetings, playing sports, and eating in the dining hall," Bridges said. "Give our students what they deserve, the total college experience. "ABAC has always been known for its friendly atmosphere and a quality education that prepares students for life. Even during the pandemic, we have not backed off that premise." ABAC enrolled 3,990 students during the 2020 fall term, the second largest enrollment in the history of the college. Those students came from 155 of Georgia's 159 counties, 53 of Florida's 67 counties, 19 states, and 24 countries. A record 2,353 of those students enrolled in the 12 bachelor's degree programs that ABAC offers.



New Alzheimer's Association Report Examines Racial and Ethnic Attitudes on Alzheimer's and Dementia Care

- Report also shows latest statistics and information on Alzheimer's prevalence, incidence, mortality and cost of care in Georgia and nationally - Statewide deaths attributable to Alzheimer's and dementia spike during COVID-19 -

ATLANTA, GA, March 2, 2021 – Findings from two national surveys appearing in the Alzheimer's Association 2021 Alzheimer's Disease Facts and Figures report reveal that discrimination is a barrier to Alzheimer's and dementia care. More than one-third of Black Americans (36%) and nearly one-fifth of Hispanic Americans (18%) and Asian Americans (19%), believes discrimination would be a barrier to receiving Alzheimer's care. In addition, half or more of non-White caregivers say they have experienced discrimination when navigating health care settings for their care recipient.

The 2021 Facts and Figures report provides an in-depth look at the latest national statistics on Alzheimer's prevalence, incidence, mortality, costs of care and impact on caregivers. New disease-related statistics for Georgia revealed the following:

- Number of Georgia residents aged 65 and older living with Alzheimer's: 150,000
- Estimated number of Georgia residents living with Alzheimer's in 2025: 190,000
 - Percentage change: 26.7
 - Statewide deaths from Alzheimer's disease (2019): 4,221
 - Number of Georgia residents serving as unpaid family caregivers: 334,000
 - Total hours of unpaid care provided: 640,000,000
 - Total value of unpaid care: \$9.2 billion

The new Facts and Figures report shows that Alzheimer's disease and other dementias continue to be a significant burden for too many Georgia families," said Linda Davidson, Executive Director of the Georgia Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association. "Georgia is considered one of the top ten states in the country that is projected to see the highest increase of cases over the next five years. We must continue to work toward advancing new treatments that can stop or slow the progression of Alzheimer's, while also continuing to provide care and support services to help all those affected.

For the first time, the accompanying special report, "Race, Ethnicity and Alzheimer's in America," examines perspectives and experiences of Asian, Black, Hispanic, Native and White Americans in regard to Alzheimer's and dementia care.

Findings in the report, reveal that non-White racial/ethnic populations expect and experience more barriers when accessing dementia care, have less trust in medical research and are less confident that they have access to health professionals who understand their ethnic and racial background and experiences. Among the findings:

- Two-thirds of Black Americans (66%) believe it is harder for them to get excellent care for Alzheimer's disease or other dementias. Likewise, 2 in 5 Native Americans (40%) and Hispanic Americans (39%) believe their own race or ethnicity makes it harder to get care, as do one-third of Asian Americans (34%).
- Nearly two-thirds of Black Americans (62%) believe that medical research is biased against people of color a view shared by substantial numbers of Asian Americans (45%), Native Americans (40%) and Hispanic Americans (36%) as well. Only half of Black Americans (53%) trust a future cure for Alzheimer's will be shared equally regardless of race, color or ethnicity.
- Fewer than half of Black (48%) and Native Americans (47%) feel confident they have access to providers who understand their ethnic or racial background and experiences, and only about 3 in 5 Asian Americans (63%) and Hispanics (59%) likewise feel confident.

"Despite ongoing efforts to address health and health care disparities in Alzheimer's and dementia care, survey results show there is still a lot of work to be done," said Carl V. Hill, Ph.D., MPH. chief diversity, equity and inclusion officer, Alzheimer's Association. "Clearly, discrimination, lack of diversity among health care professionals and mistrust in medical research create significant barriers to care and demand the country's full attention."

Episodes of discrimination, however, extend beyond Alzheimer's and dementia care, the Alzheimer's Association surveys found that many non-White Americans say they have experienced discrimination in the broader health care system. Specifically, half of Black Americans (50%) report they've experienced discrimination when seeking health care; more than 4 in 10 Native Americans (42%) and one-third of Asian Americans (34%) and Hispanic Americans (33%) likewise report having experienced health care discrimination.

The experiences and views of discrimination expressed by respondents in both surveys are also reflected in their views on clinical trial participation.

Black Americans have less interest in clinical research trials to prevent or slow the progression of Alzheimer's disease. White Americans are most likely to express interest (82%), followed by Native Americans (81%), Hispanic Americans (78%), Asian Americans (73%) and lastly, Black Americans (67%).

The most common reason cited for not participating in clinical trials among all racial/ethnic groups is not wanting to be a "guinea pig." This sentiment was especially strong among Black Americans (69%). In addition almost half of Black Americans (45%) worry that treatments might cause sickness. They are also twice as likely as other groups to say they "don't trust medical research." And they are more than twice as likely as other racial or ethnic groups to say they "might not be treated fairly."

As noted in the 2021 Facts and Figures report, health and socioeconomic disparities and systemic racism contribute to increased Alzheimer's and dementia risk in communities of color. According to the report, older Blacks and Hispanics are also disproportionately more likely to have Alzheimer's and other dementias. In addition, both groups are more likely to have missed diagnoses than older whites.

Impact of COVID-19

The report also examines the devastating impact the COVID-19 pandemic is having on people living with Alzheimer's. According to the report, there were at least 42,000 more deaths from Alzheimer's and other dementias in 2020 compared with averages over the previous five years – a 16% increase.

In Georgia, there were 1,596 more deaths from Alzheimer's and dementia in 2020 than compare to averages over the past five years – a 39.8% increase.

The report highlights preliminary and anecdotal data indicating the COVID-19 pandemic is also having adverse effects on many family caregivers. It notes that pandemic-related caregiving challenges, including the shutdown of adult day care centers and the inability of families to visit or communicate with relatives in long-term care settings have caused "emotional distress and other negative outcomes among caregivers."

While more study is needed to understand the exact reasons why deaths attributable to Alzheimer's and dementia during the pandemic have increased so dramatically, we do know individuals living with Alzheimer's, particularly those living in long-term care settings are extremely vulnerable," said Davidson. "In addition, many caregivers have been unable to visit loved ones in these settings, resulting in social isolation for the care recipient and causing enormous stress for these families. The Georgia Chapter is committed to supporting Georgia caregivers and implementing the safety measures needed to reunite these families."

2021 Alzheimer's Disease Facts and Figures: At a Glance

Prevalence, Incidence and Mortality

- An estimated 6.2 million Americans age 65 and older are living with Alzheimer's dementia in 2021. More than 1 in 9 people (11.3%) age 65 and older has Alzheimer's dementia.
- Two-thirds of Americans over age 65 with Alzheimer's dementia (3.8 million) are women. Deaths due to Alzheimer's between 2000 and 2019, has more than doubled, increasing 145%.
- 1 in 3 seniors dies with Alzheimer's or another dementia.

Caregiving

- In 2020, more than 11 million caregivers of people with Alzheimer's or other dementias provided an estimated 15.3 billion hours of unpaid care, a contribution to the nation valued at \$257 billion.

- Approximately two-thirds of caregivers are women, and one-third of dementia caregivers are daughters.

Forty-one percent of caregivers have a household income of \$50,000 or less.

- Medicare and Medicaid are expected to cover \$239 billion or 67% of the total health care and long-term care payments for people with Alzheimer's or other dementias. Out-of-pocket spending is expected to be \$76 billion.
- Total payments for health care, long-term care and hospice care for people with Alzheimer's and other dementias are projected to increase to more than \$1.1 trillion in 2050.
- The total lifetime cost of care for someone with dementia is estimated at \$373,527.

Other Key Findings from "Race, Ethnicity and Alzheimer's in America:"

- Concern about developing Alzheimer's is lower among Native Americans (25%), Blacks (35%) and Hispanics (41%), especially when compared with Whites (48%).
- More than one-third of Native Americans (35%) and nearly 3 in 10 Hispanics (28%) do not believe they will live long enough to develop Alzheimer's or another dementia.
- More than half of non-White Americans believe significant loss of memory or cognitive abilities is "a normal part of aging."
- Hispanic, Black and Native Americans are twice as likely as Whites to say they would not see a doctor if experiencing thinking or memory problems.
- One in 5 Black (21%) and Hispanic Americans (20%) say they would feel insulted if a doctor suggested a cognitive assessment.
- Nearly 2 in 3 caregivers (64%) across all groups say that caregiving is stressful, but nearly all (92%) say caregiving is rewarding as well.

About 2021 Alzheimer's Disease Facts and Figures

The Alzheimer's Association 2021 Alzheimer's Disease Facts and Figures report is a comprehensive compilation of national statistics and information on Alzheimer's disease and related dementias. The report conveys the impact of Alzheimer's on individuals, families, government and the nation's health care system. Since its 2007 inaugural release, the report has become the preeminent source covering the broad spectrum of Alzheimer's issues. The Facts and Figures report is an official publication of the Alzheimer's Association.

About the Survey

Versta Research conducted two surveys on behalf of the Alzheimer's Association: (1) U.S. adults and (2) current or recent caregivers of adults age 50 or older with cognitive issues. Respondents were asked about access to care and support services, trust in providers and the health care system, participation in clinical trials and research, and caregiver experiences. Surveys were conducted October 26 - November 11, 2020. Data was collected by NORC at the University of Chicago via the AmeriSpeak® panel. AmeriSpeak is a probability-based panel of all U.S. households.

The survey included 945 White respondents. Oversamples of Hispanic (n=541), Black (n=515) and Asian Americans (n=412) were weighted back to their true population proportions for statistical analysis and reporting. For full inclusion of Native Americans, the same survey was administered to an additional sample of 406 Native Americans recruited through online (non-probability) panels with sampling stratified and data weighted on gender, age, income and education to match U.S. Census Bureau data. Visiting Still Pond Vineyard, Winery & Distillery



I love day trips more than overnight trips for sure. And one place that I love to go is Still Pond Vineyard. Driving 30 miles south of Albany, past fields of peanuts, corn, and cotton, you turn on to a road of red Georgia clay. Drive a couple of miles down this road and all of the scenes are those that you would expect to find in rural Southwest Georgia. Then you round a bend in the road and see what some have called Shangri-La... acres and acres of Muscadine vines (also known as Scuppernongs and Swamp Grapes) and the unexpected discovery of Still Pond Vineyard and Winery. Over 130 years ago, during the height of the Civil War, the discovery was just as exciting. Sitting

on the banks of an isolated pond was a still, turning out peach brandy to provide comfort, relaxation, and escape for exhausted Confederate soldiers...thus the name Still Pond. Through the years, the legend of Still Pond was enhanced by other proprietors of the still. Still Pond Vineyard owner Charles Cowart remembers, "When I was growing up the Hunt brothers lived here and were known for the spirits they delivered around. Dad used to pick them up and bring them home. He told about finding one of them under a pine tree one morning with frost on his beard. Evidently the croaker sack of liquor had been sampled too liberally during deliveries and he did not make it home." The Legend Continues... Today, the Legend of Still Pond continues, but with a much more legitimate (and legal!) direction. Charlie Cowart Sr. started over 45 years ago by planting a few muscadines, a grape variety native to the South... Still Pond Vineyard was born. The vineyard did well and Charlie Sr., along with his wife Peggy, continued to expand the vineyard with additional plantings each year. After the deaths of the elder Cowarts, son Charles and his wife Susan took over the operation Still Pond. What started out as a location for weary Confederate troops to gain a little comfort with a bottle of peach brandy has now become one of the largest commercial vineyards in Georgia. Charlie Cowart Sr.'s small planting of muscadines has grown to become a commercial operation that is a reliable supplier of fresh Muscadine juice for a growing list of wineries across the Southeastern United States. Whether you call them Muscadines, Scuppernongs, or Swamp Grapes, this grape, native to the South, is a wonderful source of great taste.
