
Governor Kemp, State Labor Commissioner Announce Economic Recovery Plan

MAY 13, 2021 Atlanta, GA – Today Governor Brian P. Kemp and Georgia Department of Labor Commissioner Mark Butler announced Georgia's plan for reemployment and economic recovery. To address workforce shortages and boost a full economic recovery, state labor officials plan to end Georgia's participation in federal pandemic unemployment programs, effective Saturday, June 26, 2021. Over the next several weeks, state officials will provide resources for job search support, education and training opportunities, childcare and transportation services, and safe workplace initiatives for workers, families, and employers. "During truly unprecedented times, hardworking Georgians have stayed resilient and businesses of all sizes have quickly adapted to an unpredictable environment," said Governor Kemp. "Even in the middle of a global pandemic, job growth and economic development in Georgia remained strong - including an unemployment rate below the national average. To build on our momentum, accelerate a full economic recovery, and get more Georgians back to work in good-paying jobs, our state will end its participation in the federal COVID-19 unemployment programs, effective June 26th. As we emerge from this pandemic, Georgians deserve to get back to normal – and today's announced economic recovery plan will help more employees and businesses across our state do so." In accordance with Commissioner Butler's recommendations, effective Saturday, June 26, Georgia will no longer participate in the following federal programs: Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC), which provides for an additional \$300 weekly payment to recipients of unemployment compensation; Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA), which provides benefits for those who would not usually qualify, such as the self-employed, gig workers, and part-time workers; Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation (PEUC), which provides for an extension of benefits once regular benefits have been exhausted; Mixed Earner Unemployment Compensation (MEUC), which provides an additional \$100 benefit to certain people with mixed earnings. All payments under any of these federal programs will be processed and issued to eligible claimants through June 26, 2021. Once Georgia opts out of the federal programs, the Department of Labor (GDOL) will continue offering regular state unemployment insurance benefits to eligible Georgians. The maximum weekly benefit in the state is \$365. "GDOL has dispersed almost \$22 billion in the past fourteen months to support families in this crisis, paying mortgages, electric bills, and grocery tabs when Georgians were in greatest need. It is critical for us to support our economy and local businesses by providing solutions to the roadblocks many Georgians have faced when returning to work," said Labor Commissioner Mark Butler. "Right now, the state has a historic number of jobs listed on Employ Georgia. We are seeing some of the highest pay scales with enhanced benefits and signing bonuses." GDOL provides extensive online support to job seekers looking to rejoin the workforce. Claimants receive access to Employ Georgia's over 251,000 job listings, resume assistance, career counseling, skills testing, job fair information, job training services, and accessibility and special accommodations for people with disabilities and veterans transitioning back into the workplace.

Keeping Children Safe in the Sun

The risk of developing skin cancer will be substantially reduced for children who learn to "Block the sun, not the fun!" Sun Safety for Kids is dedicated to reducing the incidence of skin cancer through teaching and promoting sun protection to children. During the hour, while you are contemplating the subject of sun safety, one more American will die from skin cancer. It remains the most common type of cancer in the United States despite being such a preventable disease. Keep your children safe! Encourage or require the use of Sun-protective hats, long clothing, sunscreen and UV-blocking sunglasses. To complement more reliable methods of reducing skin exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation (such as sun avoidance, clothing, and hats) sunscreen can be very useful. However, limitations to the effectiveness of sunscreen include the following common user errors which are Failure to apply enough, uneven application / missed spots and Failure to re-apply. Because some amount of UV radiation might pass by the sunscreen, unintentional sunburn can occur. Think of these products as a back-up to other, more effective, and sun safety strategies. The sun emits a broad spectrum of radiation that includes harmless visible light as well as ultraviolet radiation. The bands of wavelengths that damage human skin are categorized as UVA and UVB. UVB rays are the main cause of the skin turning red, or exhibiting a sunburn. They can fracture the DNA in skin cells, resulting in mutations. UVA rays penetrate deeper into the skin and are the main cause of wrinkling, and discoloration. They cause the formation of damaging atoms called free radicals, and can inhibit the immune system from doing its job to prevent cancer. It is important to protect the skin from both UVA and UVB. If, and only if a sunscreen effectively filters out UVA rays as well as UVB rays (which is highly desirable) it may be labeled "Broad Spectrum." When shopping for sunscreen, always look for a product labeled "Broad Spectrum SPF" rather than simply "SPF." Certain antioxidants can augment the broad spectrum protection. Look for a mention of antioxidants on the product label but unfortunately there is not yet any rating system to help you compare antioxidant effectiveness between products. Probably the greatest drawback with sunscreen is that most people do not apply a sufficient dose. The SPF number is determined by the manufacturer using a "standard" application amount (required by the FDA) of 2 milligrams of product per square centimeter of skin. For the average adult in a bathing suit this would be a little more than one ounce, or approximately a shot glass full. (That's one quarter of the typical 4 oz. sunscreen bottle.) When a person applies less than the "standard" amount, only a fraction of the labeled SPF will be achieved. Studies have shown that the average person applies less than half the "standard" amount of sunscreen, which results in an SPF of only about one third of that labeled on the bottle. Spray on sunscreens is particularly subject to under dosing. By contrast, if more than the "standard" amount is applied, the SPF achieved will exceed that labeled on the bottle. UV causes some sunscreen ingredients to gradually deteriorate on the skin's surface in response to sun exposure. Sunscreen can also dissipate due to sweating, rubbing, and penetration into the skin. To maintain maximum effect, sunscreen should be reapplied every two hours. A single application before coming to school cannot be expected to adequately protect a child for afternoon physical education. These products must be applied liberally and, as with paint, two coats are better than one. Thus, Sun Safety for Kids coined the phrase: "Put on a lot. And don't miss a spot!"

Drink Less Sugar – You're Sweet Enough Already By: Kristen Ford, Worth County 4-H Agent

Do you have a favorite soda? Many of the Worth County Primary School (WCPS) 2nd graders do too, however they started thinking differently about those sodas after a lesson on sugar. On Tuesday, May 11th and Wednesday May 12th all WCPS 2nd graders learned about added sugar in our favorite drinks. Sugar can be very tasty to eat and drink, but it can be harmful to our bodies. The American Heart Association recommends that children and female adults should have no more than 6 teaspoons (tsp) of sugar in a day. Male adults should have no more than 9 tsp per day. In order to figure out tsp from the grams on the Nutrition Facts label, you will divide the grams by 4 and multiply the sum by the number of servings. This will give you the tsp of sugar in the whole container.


An average 12 fluid ounce can of soda has 10 tsp of sugar. This is 4 more tsp than the maximum recommendation of 6 tsp per day for children. The 2nd graders were asked if children should drink one soda a day. After counting out the tsp, the students said no, children should not have one soda a day. They were able to see that one soda had more sugar than the recommended amount.

The lesson also talked about how common sport drinks have 9 tsp of sugar in a 20 fluid ounce bottle. This again is more than the American Heart Association's recommendation. Students were asked about who tells them about sports drinks on commercials and why the commercials want them to buy the drinks. They also came to the conclusion that sport drinks have more sugar than a child should have in one day.

A healthier option might be juice, but you must be careful about added sugar. The 2nd graders learned the difference between natural sugars found in many fruit and added sugar that companies add to their product to make them sweet. Look for "no sugar added" on labels to make sure your juice is true fruit juice.

To wrap up the lesson, water bottles were given to all 2nd graders to help them remember that water is a healthier choice. The water bottles were donated by Phoebe Worth Medical Center. The lesson was taught by Kristen Ford, Worth County 4-H Agent, Roxie Price, Tift County Family and Consumer Sciences Agent, and Ashleigh Childs, Thomas County Family and Consumer Sciences Agent.



State Names SRTC Tifton Student As A Finalist For GA Technical Education Leadership Award

Noemi Reyes of Tifton, a practical nursing student at Southern Regional Technical College (SRTC), on Monday was named one of the top nine Georgia Occupational Award of Leadership (GOAL) delegates in the state. The announcement by the Technical College System of Georgia allows Reyes to compete in state-level judging on May 18. She had been named SRTC's 2021 GOAL winner in March. GOAL is a statewide program that focuses on academic excellence and personal achievement in technical education. The winning GOAL student serves as an ambassador for technical education in Georgia. Reyes, 18, has overcome language difficulties and generational poverty to be the first in her large family to earn a college degree. She is the oldest of six, and her grandfather's 12 children all lived together in one home when she was born. As her family grew, they continued to live, work, worship, and raise children close together. Her aunts and uncles have provided her with 30 cousins. She said that college was not a consideration when she was growing up. "I always struggled in school. English is my second language, and it was very difficult for me to learn to speak and write. I lived in a household where no one spoke English, so there was no one to help me with my homework. Kids bullied me for not knowing how to pronounce words correctly or how to say my classmates' names. I hated school and did not believe that I could be successful," Reyes said. She credits her late grandfather, who died of COVID-19 complications last summer, with turning around her attitude. "He explained that there would always be someone to hurt your feelings or try to keep you from pursing a dream, but that it was up to me whether or not I met my goals, and doing my best was all that mattered. From that day on, I knew I needed to worry less about the thoughts of other people. I decided then to perform well in school, to attend college, to get a good job, to help my family with finances, to get us out of working in the fields, and to show my siblings that it is possible to do all these things even in our circumstances," Reyes said. A dual enrollment student while in high school, Reyes will now will graduate from SRTC's practical nursing program this July. She plans to continue her education through SRTC's LPN-RN bridge program.

New Tift School Offices Open In Former School



With community fanfare, the Tift County School System formally opened its newly renovated administrative offices Friday in the former Annie Belle Clark School in Tifton's Historic District. The ribbon cutting was followed by tours of the \$2.8 million restoration of the building that housed schools since its construction in 1927. The structure at 506 West 12th St., started as Tifton Junior High School, served as Annie Belle Clark

Elementary for a half-century and later as the school system's Pre-K Center. It had been largely vacant for the past two years. The facility has now been transformed to handle modern needs and technology. School officials said they hope the building will continue to serve the community for another 100 years. The school system's previous offices on Ridge Avenue were labeled as the "Board of Education," which school officials said had caused some confusion; some folks thought that BOE members had personal offices in there. The 12th Street building is now labeled as "Tift County Schools Administrative Offices," which officials say better describes the facility.

Select a photo that showcases your family or what being a Georgia peanut farmer means to you. Choose a photo you feel helps others understand more about how you care for the crop they love. Photo entries must be taken during the 2020 or 2021 peanut crop year and feature peanut production. Entries must also be high resolution (300 dpi), horizontal and not taken with a phone; otherwise, they may be disqualified. 

SRTC Tifton Receives \$200,000 Grant From Coca-Cola United, Rural Development Partners



Coca-Cola Bottling Co. United and Rural Development Partners (RDP) have jointly funded a \$200,000 investment in technical and industrial education in South Georgia through RDP's Community Investment Program.
