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UGA Extension To Offer Virtual Solar Energy Seminar To Inform Rural Georgia Landowners



University of Georgia Cooperative Extension is offering a new virtual seminar, "Solar Energy in Rural Georgia: Opportunities and Considerations for Landowners," on Tuesday, June 8. The event, set for 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. on Zoom, is structured to help landowners understand the benefits and possible liabilities of hosting solar panels on their land. The event is free and open to the public, but participants must register at zoom.us. Investing in solar panels as an energy provider or leasing to outside companies has been a growing topic in the last few years, and UGA Extension offices have recently been fielding more questions on the subject. "Landowners should be cognizant of the implications of entering into a solar lease agreement," said UGA Extension agricultural economist Amanda Smith. "The decision to convert land into solar is complex and has long-term implications. We hope to provide landowners with information to help them in their decision-

making process." Incentive programs and tax credits available for those willing to switch to solar power have reduced in recent years, but future programs are likely. The Biden administration has placed renewable energy expansion as a key environmental priority. Speakers from UGA Extension, Georgia Tech, U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development and The University of Tulsa will discuss what landowners and communities need to consider before installing solar panels or contracting with a solar energy company. Opportunities to implement solar in the agricultural industry, including on the roofs of poultry houses and other options, will also be covered during the seminar. To register and see the full agenda of the seminar, which includes talks on the state of solar in Georgia and an examination of opportunity costs, visit zoom.us. For more information, contact Amanda Smith at aziehl@uga.edu. The virtual solar seminar will help Georgia landowners navigate the complex world of solar energy options. "A True American Hero" Tifton Native Col. Puckett Receives Medal of Honor



More than 70 years after his heroics in a bloody battle during the Korean War, retired Army Col. Ralph Puckett Jr., 94, a Tifton native and U.S. Army Ranger, received the Medal of Honor from President Biden on Friday at a White House ceremony. The medal's citation recognized Puckett for "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty" while leading his severely outnumbered men in battle during November 1950. Puckett, who resides in Columbus, is "a true American hero," Biden said, whose Medal of Honor, the nation's highest military honor, is "long overdue." On Nov. 25, 1950, during one of the toughest battles of the Korean War, the Eighth Army Ranger Company seized and held a strategically important hill overlooking the Chongchon River. Separated by more than a mile from the nearest friendly unit, only 51 soldiers fought off several hundred Chinese attackers. "To make their charge, they had to cross about half mile of frozen rice

paddies under fire," Biden said at the ceremony. "And when enemy machine gunners slowed the Rangers' advance, Puckett risked his life by running across the area to draw fire that would reveal the location of the nest. He did it once. He did it again. It took three runs intentionally exposing himself to the enemy to pick off the gunner." Biden said that when Puckett's Rangers finally reached the top of Hill 205, they found it abandoned but knew the fight wasn't over. Soon, there were "mortars followed by a ground assault from the entire Chinese battalion. Puckett's Rangers were outnumbered almost 10 to one," the president said. "During the fight, Puckett abandoned the relative safety of his foxhole, moving from man to man, encouraging them in the fight, checking that the perimeter was holding. He took a grenade fragment in his left thigh, but Puckett refused to be evacuated. He was a Ranger. ... And over the course of the next several hours, four more waves of assaults came. "Each time, Puckett made his rounds, passing out extra ammo and extra encouragement to rally his men. Each time, he was able to call in artillery support — sometimes 'danger close' — to help break the advance of the Chinese soldiers. Each time, the Rangers held the hill, pushing the enemy back — at times, with hand-to-hand fighting. About 2:30 a.m., after more than four hours of near nonstop fighting, the sixth wave began," Biden said. "By this time, ... many Rangers had been killed, and those who are left were exhausted, outnumbered, and dangerously short of ammunition and grenades. Lieutenant Puckett had sustained a second wound, this time in his left shoulder. He had distributed all the ammo to his men, keeping only eight bullets and a bayonet for himself. "For the last time, Puckett called in artillery support, only to be told that the guns were supporting other besieged units. Then, two mortar rounds landed directly in Puckett's foxhole, tearing through both his feet and his backside and his left arm and shoulder," the president related. "Puckett's Rangers had been overwhelmed, and he himself was badly wounded. He ordered one of his men who found him on the ground to leave him behind. But that's not the Ranger creed." Puckett would eventually recover and go on to serve in Vietnam before retiring as a colonel in 1971 as one of the most decorated combat veterans in the nation's history. During his career, Puckett received the Distinguished Service Cross twice, two Silver Stars for valor, two Bronze Star Medals and five Purple Hearts. President Moon Jae-in of South Korea was present for Friday's Medal of Honor ceremony and said, "Colonel Puckett is a true hero of the Korean War. With extraordinary valor and leadership, he completed missions until the very end, defending Hill 205 and fighting many more battles requiring equal valiance. "Without the sacrifice of veterans, including Colonel Puckett and the Eighth Army Ranger Company, freedom and democracy we enjoy today couldn't have blossomed in Korea," the South Korean president said. Puckett, a 1949 West Point graduate, joined the newly established U.S. Army Ranger Department, serving as an instructor and tactical officer, and commanding companies at Fort Benning and in the Ranger Mountain Camp. He went on to lead companies in Vietnam, train cadets at West Point and organize military leadership courses in Colombia. The Col. Ralph Puckett Leadership Award series was named for him, honoring top officers in the U.S. Army Rangers, which is the most elite and highly trained of the Army's combat forces. Pictured is Col. 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Downtown Tifton On The Move Redevelopment Projects, Programs Underway



Downtown Tifton Main Street has once again been designated as an accredited Main Street program for meeting rigorous performance standards, Main Street America announced Thursday. Each year, Main Street America announces the list of accredited programs to recognize commitment to preservation-based economic development and community revitalization. Tifton is again on the list that includes 889 nationally accredited Main Street programs. Downtown Tifton's performance is annually evaluated by the state Office of Downtown Development and the Georgia Main Street Program, which work in partnership with Main Street America to identify programs that meet 10 national performance standards, such as fostering strong public-private partnerships, documenting program progress, and actively preserving historic buildings. "We're very proud of this accreditation and to uphold this level of excellence," said Abbey McLaren, executive director of Tifton's Downtown De-

velopment Authority. "Our restaurants and merchants had a very challenging year in 2020, but downtown was still able to gain new businesses and was very active in economic-based historic preservation. "With exciting developments on the horizon, we will continue to put downtown first because we know that is where the hub and the heart of our city is," she said. On Wednesday, McLaren told the Tifton Rotary Club about several redevelopment projects that were put on hold for the pandemic, and which have restarted. For instance, Drs. Cameron and Margaret Nixon have completed the first phase of their Towne Center Lofts on Main Street. Two apartments are available for renting, and a new restaurant and three more efficiency apartments are on the way. The Nixons have purchased three more buildings in the block. The Golden Building, with three floors and a basement, is going to provide a new restaurant, boutique store and event space. The owner, Jenna Turner, applied for state and federal tax credits, McLaren said, and "we facilitated the tax credit applications." Many changes are coming on Commerce Way: Steve Cooksey recently bought the 125-year-old building at 325 Commerce Way that formerly housed the Davis Music shop. Constructed in 1895 by Dr. G.W. Julian for his medical practice, the structure later became the city's first African-American hotel. The finished project will provide living spaces upstairs and retail space downstairs. Farther down the block, the former Hawkeye's location is going to be an Oyster Bar by the owner of a food truck, the Shrimp Box, from Nashville. Another building, formerly owned by Jack Stone, will provide six condos. The former Carey's Antiques building will be an interior store, developed by Lamar Boyer. "I encourage you to drive down Commerce Way to remember how it is now," McLaren said. Another project is around the corner at 136 E. Third St, where Regina's School of Dance has been; the site will house two condos and three airbnb units.

June is Skin Cancer Prevention and Early Detection Awareness Month

Skin cancer is the most common cancer in the United States. In fact, more skin cancers are diagnosed in the US each year than all other cancers combined. The number of skin cancer cases has been going up over the past few decades. The good news is that you can do a lot to protect yourself and your family from skin cancer, or catch it early so that it can be treated effectively. Most skin cancers are caused by too much exposure to ultraviolet (UV) rays. Most of this exposure comes from the sun, but some may come from man-made sources, such as indoor tanning beds and sun lamps. You don't need x-rays or blood tests to find skin cancer early – just your eyes and a mirror. If you have skin cancer, finding it early is the best way to make sure it can be treated with success. What Is Skin Cancer? Skin cancer starts in the cells of the skin. Some other types of cancer start in other parts of the body and can spread to the skin, but these are not skin cancers. There are 3 main types of skin cancers: Basal cell skin cancers (basal cell carcinomas), Squamous cell skin cancers (squamous cell carcinomas) and Melanomas. Basal and squamous cell skin cancers are by far the most common cancers of the skin. Both are found mainly on parts of the body exposed to the sun, such as the head and neck. These cancers are strongly related to a person's sun exposure. Basal and squamous cell skin cancers are by far the most common cancers of the skin. Basal and squamous cell cancers are much less likely than melanomas to spread to other parts of the body and become life threatening. Still, it's important to find and treat them early. If left alone, they can grow larger and invade nearby tissues and organs, causing scarring, deformity, or even loss of function in some parts of the body. Some of these cancers (especially squamous cell cancers) can spread if not treated, and can sometimes even be fatal. These cancers are discussed in more detail in Basal and Squamous Cell Skin Cancer. Melanomas are cancers that develop from melanocytes, the cells that make the brown pigment that gives skin its color. Melanocytes can also form benign (non-cancerous) growths called moles. (Your doctor might call the mole a nevus.) Melanomas can occur anywhere on the body, but are more likely to start in certain areas. The trunk (chest and back) is the most common place in men. In women, the legs are the most common site. The neck and face are other common places for melanoma to start. Melanomas are not as common as basal cell and squamous cell skin cancers, but they can be far more serious. Like basal cell and squamous cell cancers, melanoma can almost always be cured in its early stages. But if left alone, melanoma is much more likely to spread to other parts of the body, where it can be very hard to treat. There are many other types of skin cancers as well, but they are much less common: Merkel cell carcinoma, Kaposi sarcoma, Cutaneous (skin) lymphoma and Skin adnexal tumors (tumors that start in hair follicles or sweat and oil glands). Together, these types account for less than 1% of all skin cancers. It's important for doctors to tell the types of skin cancer apart, because they are treated differently. It's also important for you to know what skin cancers look like. This can help you find them at the earliest possible stage, when they are easier to treat and most likely to be cured.
