World Sickle Cell Day



World Sickle Cell Day was established by the United Nations General Assembly in 2008 in order to increase the awareness about the sickle cell disease and its cure among the common public. It was celebrated first time on 19th of June in 2009. Sickle cell disease has become a common and foremost genetic disease worldwide which is a must to cure through the fast awareness campaign, curable activities, early diagnosis and management. Sickle cell disease (SCD) is the most common inherited blood disorder. That means it's passed down through families. You're born

with SCD. It is not something you catch or develop later in life. The disease gets its name because when you have SCD, your red blood cells look like a sickle, which is a C-shaped farm tool. Red blood cells contain a molecule called hemoglobin, which carries oxygen throughout the body. In a healthy person, hemoglobin is smooth, round, and flexible. That allows red blood cells to glide easily through your bloodstream. But if you have SCD, the hemoglobin's shape is abnormal. It forms rods that clump together. That causes red blood cells to become rigid and curved. The odd-shaped cells block blood flow. It's dangerous, and can cause extreme pain, anemia, and other symptoms. About 100,000 people in the United States have sickle cell disease. Most of them are African-Americans. Please wear fuchsia/purple in support of Sickle Cell on June 19th.

Southwest District 4-H Junior/Senior Project Achievement By: Kristen Ford – 4-H Agent



District Project Achievement, or as 4-Her's call it DPA, is an opportunity for students to pick a project area of interest, complete project work in that area throughout the year, research a specific topic, write a presentation, develop visual aids, and present their presentation to a judging panel. The topics 4-Her's have to choose from range from arts and health to target sports and agricultural awareness. The possibilities are endless! The students also complete a portfolio which includes activities in their project area, community service opportunities, leadership responsibilities, and 4-H activities throughout the year. The student's portfolio and presentation are judged to create their overall score. DPA provides opportunities for 4-H members to develop and enhance qualities of integrity, sportsmanship, cooperation, poise, self-confidence, and help members develop skills in leadership and communication.

During the weekend of June 4-5 2021, the Southwest Junior-Senior District Project Achievement was held at the Rock Eagle 4-H Center, in Eatonton, GA. The Worth County 4-H Club was well represented by ten competing 4-Her's. Senior 4-Her's were Stephanie Bass, Annika Blech, Mallory Burger, Caiden Goldinger, Gloria Laster, Alexia Sokolowski, and Khris Still. To be eligible to

compete as a Senior 4-Her, participants must be attending classes in the 9th through 12th grade. Junior 4-Her's were Mandy Burger, Dakota Farmer, and Taylor Isdell. Junior 4-H members must be in the 7th grade and 8th grade.

Stephanie Bass, a 10th grader at WCHS competed in the Arts and Crafts project and received 4th place. She presented on how art affects physical properties of our brains, mood and bodies; chemical balances of our brains; healing properties, and how art can help develop many positive skills.

Annika Blech, a 10th grade homeschool student competed Wildlife project and received 1st place. This 1st place finish qualifies Annika to compete at the state level in July at 4-H State Congress in Atlanta. She discussed how to rescue and transport injured wildlife. This topic comes with personal experience of helping many animals including a snapping turtle which she uses as an illustration in her speech.

Mallory Burger, a 10^{th} grader at WCHS competed in the communications project and received 2^{nd} place. She discussed the forms of communication we experienced during the global pandemic. Mallory even joked about "Zooming" into her presentation.

Mandy Burger, an 8th grader at WCMS competed in the Engineering and Mechanics project. Her portfolio had many mentions of working on her families' drag racing cars. Mandy placed 2nd in her project area.

Dakota Farmer, an 8th grader at WCMS competed in the Workforce Development project and received 2nd place. She discussed the positive and negatives of teenagers working. Dakota spoke about her experience working at Ed's.

Caiden Goldinger, a graduating senior of James Madison High School competed in the Health Project Area. She discussed the spine condition Spondylosis and how is has affected her and her family. Caiden placed 4th in her project area.

Taylor Isdell, an 8th grader at WCMS competed in the Entomology project and received 1st place. She discussed bumblebees: their looks, diet, hibernation habits, nests, and how they are great pollinators.

Gloria Laster, a graduating senior at WCHS competed in the Computer Information Technology project area. She discussed Pokémon Go and careers you can have to create video games. Gloria placed 3rd in her project area.

Alexia Sokolowski, a 9th grade student at WCHS competed in the Food for Health and Sports project and placed 4th. She discussed different the positive and negatives of fad diets, keto diet, and vegetarian diets for athletes. Alexia used her own experience as a Cross Country and Track runner to stress the importance of healthy eating.

Khris Still, a 10^{th} grade student at WCHS competed in the History Project and placed 3^{rd} . He spoke all about Albert Einstein. Einstein's famous achievements were the Quantum Theory of Light, $E=mc^2$, Brownian Movement, Special Theory of Relativity, General Theory of Relativity, Manhattan Project, and Einstein's Refrigerator.

Congratulations to all the Senior and Junior 4-Her's that attended District DPA. They did a wonderful job and represented Worth County well. We know Annika will continue representing us well at State Congress. If you have a child between the ages of 9 to 18 and they are currently living and attending school in Worth County they are eligible to be a member of the Worth County 4-H Club. 

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June is Lane Courtesy Month

One of the most frustrating problems that drivers face is poor lane courtesy — drivers blocking the left lane. The idea of slower moving traffic keeping right seems simple, but it is often forgotten. In order to promote this safe driving practice, the National Motorists Association (NMA) has designated June as Lane Courtesy Month. Better lane courtesy will improve traffic flow, prevent accidents, and can even save motorists money on gas. The Summer Driving Season is upon us. People want to get out there and enjoy themselves. Lane Courtesy is a part of that for sure. The NMA wants driving to be safer and more pleasurable for all motorists. That's why we promote Lane Courtesy Month. Ignoring the principle of lane courtesy increases congestion and frustration. The instances of

tailgating, weaving in-and-out of traffic, and speed fluctuations increase — all of which reduce safety and waste fuel. When motorists yield the left lane, these situations diminish and accidents are avoided. Everyone benefits when driving is more efficient and enjoyable. Fuel conservation is a significant benefit of lane courtesy. Your vehicle consumes the most fuel when you are accelerating. It burns much less when you are able to achieve a consistent speed. Lane courtesy, when properly obeyed, promotes the smooth flow of traffic and helps drivers maintain an even pace. With gas prices at record highs, fuel economy improvements are doubly important. Safety and gas savings are not the only reason motorists should yield the left lane; most states also have laws requiring them to do so. Government agencies spend billions of dollars to promote speed limit compliance, seatbelt usage, and construction zone safety, but little attention is paid to lane courtesy. The majority of motorists agree on the need for lane courtesy, so a small investment to promote it would be very worthwhile. 

FDA Approves Aducanumab For Alzheimer's Disease

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) today approved aducanumab (Biogen/Eisai) to treat Alzheimer's disease.

This is the first drug that slows Alzheimer's disease. And, this is the beginning of a completely new future for Alzheimer's treatments. This is a new type of Alzheimer's treatment; it addresses the disease in a way that has never been done before, compared to currently approved drugs.

Alzheimer's Association spokespeople are available to discuss:

- The impact of this decision on treatment, care and living with Alzheimer's.
- Alzheimer's Association efforts to ensure access to the drug.
- The status and future of Alzheimer's research.

The homemade biscuits from my Granny Meeks and fried corn bread from my Granny Louise and the fresh veggies and fruits were to die for! They beat fast food any day of the week. When I was growing up, cooking and eating at home was what you did. Going out to eat was a treat for sure. My favorite foods they cooked was cream corn, my Papa Meeks' macaroni and cheese, fried okra, squash, boiled potatoes, fried corn bread, biscuits and peach cobbler. Those sure were the days! Lightning Strikes... The Thunder Rolls

Lightning strikes the United States about 25 million times a year. Although most lightning occurs in the summer, peo-

ple can be struck at any time of year. Lightning kills an average of 49 people in the United States each year, and hundreds more are severely injured. There are many tips to know about lightning safety. There is NO PLACE outside that is safe when thunderstorms are in the area!! If you hear thunder, lightning is close enough to strike you. When you hear thunder, immediately move to safe shelter: a substantial building with electricity or plumbing or an enclosed, metal-topped vehicle with windows up. Stay in safe shelter at least 30 minutes after you hear the last sound of thunder. Stay off corded phones, computers and other electrical equipment that put you in direct contact with electricity. Avoid plumbing, including sinks, baths and faucets. Stay away from windows and doors, and stay off porches. Do not lie on concrete floors, and do not lean against concrete walls. If you are caught outside with no safe shelter anywhere nearby the following actions may reduce your risk: Immediately get off elevated areas such as hills, mountain ridges or peaks. Never lie flat on the ground, never shelter under an isolated tree, never use a cliff or rocky overhang for shelter, immediately get out and away from ponds, lakes and other bodies of water and stay away from objects that conduct electricity (barbed wire fences, power lines, windmills, etc.). Safety from lightning is talked about mostly during the summer months but please stay prepared anytime during the year.



ABAC Again Tops Southeast In Ag Education Grads

For the third consecutive year, Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College produced more graduates with a bachelor's degree in agricultural education than any other college or university east of the Mississippi River. Forty agricultural education students graduated from ABAC at the recent commencement ceremony. "The spring 2021 ABAC cohort was by far the largest graduating class from any institution in Georgia in the history of agricultural

education," said Dr. Frank Flanders, agricultural education program coordinator. "These graduates will help with the severe nationwide shortage of Ag Ed teachers that has existed for over 40 years." The Ag Ed graduates were inducted into the profession in a special pinning ceremony following graduation. Graduates received the ABAC Agricultural Education pin, and many received awards for outstanding leadership and student teaching. The ABAC Ag Ed program continues to thrive with increased enrollment as well as new programs. Current enrollment is at 217 students, which makes ABAC one of the largest producers of Ag Ed graduates in the nation. During the past year, an elementary agricultural education teacher program was established at ABAC, the first of its kind in the nation. ABAC also established a partnership with Murray State University to encourage graduates to continue their education in a master's degree program. City Considers "Parklet", One-Way Street Along Commerce Way



As Commerce Way continues to be developed with new businesses and eateries, the City of Tifton is considering making the street one way heading north and creating a "parklet" with an outdoor eating area. The proposal was formally presented to Tifton City Council at its workshop Monday night, and council members voiced no initial opposition to the concept. The Downtown Development Authority is in "full alignment

with that," said City Manager Pete Pyrzenski. "This seems to be the best approach for Commerce Way." Mayor Julie B. Smith said that Commerce Way is "a very visible corridor for our downtown," and that converting the block to one-way traffic would be "a lot safer coming off Highway 82." Trey Gavin, senior vice president with ESG Engineering, made the presentation based on extensive study. He said the concept would make the area more handicapped accessible, would slow and limit traffic, improve esthetics and would be "a major enhancement for every business" on the street. The current sidewalk on Commerce Way is a "two-tiered sidewalk with irregular steps," Gavin said, noting that the sidewalk has a "four-step different elevation." The plan would convert the sidewalk to a two-step elevation. The parklet would take over three current parking spaces to create the space for sitting and dining. Gavin said converting the street to one-way would allow reclaiming some of these spaces on the other side of the street. City Manager Pyrzenski added that storm water issues along the street would also be addressed with the proposed project. Because City Council was in a workshop meeting, no action was taken on the proposal. It will be brought back at a full City Council meeting. 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


Photography Contest To Capture Year Of Pandemic
