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
Volunteer in the Spotlight: Pete (Pierre) the Camp Cook

Meet Peter Goodall, 80 years of age and one of our great volunteers! He has volunteered with BlazeAid for an age, and is well known for his gentleness and kind nature. Pete is dearly loved in camp for this (as well as his fabulous cooking skills!). Born in London, Peter calls Barnawartha home, when he is not helping in one of our BlazeAid camps. He is blessed with a daughter and four gorgeous grandchildren.

Pete's hobbies include gardening, and he loves to cook. Before joining BlazeAid he enjoyed working as a fruit and vegetable grower (Pumpkins and Apricots) and he also contracted out to other farmers for over 30years.







Peter heard about BlazeAid over 8 years ago when fires affected his hometown in Barnawartha. He himself was lucky not to have been affected, but wanted to help the community, so he made the decision to come along to the local BlazeAid camp and used his talents as a chef to feed the volunteers. He has now assisted at least 14 camps and enjoys the lifestyle, the volunteers, the atmosphere and the cooking.

Currently based at our Moonambel Camp, Peter has been a great asset to the camp - our Coordinator, Gene Purcell, has said he would be lost without him!

Every morning Peter is awake by 4am, showered, dressed and ready to go. He starts breakfast for the volunteers; a favourite crowd pleaser is having eggs cooked the way you like! With breakfast and dishes all done by 8am, he will then assist with preparation of the evening meal (if required) and help with other camp duties during the day. Peter likes to do a bit of sightseeing in the communities when he can.

When he was helping in our Casino Camp, Peter lost his name badge and our Camp Coordinator at the time (Spud) offered to help out with a replacement - he now proudly sports his new "Pierre Chef Extraordinaire"!

News From Around the Traps

Cessnock Camp NSW

Opened on Monday 13th Feb,
Cessnock Camp was set up in
response to the July 2022 Floods.
The camp will assist many families
and properties in the Cessnock and
Singleton area, to help rebuild
fences. After a community BBQ
night held on Friday the 17th Feb to
spread the word, the camp has 28
properties registered, and already
completed 7 of those. Camp CoOrdinator's Judy and Max are
welcoming all volunteers.

Kerang Camp VIC

Simon has ably led the Kerang camp for the last few weeks and has now handed to reins over to Martin and Eileen. Kerang is traveling along nicely and are receiving a lot of help from The Probus Club. They have just had a article posted in the local paper on BlazeAid, and are urging farmers to come forward and register so they can receive help while we are in the area. This camp has 33 properties registered, 24 started and 10 completed. More volunteers are needed, as the camp is down to one team going out to assist farmers.

Recently, the camp held a farmers BBQ night which had a great turnout of 45 people. Property owners, volunteers and the community were able to get together and share some stories.

Oxley Island Camp NSW

We have 48 properties registered, of which 27 have been completed and 11 km of fencing cleared with 17 km of fencing rebuilt.

There are currently 4 volunteers in camp, so more are needed.

Molong Camp NSW

Current camp Co-Ordinator Col
Coleman is in good spirits at Molong,
having already started 12 and
completed 3 properties in full! 11
volunteers have come on aboard this
week. They are faced with the difficult
task of completing fences with crops
of 5 to 6 meters high near fencing,
and also need to share willing
volunteers with the current shearing
season.

Seymour Camp VIC

Opened on Monday 13th Feb, lan and Karen - our 1st time Coordinators had a welcome and information night on Wednesday 15th Feb. People enjoyed a BBQ dinner cooked by the local Lions Club and slices provided by Gwen and Andrea from Nagambie, with Kevin Butler giving an insight and a detailed vision on how BlazeAid helps communities, the night was a success. With 10 properties ready to go and 16 volunteers with expressions of interest, the first small team was ready to head out shortly after opening. A bonus to all volunteers registered with the Seymour camp you will have access to the local pool which is situated near the camp site!

Wauchope Camp NSW

Wauchope camp had a wonderful experience earlier this month; "We are happy to say we have finally reached out to a farmer who hasn't come forward for nearly 2 years! He was struggling with money so he went to Sydney to start work as a builder and has finally managed to make a small home to stay in while clearing up. Bob has assisted him with clearing of his property and is making great progress." Currently, Wauchope has only 5 volunteers in camp, as we are facing the same issues as others with the hot weather. The camp has 150 properties registered and 123 completed, 62 km of cleared fencing done and 128km of fencing has been rebuilt.

Donnybrook Camp WA

Paul and Peter began our Donnybrook camp in early Feb and set up efficiently , ready for opening on Mon 13th Feb, before handing the reins over to Kevin and Rhonda Pilgrim.

With 5 volunteers, 1 cook and 2 in admin, they have been productive with clearing 5Km of fence line to date. The team recently had a 'meet and greet' night with farmers - BBQ and sweets provided - with a turn out of 29 People plus 11 from in the camp.

33 Properties have shown expressions of interest and should be fully registered soon for assistance. Kevin and Rhonda have visited the Men's Shed and are looking forward to a strong community relationship, as often happens in many camps across Australia. A shout out to a couple of locals, Colin and Vic, who assisted with moving the trailers from Narrogin to Donnybrook and hosting the coordinators for the week until the camp was up and running. Also, to Suzie from the Donnybrook Shire THANK YOU.

Moonambel VIC

This camp started back in Dec 2022 with camp Coordinators Bruce and Bron, before they handed it over to Gene Percell. Gene boasts that the camp has one of the best chefs in BlazeAid! To date, this camp has 39 properties registered, has started 24 and completed 22.

The camp has had 74 volunteers pass through the doors, clearing 35 kms of fencing and rebuilding 10kms - what an effort! The camp is always in need of volunteers and if you enjoy eggs for breakfast, Pete "The Chef" will cook them to your liking.



News From Around the Traps...

Lockington Camp

Lockington is a small community with a huge heart. Several of the businesses in town are owned by the community and are also manned by volunteers in the community. Since Camp Coordinator Kerrie arrived in Lockington, the community has been super helpful and supportive. A generous array of biscuits, eggs and stewed fruit have been delivered, and the cook can even go and pick fresh herbs and veg from a community run garden! At the present time, 54 farms have requested our assistance, 12 of those are in an area too far out for the Lockington Camp to help (Wunghnu/Barmah), so we are in the process of setting up another camp in that area, enabling us to help those effected farms too.

Some of our Volunteers are repeat offenders, who come back time and time again. One of them has attended around 10 camps and is 83 years old! Another volunteer has been at 22 camps and is amazing at fixing the equipment and keeps all the tools in tip top condition. He is also a big practical joker; when we have a meal he doesn't like, he will eat a can of stew that he brings with him, but he will swap out the label on the can to one of the dog food cans he feeds his dog. That inevitably causes a bit of a reaction in the dining area! All in good fun!

The camp has spent a couple of weeks on one of the bigger farms, where the farmer lost a lot of classic cars he had lovingly restored, his house and all it's contents. Sadly, his insurance company is fighting him all the way about recompense. He has also just been told he has a nasty cancer in his lower lip, which will have to be removed. His partner also lost her beautiful garden, and is so traumatized that she can't go back to look at it. When our team heard this, they have all volunteered to go out in their own time and spend a few hours restoring the garden.

We have some awesome volunteers here in Lockington, and humor and fun are a big part of why this camp is successful, along with our 2, sometimes 3 fabulous cooks, who serve up incredible meals. One of the volunteers also has a big goofy rescue dog, who keeps the camp entertained with his antics.

Forbes Camp

After arriving in mid Jan our first job was to pressure clean and wash up as the show committee didn't have time after the devasting impact of the floods. Now into the full swing of things, fencing has commenced with 70 farms registered and 2 completed. We currently have about 2-3 teams of volunteers a day going out to fence. Boundary fencing is our main priority, at this stage, to help farmers control their stock. It is heartbreaking to hear the stories of how many pets, stock and homes have been lost. It is difficult to see people sifting through on their hands and knees for that personal item that has so much meaning to them. The loss of a fridge or television can be overcome but those items that have more of a sentimental meaning are hard to get back. Chris Male who is one of our Camp Co-Ordinator's at Forbes said "In all my time volunteering with BlazeAid, I have found this camp to be the most that has required our help. Not only in fencing but in compassion, talking and listening too and just being involved with the community." The community has really bonded together and are very helpful to one another and working hard. It is great to hear farmers say when we have started to assist them, that 'this is great I now know what I have to do'."

Bob: Growing up on a dairy farm I knew what it was like to go through fire and floods. I wanted to help other people in the same situation.

BlazeAid: What are your duties, functions, and responsibilities in camp?

Lisa: I mostly help with the Administration tasks, cooking and cleaning at camp.


Bob: I help with the fencing on the farms, safety muster in the morning and assessing the properties that need help.

Bob: I like the challenge, meeting new people and enjoy the social side after a hard day's work; catching up with the volunteers in the afternoon and having a good chat while we debrief and discuss how their day went.





BlazeAid's Supporter of the Quarter

Murdoch Foundation

The Lachlan and Sarah Murdoch Foundation works with organisations across Australia to improve the lives of children, families, and local communities. Our primary interests include children's health and wellbeing, rural natural disaster recovery and the performing arts. Since inception in 2019, the Foundation has given more than \$10 million to not for profits including BlazeAid, Women's Community Shelters, Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal, Sydney Children's Hospital Foundation, the Murdoch Children's Research Institute, Royal Far West, Qtopia, the Australian Ballet and the Cambodian Children's Fund.

The Foundation's initial grant of \$250,000 has been put towards funding BlazeAid's Tree Planting and GRAFFI (Grass-seed Rehabilitation after Fires Funding Initiative). The initiative aims to help bushfire- affected property owners replant trees and grass seed after their property is burnt out.

The first project took place at Edenhope, Victoria, helping farmers affected by the Poolaijelo fires of December 2021. Funds were used to purchase native trees, perennial grass seeds, fencing materials as well as running costs of the basecamp. At the end of the project, more than 5000 trees, fencing and shelter belts were established on nine properties. Another portion of the grant is planned for regenerative tree planting and GRAFFI around BlazeAid's camps in Narrogin, Wickepin and Corrigin, Western Australia. The remaining funds will be set aside for regenerative tree planting and grass-seed rehabilitation in communities affected by bushfire in the future. Sarah and Lachlan are thrilled that, due to their initial funding, BlazeAid now aims to offer the initiative to every community where a basecamp is established.







BEHIND THE SCENES WITH SARAH BUTLER AND RHYS LONG

Sarah and Rhys are our IT wonder team, who have not only built the IPad registration, but also our new cloud based console, creating a system that is safer, easier to manage and saves an enormous amount of paperwork!

Rhys and I met about 5 years ago and now have 2 little kids, Grace -2.5 years and Charlie 7 months. We live in Melbourne and Rhys works as an IT manager in the oil and gas industry. Since then, I have volunteered at a few camps, and Rhys & I have worked at a couple together also. Being a daughter of the founders- the organisation is very close to ours hearts.


We can see how many people it has impacted, and

While working with BlazeAid, any volunteers aged 12 years and up are covered under BlazeAid's Volunteer Insurance. There is no age limit restriction on a volunteer being included however, the Volunteer must be able to take direction and work independently in order to be included.

Any work completed on properties outside of BlazeAid Camps will not be covered under BlazeAid Volunteer Insurance. You will need to organise your own insurance to make sure you're covered. We strongly advise you have ambulance cover when you volunteer at our basecamps. We have Volunteer Insurance (Not Work Cover) for incidents that occur while you are working.
