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WHAT THE HOLY SPIRIT WILL DO FOR US AND IN US

God's Gift of the Spirit

God did not send His Spirit to remain idle in our lives. He sent Him to live in us, to help us, and to guide us into His plan.

“And I will put my spirit within you, and cause you to walk in my statutes” (Ezekiel 36:27).

Christ Himself promised: *“It is expedient for you that I go away: for if I go not away, the Comforter will not come unto you; but if I depart, I will send him unto you” (John 16:7).*

The Holy Spirit is God's presence with us. He is not just a force or a feeling, but the living Spirit of God who works in every true believer.

The Spirit is both the power and the presence of God at work within those who belong to Him. He teaches, corrects, convicts, and strengthens. He opens our understanding of Scripture, helps us remember truth, and gives us the courage to obey it. Without the Spirit, no one can truly walk in righteousness or overcome sin. He is the breath of new life that keeps the believer connected to the Father.

The Holy Spirit transforms the heart from within. He breaks chains that human effort cannot break. He replaces fear with peace, confusion with clarity, and weakness with strength. He comforts the broken, exposes hidden sin, and leads the obedient into deeper holiness. The Spirit does not exist to entertain, but to purify and empower. His purpose is to make us holy, not merely emotional.

Through the Holy Spirit, we are made sons and daughters of God. He seals us for salvation and marks us as belonging to Christ. He gives gifts for service, fruit for character, and power for testimony. The Spirit's presence is not a privilege for a few, but the inheritance of all who truly repent, believe, and obey the gospel. Where the Spirit dwells, there will be growth, truth, and transformation.

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The Works of the Holy Spirit

1. He Draws the Unsaved to Christ

No one can come to Christ by themselves. The Spirit opens hearts and draws people to salvation.

“No man can come to me, except the Father which hath sent me draw him” (John 6:44).

It is like a magnet pulling metal. The Spirit pulls our hearts toward Christ.

Without the Spirit’s drawing, no one would ever seek God. He breaks pride, softens hearts, and opens blind eyes so that truth can be received. Conviction is not cruelty; it is mercy reaching into darkness and calling the lost to repentance.

2. He Gives Wisdom, Teaches, and Reminds Us

The Spirit is the source of revelation and truth. He testifies of Christ and helps us remember His words.

“He shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance” (John 14:26).

“He shall testify of me” (John 15:26).

“He will guide you into all truth” (John 16:13).

It is like having a teacher who whispers the right answers during life’s test—not to cheat, but to help us walk in truth.

The Spirit brings Scripture to life, giving insight that goes beyond what study alone can produce. He reminds believers of God’s words in moments of testing and confusion, guiding them away from deception and into complete truth. The gospel

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then becomes part of our own story. We begin to live it, to feel it, and to see ourselves within it. The experiences recorded in the Bible come alive as we face similar struggles and victories, and those moments become our own as we grow into true children of God.

3. He Rebukes Sin

The Spirit does not ignore sin. He convicts the world of sin, righteousness, and judgment (**John 16:8**).

This is like a parent correcting a child to stop them from walking into a busy street. Rebuke is not to harm, but to protect.

Conviction is the first sign of God's mercy at work. The Spirit exposes sin not to shame us, but to free us from it. Those who resist His conviction remain bound, but those who humble themselves find grace and restoration.

4. He Dwells Within Us

We are the temple of the Holy Spirit (**1 Corinthians 3:16**). The Spirit does not just visit; after baptism and the laying of hands, He lives in us.

It is like having light inside a house. Once the Spirit comes in, darkness cannot rule there anymore.

The presence of the Spirit transforms the believer's heart into a dwelling place for God. His presence brings peace, guidance, and strength. Where the Spirit resides, sin loses its power and holiness begins to take root.

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5. He Convicts, Leads, and Grants Repentance

The Spirit leads us to repentance, turning our hearts toward God.

“The goodness of God leadeth thee to repentance” (Romans 2:4).

“If God peradventure will give them repentance to the acknowledging of the truth” (2 Timothy 2:25).

Like a compass pointing north, the Spirit points us back to God.

Repentance is never produced by guilt alone; it is the Spirit who softens the heart and turns it back to the Father. He reveals sin, shows its consequences, and then offers the path to forgiveness. Every genuine conversion begins with the Spirit's call to repentance.

6. He Helps Us Pray

“The Spirit also helpeth our infirmities: for we know not what we should pray for as we ought” (Romans 8:26).

When we do not know what to say, the Spirit intercedes with groanings too deep for words. It is like a friend speaking on our behalf when we cannot find the right words.

The Spirit brings our prayers into alignment with the will of God. He translates our weakness into divine communication. When our strength fails or our words fall short, the Spirit intercedes faithfully, ensuring our prayers reach heaven's throne.

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7. He Helps in Ministry and Comforts Us

The Spirit is our Helper and Comforter. He gives us fellowship, strength, and guidance in serving God.

“The communion of the Holy Ghost be with you all” (2 Corinthians 13:14).

“If any fellowship of the Spirit” (Philippians 2:1).

Like oil in a lamp, He keeps the flame of ministry burning.

Without the Spirit, ministry becomes human effort. With the Spirit, it becomes power. He gives boldness to speak truth, endurance to stand under pressure, and comfort in every trial. The same Spirit who sends us into battle also stands beside us in it.

8. He Gives Life and Regenerates Us

The Spirit makes us alive to God. Without Him, we remain in the flesh.

“So then they that are in the flesh cannot please God. But ye are not in the flesh, but in the Spirit, if so be that the Spirit of God dwell in you... And if Christ be in you, the body is dead because of sin, but the Spirit is life because of righteousness.”
(Romans 8:8–10)

“It is the Spirit that quickeneth; the flesh profiteth nothing: the words that I speak unto you, they are spirit, and they are life.” **(John 6:63)**

The Spirit is like breath in the lungs. Without Him, there is no life.

The Spirit does not repair the old nature; He creates a new one. This new life gives us power to resist sin and to walk in holiness. The same Spirit who raised Christ from the dead now gives life to our mortal bodies, enabling us to live as new creations.

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9. He Anoints Us with Power

The Spirit empowers believers.

“But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me...” (Acts 1:8)

This is like armor given to a soldier: protection, strength, and authority.

The Spirit's anointing is divine enablement. It is not human talent or emotion, but supernatural strength for spiritual warfare. He equips us to overcome temptation, to discern truth from deception, and to stand firm when the world opposes the truth.

10. He Intercedes for Us

“He maketh intercession for the saints according to the will of God” (Romans 8:27).

Even when no one else prays for us, the Spirit prays.

Every believer has an advocate within. The Spirit never tires, never forgets, and never fails to intercede. His prayers are perfect, for He knows the mind of God and the needs of the heart. This unseen intercession sustains us when we cannot stand on our own.

11. He Gives Spiritual Gifts

The Spirit equips the Church with gifts: wisdom, knowledge, faith, healing, miracles, prophecy, discernment, tongues, and interpretation (**1 Corinthians 12:7-11**).

It is like tools given to builders. Each believer receives what is needed to build up the Body of Christ.

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These gifts are not for personal glory, but for service. Every gift is designed to strengthen the Church and reveal God's power. When believers use their gifts in unity and humility, the body of Christ grows in strength, truth, and love.

12. He Produces Spiritual Fruit

The Spirit grows fruit in us: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faith, gentleness, and self-control ([Galatians 5:22-23](#)).

Fruit is evidence of life. If the Spirit lives in us, His fruit will show in our actions.

The fruit of the Spirit is the visible proof that Christ lives within us. Gifts show power, but fruit shows character. The Spirit's work is not only to empower, but to transform. True disciples are known not only by what they do, but by who they become through the Spirit's work in them.

The Call

The Holy Spirit is God's gift to every believer, but He will not force His way. We must receive Him, walk with Him, and obey His leading.

He draws us, teaches us, rebukes us, comforts us, and empowers us. He makes us alive and fills us with gifts and fruit so we can glorify God.

The question is: are you willing to let the Spirit work in you?

The Spirit will never take control of a heart that refuses to surrender. He does not dwell where sin is defended or where pride rules. He waits for those who are humble and willing to be led. The measure of His power in your life depends on your obedience. The more you yield, the more He fills. The more you resist, the more distant He becomes.

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To walk in the Spirit means to trust His voice even when it convicts you, to follow His direction even when it costs you, and to rely on His strength instead of your own. He is not an occasional presence but a daily guide. When you listen, He leads. When you obey, He transforms. When you grieve Him, He withdraws His comfort until repentance restores fellowship again.

The Spirit is calling every believer to deeper surrender. He wants to break chains, heal wounds, and produce lasting fruit that honors God. The question is not whether the Spirit is willing to work, but whether you are willing to let Him. If you truly desire to live for God, the Holy Spirit is ready to lead you into a life that reflects the power, holiness, and love of the one who sent Him.

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
