Answers to the quiz.

- Which side does the name tag go on?
 The name tag goes on the right.
- Why printing your name in color and in large letters on a name tag is a good thing?
 It is good to print in large letters (with a colored pen if possible) because the person looking at it can more easily read your name correctly without squinting at your shoulder.
- What are the "never-do" actions when using a napkin?

The "never-do" actions for using a napkin:

- 1. Don't leave it sitting on the table throughout the meal.
- 2. Don't tuck your napkin in your shirt collar or in your belt.

3. Don't wave it around trying to attract the server.

4. Don't make a fuss about folding it and placing it in your lap.

- 5. Don't crumple your napkin and place it on your dinner plate when you have finished.
- Where is the napkin placed to alert the server you are leaving—and not returning?
 Loosely folded and placed to the left of the dinner plate.
- Why are a fork and spoon placed above your dinner plate?
 They are used for dessert.
- What does a ticket buy you at a stadium?
 Your seat.
- What does "out of bounds" mean at the dinner table?
 Your space at the dinner table is the width of your chair. If you stick your elbows beyond this space, you are "out of bounds."
- How can you invent an "extra hand" at a tailgate function or any function) to hold
 plate and napkin and still have a free hand for cleaning your fingers before shaking
 hands?

You can take a small napkin or a folder larger napkin and place it between your second and fourth fingers, held in place by your third finger, and place your small plate on top of it. This allows you to freshen your fingers and frees your right hand to shake.
