ELLUM THICKET NEIGHBOR BRINGS CHRISTMAS CHEER THROUGH LIGHTS

Ellum Thicket neighbors are in luck if they have not made their way over to Robin Road to see the phenomenal Christmas lights display. In honor of the 40 days of Christmas, the lights will be up through Feb. 2, 2026. The majority of the Christmas display is located from University Blvd. to Locksley Avenue. The festivity is brought by longtime Elm Thicket/Northpark neighbor Marco D., who moved into his home in the 7200 Block of Robin Road in 2008. In what began with his own yard, he has single-handedly organized the Christmas lights display on his street for more than 10 years. The display follows the Christian tradition of the 40 days of Christmas.

The wonderfully cheerful light display has grown to a total of 14 homes along Robin Road and Morton Street. It's been a labor of love for Marco from the beginning.

In 2013, Marco wanted to help some neighbors experiencing health and mental concerns have a brighter Christmas season. So he offered to help decorate their properties with Christmas lights.

"It gave them a lot of joy and pleasure," Marco said. "I believe these lights help with recovering from ailments and can help you heal faster. It made me feel good about what I was doing for them."

Christmas Lights Bring Joy to ETNP (From Page 1)

Marco picked up the cost of all the lights and even connected his neighbor to his power supply so there would be no cost to them. With the addition of another neighbor's house the following year, the work started to become more than he could handle by himself. By either 2017 or 2018, Marco hired a work crew and rented a cherry picker to help with the set up. There were a couple of big trees, affectionately named "Megatreton" and "Treezilla" that had huge trunks and limbs that could be quickly strung by the crew in the cherry picker. When those got lit up, it was a sight to behold Marco recalled.

That's when the other neighbors took notice and wanted to join in the festivity.

The biggest expansion of the lights along Robin Road began during the COVID-19 pandemic. Marco spoke about how people were confined to their homes and feeling down. Marco stepped up and got several more neighbors involved and more lights and decorations went up.

"The Christmas of 2020 was something special," said Marco. "People would drive up the street with their elderly parents or young children in their cars. My life had been so full of stress and I came out to stand on my porch to see the lights and it was a blessing."

It was during that time that Marco saw a transformation among his neighbors. "People started talking to each other," he said. "The community came together with the presence of the lights no matter their background. People all over loved the lights. Bringing people together, especially during COVID, transcended what I had originally intended."

As for Christmas 2026, if you live along Robin Road or Morton Street and want to become involved in the festive Christmas decorations, Marco says you can call him at 214-734-1229. He is already making plans to make the display more entertaining. He would like to add some music and maybe organize a group of Christmas Carolers to bring even more joy to the neighborhood.

While the cost of purchasing and putting up the the hundreds of thousands of lights can be substantial, Marco said the happiness and joy he gets from meeting neighbors and seeing the happy faces of people who visit the street makes it worthwhile.

"I don't have to do this," Marco said. "I don't have children and I'm not looking for attention. I feel compelled to give people a lot of joy. I want to make Ellum Thicket a better place."
