### **Mast Rd**

Mast Road got its name from the large white pine trees that were reserved by the King to make masts for the Royal Navy when New Hampshire lands were first granted. The quality of the trees were especially good, hence the nickname "Mast Road."

#### Piscataquog

Indigenous people used the Piscataquog as an important travel corridor, with trails running along the riverbank from Manchester to Francestown. The river's name translates as "to the place of the dark river." Stands of large white pine and red oak attracted early settlers, with some of the massive trees reserved by the King of England for British Navy ship masts.

# Pinard

Pinardville, named after Edmond Pinard, a grocer who owned property on the Manchester/Goffstown town line. Mr. Pinard developed the entire area bearing his name. Many of the streets in the area are named after family members. In the early 1900s, Mr. Pinard donated 12 lots of land to build St. Edmonds Church and School.

### Amoskeag



The Amoskeag Mfg. Co.

was a textile manufacturer, founded Manchester, NH.

From modest beginnings it grew throughout the 19th century into the largest cotton textile plant in the world. At its peak, Amoskeag had 17,000 employees and around 30 buildings.
