Step 1: Define the Learning Objectives

Step 3: Set Up the Logistics

- Determine the minutes per station with a timer to manage transitions.
- Establish clear expectations for behavior and movement between stations.
- Prepare and organize materials for each station in advance.

Step 4: Differentiate Activities

- Adapt tasks for varying skill levels to meet all students' needs.
- Use tools like choice boards, leveled activities, or scaffolded instructions.

Step 5: Communicate Expectations

- Explain station procedures, goals, and behavior norms to students.
- Use visual aids or anchor charts for added clarity as needed.

Step 6: Facilitate and Monitor

- During rotations, circulate to observe, adjust, and support as needed.
- Use the teacher-led station for targeted interventions or small-group instruction as needed.

Step 7: Assess and Reflect

- Review and or collect student work or reflections from each station.
- Use observations and outcomes to evaluate the effectiveness of the stations and adjust for future rotations.
