It is simply amazing how beneficial oak trees are; they capture carbon, they help manage the watershed, they support a diverse community of pollinators, and they support a complex food web. So, plant an oak!

We have also been provided with an opportunity to receive two free admissions per person to attend the Maryland Home and Garden Show February 28 – March 1 and March 6 – March 8. Information has been sent to all District Directors for distribution to our members. Details can be found in this newsletter.

The NGC initiative **PLANT AMERICA**: Blue and Gold Star Memorial Beautification Program is in full swing. Grants of up to **\$1,000** are available for direct project expenses. Approved applicants receive **75% up front** and the remaining **25% after submitting a final report**.

Here are a few suggestions for plants:

- RED – cardinal flower, Indian paintbrush, scarlet sage
- WHITE – white prairie clover, white wild indigo, common boneset
- BLUE – Texas bluebonnet, great blue lobelia, sky blue aster

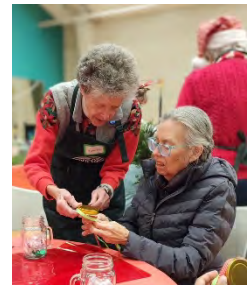

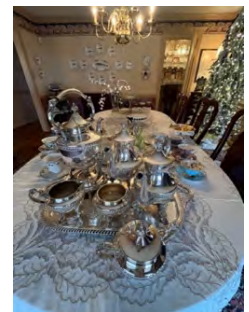

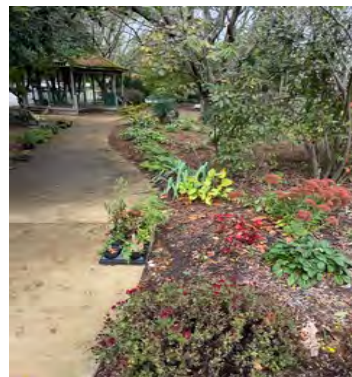

Halten Garden Club is pleased to announce that we have received a National Garden Clubs “Plant America” Grant for \$2,000.00, which will be used for The Herb Garden at Sherwood House, Cromwell Valley Park, Towson, MD, built in 1935 by Mr. and Mrs. Donald Henry Sherwood.

Member Leslie Speer composed and submitted the application with input from club members. The application contained our project mission, the history of Sherwood, Halten’s stewardship of the garden over the years, detailed plant and material lists, and volunteer hours calculations (members and local high school student volunteers).

Halten GC has been associated with the Sherwood House in Cromwell Valley Park since 1994, maintaining the herb garden, which was created in 1935 originally as a culinary garden for vegetables and herbs. Over the years, the change in weather/climate conditions and increased pressure from invasive plants and deer/wildlife require the club to reconsider plant selection and placement. Major plantings were done in 1994 and 2023. Also, in 2023 Halten agreed to include a larger adjacent area under a holly tree as part of our project, thus doubling the planting area, bringing the total garden to 1250 square feet.

Halten GC had already planned to refresh the garden in 2026 as we address climate change paying attention to “right plant, right place” and installation of hardscaping for erosion control and bed definition. It will include herbs tolerant of all seasons, perennial native plants and groundcovers (that are not invasive) for pollinators, resulting, eventually, in dense plantings. Educational signage will tell the importance of native pollinator plants and herbs to the community.

We hope that, with 25,000 to 40,000 visitors annually, this beautiful garden in Cromwell Valley Park will continue to invite and educate all!

Frederick County Garden Clubs

Restoration and Revitalization of the South Frederick Arboretum at the Frederick County Public Schools' Earth and Space Science Lab



For the past three years, FGCMD's Frederick County Garden Clubs (Green-walled, Tasker's Chance and The Garden Club of Frederick) along with Bryan Dwyer, Scout Leader Troop 274, have collaborated to restore and revitalize the South Frederick Arboretum at the Frederick County Public Schools' Earth and Space Science Lab.

On October 25, 2025, club members planted 10 new native shrubs to augment the understory of the larger trees and to provide food and shelter for smaller birds and animals.

The understory is the layer of vegetation beneath the canopy of larger, mature trees, consisting of smaller, shade-tolerate trees, shrubs and herbaceous plants. This layer provides habitat and food for wildlife, contributes to the overall health of the ecosystem by absorbing carbon dioxide, and adds visual interest to a landscape. Plants in the understory have adaptations, like rapid spring growth, to survive in the lower light conditions found there.

At the November 2025 Green-walled Garden Club meeting, guest speaker Ray Crough presented **"The Buzz on Keeping Bees."**

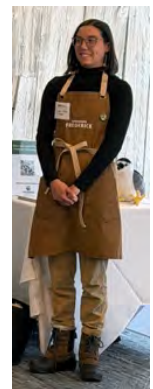

Carol Phillips has graciously volunteered her garage for this workshop for the past few years, and we really appreciate her support.

At our last Holiday Decoration Workshop on December 4, 2025, club members got together to make decorations for the following locations: Pine Grove Chapel, Carroll County Senior Center, Carroll County Public Library and the Carroll County Volunteer Fire Department.

The day before the workshop, a committee of club members went to the homes of members that had volunteered their bushes and trees to be pruned. They worked together to cut branches of live greens that would be needed for the next day’s workshop. Many different types of evergreens including Pine, Spruce, and Magnolia were collected.



The day of the workshop, club members busily worked in small groups with assembly-line organization to make the decorations. One group cut evergreen pieces to specific lengths. Another group put the pieces together to make clusters and wired the clusters to the wreath and swag frames. Mountain Laurel Garden Club, Barb Davis, Deborah Hutton, Co-Presidents

Local Sourcing The Mountain Laurel Garden Club’s annual holiday dinner traditionally includes a centerpiece fundraiser. The club’s floral design committee goes out of its way to create an array of stunning arrangements that far exceed the cost of each centerpiece. For the 2025 MLGC Holiday party, the Horticulture Committee was tasked with finding unusual greenery for each of the designs, not an easy winter assignment in Maryland’s snowiest and coldest county. But Garrett County is fortunate to be home to an abundance of unique clubmosses, an ancient group of lycophytes that date back to the Carboniferous Period.



These clubmosses, especially Crowsfoot (**Southern Ground Cedar**), have been a popular addition to winter floral designs. Valued for their texture and softness, moisture retention, and cascading effect, clubmosses prove to be a beautiful addition to winter floral arrangements. While not all clubmosses are legal to harvest and may not be removed from any public land or without permission from private landowners, none of the clubmosses available in our neck of the woods are on the state’s endangered list or in threat of extirpation.

One of our region’s many clubmosses’ characteristics is the ability to endure extreme cold. The foraging for winter greenery brought forth a bountiful collection from MLGC members’ properties of not only hemlock, white pine, juniper, and holly but Crowsfoot (*Diphasiastrum digitatum*), Common Clubmoss (*Lycopodium clavatum*), and Flat-branched Tree-Clubmoss (*Dendrolycopodium obscurum*) – all of which were above inches of snow-covered backyards. If you are interested in learning more about 13 species of clubmoss unique to Maryland, check out this article written by Jim Brighton of the Maryland Biodiversity Project: **Garrett County Clubmoss Extravaganza**.

Winter Sowing The Mountain Laurel Garden Club has wasted no time in 2026, diving straight into winter, sowing hundreds of seeds to begin their journey from seed to plant. Many of these seeds were carefully collected from local members’ gardens during late summer and fall, preserving regional genetics and ensuring our plants will grow in a Western Maryland climate.

Using recycled milk jugs cut in half (with a hinge left intact), we created miniature greenhouses filled with a soil mix amended with organic all-purpose plant food. These hardy seeds were placed outside for spring germination. They will be used this year in our upcoming Habitat for Humanity native plant garden and sold at our annual June plant sale fundraiser, which will feature a wide selection of native plants, perennials, and annuals.

Keeping track of those little guys is key to success. Careful labeling, numbering, and cataloging allow us to manage more than 30 different plant varieties, including *Allium cernuum* (nodding onion), *Echinacea purpurea* (echinacea), *Liatris spicata* (blazing star), *Monarda didyma* (bergamot), *Nepeta* spp. (catmint), *Nigella damascene* (love-in-a-mist), *Penstemon* spp. (the beardtongues), *Stokesia laevis* (Stokes aster), *Vernonia noveboracensis* (iron weed), and many more—ensuring correct identification from winter sowing through planting day.

This project reflects the Mountain Laurel Garden Club’s focus on restorative gardening—supporting a healthy environment, resilient plants, and long-term benefits for our community.

- Presented a specially requested Holiday Greens and Candle Centerpiece Workshop for a non-federated garden club...

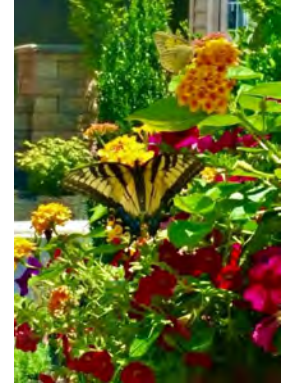

Conservation and Environmental Awareness: **Carolyn Braverman, Chair**

Have you had pushback from an HOA if you wanted to convert all/part of your lawn to a meadow or a wildlife-beneficial area? Maryland House Bill [HBO322/CHO368](#), “Real Property - Restrictions on Use - Low-Impact Landscaping,” passed on October 1, 2021 will back you up. See www.Maryland.gov for a more information. **Chapter 368 of HBO322 has the details.**

Bill Summary: “Low-impact landscaping” means landscaping techniques that conserve water, lower maintenance costs, provide pollution prevention, and create habitat for wildlife. Such techniques include bio-habitat gardens designed to attract wildlife and pollinator gardens designed to attract pollinator species.

Restrictions on use may not impose unreasonable limitations on low-impact landscaping as long as the property owner (1) owns or has the right to exclusive use of the property and (2) maintains and regularly tends to the low-impact landscaping. Unreasonable limitations on low-impact landscaping include provisions that significantly increase the cost of low-impact landscaping or significantly decrease the efficiency of the techniques.

At the recent District V semiannual meeting October 9, Rob Schnabel, [Chesapeake Bay Foundation](#), gave a presentation about Regenerative Farming, as opposed to Sustainable Farming. The difference was very interesting, as the former method concentrated on improvement going forward, rather than maintaining current methods. It is important that farming can be profitable, as well as beneficial, and these practices can help farmers be successful. You can learn more about this practice at Noble Institute: www.noble.org and Natural Resources Defense Council: www.nrdc.org. The Climate Action Committee has published an October issue concentrating on our birds.

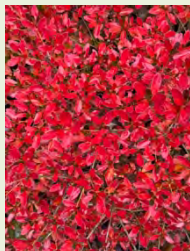
