REUBEN'S RAMBLINGS

When we were at First UMC in Grants, we took 10 youths and 10 adults on a mission trip to Seward, Alaska. On our way home, we spent two nights at Saint John UMC in Anchorage. In their sanctuary is a 17-foottall Easter Totem Pole. For centuries, the Native Americans in Alaska have used totem poles to preserve their stories and events. In the absence of a written language, these carvings on cedar logs were the nearest thing that the people had to books. The characters on the pole provided an outline so that after hearing the story, the people could tell the story for generations.

Rev. David Fison and his wife Aleen and children came to Alaska as United Methodist missionaries in 1960. While serving as pastor of the church in Ketchikan, David became intrigued by the great totem poles of the area. After years of research into the local culture and the art of totem poles, he carved the Easter Totem Pole and a 12-foot Christmas Totem Pole.

Using depictions of humans, birds, fish, and mammals,

stacked on top of or within one another, the Easter Totem Pole tells the story of Holy Week from the Last Supper to the Resurrection. Starting from bottom to top, the Easter Totem Pole depicts the following:

- Jesus washing the disciples' feet
- 2. The Last Supper with smoked salmon and berry juice replacing bread and wine
- The Cup of Sorrows (Gethsemane) – Jesus' hands reach out to take the cup
- 4. Judas' betrayal a necklace of thirty shells replaces the thirty pieces of silver
- Peter's denial/wolf the howl of a wolf takes the place of the roster's crow
- 6. Pilate washes his hands
- The Crucifixion Jesus' crown made of a plant native to Alaska; set of beaver teeth dice
- 8. The Empty Tomb a crack across the bottom signifies an earthquake
- 9. Raven (Angel) announces Christ's resurrection
- Resurrection and Ascension trifold hands represent the Trinity

I found the totem pole to be fascinating. I even bought a 27-inch model which I keep in my office. This

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model will be in the Narthex during Holy Week. Rev. Fison took the traditions and culture of the Native American people of Alaska and told the gospel story. He did not compromise it, he just told it in a different way.

In a way the Bible is our totem pole. How do we tell the gospel story, the crucifixion and the Resurrection? Do we know the story well enough to retell it to our family, children, grandchildren and friends? During Holy Week, please take advantage of the different worship services on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter morning. Join us for our Sunrise Service at 6:30 am and watch the sun rise over the Sandia Mountains. Also stay for some refreshments and our traditional services at 9 and 11 am as we retell the story of God's love and redemption through the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. He Is Risen!

APRIL SECOND MILE GIVING

KEEP THE BELL RINGING



Our Second Mile Giving for April will go to providing assistance to St. Joseph Mission School in San Fidel, New Mexico. Over the past three years, we have developed a great working relationship with St. Joseph. St. Joseph Mission School is a Pre-K through 8th grade Catholic School that shares the gospel of hope through faith,

academics, culture, environment and service. Since 1923 the bell at St. Joseph Mission School has rung to begin and end the day, educating and spreading the gospel of hope to local children; currently there are 40 students from the Pueblos of Laguna and Acoma and from the local villages of Seboyeta, Cubero and San Fidel. Tuition is low and does not cover the total cost of educating a child. Even with their low tuition rate many families have to rely on tuition assistance from various organizations. The difference is made up through grants and donations. Several times in the 100 years of their existence, St. Joseph has come close to closing its doors, but a higher power has kept it open even when it seemed impossible. FOR I WAS HUNGRY AND YOU GAVE ME FOOD!

Following the guidance of Jesus in Matthew 25, High Desert UMC has made it their mission to feed the hungry as God gives us the opportunity. Currently, we are actively involved in four mission projects:

- 1. The High Desert Methodist Food Pantry provides food to about 200 families (approximately 500 people) monthly. With the support of monthly donations by the congregation, Mesa View UMC and Roadrunner Food Bank, food is distributed on the first Friday, third Tuesday and third Thursday of each month.
- 2. Feed New Mexico Kids which provides 450 food packages to five local schools so that at least 125 food-challenged students have nutritious snacks to carry them through the weekend until they are able to take advantage of the free meals offered at school. Volunteers purchase the food and gather the second Monday of each month to assemble the food packages.
- 3. For several years, we have been purchasing \$450 of food each month for the Interfaith Bible Center (IBC) in the International Zone in Albuquerque. IBC provides meals daily to the homeless in addition to showers and shelter. Last year we purchased a new refrigerator and freezer for IBC so they could safely store food donated by local restaurants and grocery stores.
- 4. We have been supporting the Gallup Nazarene Church's outreach to the homeless in Gallup and the elder residents of the Navajo Nation. Each quarter we purchase and deliver approximately \$2,000 worth of lunch food. A team of church members travel to Gallup to help assemble and distribute sack lunches to the homeless. In December, we purchased a new refrigerator for the church. Recently, the Lord opened another door of opportunity, and now we are providing 24 boxes of groceries to be distributed each month to the elder residents of the Navajo Nation.

If you are interested in starting a ministry to feed the hungry, it would be our privilege to share our experience.


