We are almost at the end of our journey through Lent. Over the past few weeks, we have been studying the Beatitudes as recorded in the fifth chapter of the Gospel of Matthew, verses 1-12. We have been asking ourselves three critical questions: "Who is Jesus Christ to me?" "What is my personal relationship with Him?" and "What must I do to grow closer to Him?" It is my hope and prayer that these discussions have helped you in your walk with the Lord. I also hope that you will join us for the Maundy Thursday Service on April 1 at 6 pm when we will have a short drama focusing on how Peter, John and Judas viewed the first Lord's Supper. Then join us the next day April 2 at 12 noon for "The Way of the Cross." This service is based on the Stations of the Cross – a devotion developed in the Middle Ages by the Franciscans as a way of allowing people who could not travel to the Holy Land to walk where Christ walked on the day of His crucifixion. And I do hope that you will join us on Easter morning April 4 as we celebrate the Risen Lord. We will begin

with a Sunrise Service in the church parking lot at 6:30 am. Since we will be outside in the fresh air, I have been told that we can all sing those wonderful Easter hymns! However, if you cannot get up that early, please join us for either the 9 am or 11 am worship services. There is no place like church on Easter!

Well, spring is here; we're in Daylight Saving Time, the trees are starting to bloom, the wind is howling, the pollen count is through the roof, and it's spring-cleaning time. This is the time of the year when we start thinking about all those projects that we put off during the cold winter months. Unfortunately, as we get older, we are not able to do all the things we did earlier in life such as climb a ladder. To help those of us who are our Good Friday Service entitled not able to do some of the routine maintenance on our homes, High Desert is planning to establish a work team called "Helping Hands."

Southern HUMMINGBIRD CAKE



Makes a 9 inch, 3-layer cake

Ingredients: All-Purpose Flour

1	tsp	Salt
1	tsp	Baking Soda
1	tsp	Cinnamon
3		Eggs, beaten
1-1/2	cups	Vegetable Oil
1-1/2	tsp	Vanilla extract
1	8oz can	Crushed Pineapple, undrained
2	cups	Pecan halves, toasted
2	cups	Chopped Banana (3-4 bananas)

FROSTING:

16	OZ	Cream Cheese, softened
1	cup	Butter, softened
1	tsp	Vanilla extract
2	cups	Powdered Sugar, sifted

Prep Work:

- · Pre-heat your oven to 350 degrees.
- Toast the pecan halves on a baking sheet for approx 10 minutes, stirring once or twice until aromatic. Let cool. Set aside 12 halves for decorating the cake. Chop the remaining pecans into small pieces.
- Grease and flour 3 9 in. round cake pans.
 Optional: To insure easy release from the pan, line the bottoms with parchment paper (after greasing but before dusting with flour).
- Chop Bananas and set aside.

Instructions:

- In a large bowl, whisk together the dry ingredients (Flour, Sugar, Salt, Baking Soda & Cinnamon).
- Stir in the wet ingredients (Eggs, Vegetable Oil, Vanilla and Crushed Pineapple with juice).
- Stir in the chopped Bananas and the chopped Pecans just until combined.
- 4. Spoon batter evenly into the 3 pans.
- Bake at 350 for 25 30 minutes, until a toothpick comes out clean in the center.
- Cool cakes in the pans for 10 minutes. Remove from pans and cool completely (about 1 hour).
- MAKE THE FROSTING: Beat the Cream Cheese and Butter until fluffy. Beat in the Vanilla. Gradually beat in the sifted Powdered Sugar.
- Use the frosting to fill and frost the cake. Decorate with the remaining pecan halves.

Women With Purpose Meeting -


Thursday, April 1, 10 a.m. in the sanctuary.


