So how is your prayer life? Is it strong? Is it a regular part of your daily routine or do you pray only when you have a problem or crisis? Do you follow the example of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and have a daily quiet time alone with your Heavenly Father? Mark 1:35 tells us: "Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where He prayed." Jesus was able to deal with all the demands and problems of life because He had carved out time each day in His busy schedule to be alone with God in prayer, and to have His batteries recharged, so to speak.

It is in the "alone times" with God that we can reflect on all that is happening in our lives. It is in these "alone times" with God that we allow God to help us sort out the priorities of our daily life. If we are to properly deal with the demands and pressures in our lives then we must spend time alone with God. It is in our quiet time of prayer, before the alarm clock goes off, the radio blasts, and the phone starts ringing, that we can get our daily marching orders from God.

When we start each day with prayer, we can withstand its

demands and problems, because our spiritual batteries have been recharged. The following sayings may help to clarify this:

- 1. A lot of kneeling will keep you in good standing.
- 2. He who kneels before God can stand before anyone.
- The shortest distance between a problem and a solution is the distance between your knees and the floor.
- 4. The measure of any Christian is their prayer life.
- 5. Finally, life is fragile, handle with prayer!

There is no limit to the power of prayer; we have all seen this in our lives and in the church. James 5:16 states: "The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective." The Jews had a saying that he who prays surrounds his house with a wall stronger than iron. To them, prayer was nothing short of tapping into the power of God; it was a channel through which the strength and grace of God were brought to bear on the problems of life. For the Christian, praying should be like breathing. Taking our praises and concerns to God should be second nature to us. Prayer should always be our first choice, not our last resort.

Prayer is at the heart of religion. For in prayer, we stop talking about religion and enter into a personal, one-on-one relationship with God. Prayer, in its highest form, is communion and encounter with God. When we pray, we sense the very presence of God in our lives. Through prayer God meets us where we are and summons us to a new life, offering us the opportunities to become the person that He created us to be.

It is my hope and prayer that each one of us will strive to improve our prayer lives and spend more time with the Lord each day. I would encourage you to pray for others, our church and country, and get involve in our prayer chain. In addition, as I noted in my sermon on January 30, I also encourage you, as you are able, to establish a Neighborhood Prayer Walk with friends and neighbors. As you traverse your neighborhood streets, let the Spirit guide your prayers and thoughts for the safety, health and spiritual well-being for the homes you pass. Not only will you be "loving your neighbor," but you will also be getting the exercise that we all need to stay physically healthy. During this year, let's be Prayer Warriors for the Lord. God Bless.














LENTEN SERMON SERIES

24 HOURS THAT CHANGED THE WORLD

Jesus is believed to have died at the age of 33. The Gospel writers devoted most of their writing to the last three years of His life; with their primary interest on one particular day – the day He was crucified. They believed this 24-hour period changed the world, and each Gospel moves towards that day.

Beginning Thursday evening after sunset and lasting through Friday, Jesus would eat the Last Supper with His disciples; pray in the Garden of Gethsemane; be betrayed and deserted by His friends; be convicted of blasphemy by the religious authorities; be tried and sentenced for insurrection by Pontius Pilate; be tortured by Roman soldiers; and undergo crucifixion, death, and burial. During Lent this year, we will explore the following topics using Adam Hamilton's book *24 Hours That Changed the World*:

March 6 - The Last Supper

March 13 - The Garden of Gethsemane

March 20 - Condemned by the Righteous

March 27 - Jesus, Barabbas, and Pilate

April 3 - The Torture and Humiliation of the King

April 10 Palm Sunday - The Crucifixion

April 17 Easter – Do You Hear Him Calling Your Name?

ANSWER FOR JANUARY: Who is Barabbas in the New Testament?



KEEP THE BELL RINGING

Our Second Mile Giving for February will go to providing assistance to St. Joseph Mission School in San Fidel, New Mexico. St. Joseph School is a Pre-K through 8 grade Catholic School that shares the gospel of hope through faith, academics, culture, environment and service. Since 1923 the bell tower at St. Joseph School has rung to begin and end the day, educating and spreading the gospel of hope to local children; Native Americans from the Pueblos of Laguna and Acoma and Hispanics from the local villages of Seboyeta, Cubero and San Fidel. Tuition is low and does not cover the cost of educating a child. Even at their low tuition rate many families have to rely on tuition assistance from various organizations. The difference is made up through grants and donations. Several times in the 98 years of their existence, St. Joseph has come close to closing its doors, but a higher power has kept it open even when it seemed impossible. What is Community of Hope?

Community of Hope is a combined effort of many different churches volunteering to prepare and serve a meal to the homeless community in downtown Albuquerque. This meal is prepared for 60-80 persons at the Central First United Methodist Church.

Every Sunday a participating church prepares a meal and serves it to those in need. Along with the meal, anyone who wants can stay and listen to music, prayer and a short sermon.

Due to Covid it is not currently possible to sit and talk with the participants, but you are able to walk to each table and say hello if you want to.

On Sunday, January 23, 2022, it will be High Desert United Methodist Church's turn to prepare and serve the meal. For those of you who are not familiar with the process, this is how it works.

It all starts by choosing the menu, then a list of the necessary items is made. That is where you come in. A sign-up sheet is provided for you to choose which item you would like to purchase and bring to the church on the date specified. Some of you may think you are unable to help because you cannot get out to make a purchase; well, if this is the case you can make a donation by writing "Community of Hope" on your check or on a cash envelope. We also need a couple of people to go and help prepare and serve the meal. Due to Covid we usually only have two people, but if more want to sign up we can always use the help.

This month we will be serving Enchilada Casserole, beans and a fruit cup for the main meal. Also a to-go bag with juice, a granola bar, 2 hardboiled eggs, a banana and some chocolate will be provided.

Dave and I sincerely thank Steve and Gloria Lamoreux for helping to prepare and serve the meal and also to everyone who signs up to purchase the needed items or make a cash donation. This ministry would not be possible without your generous, loving and giving hearts.


