Sometimes we don't know or realize the impact a kind word, an act of kindness or a service project will have. If you remember last summer in July, we replaced the old waterline at the St. Joseph Mission School in San Fidel, New Mexico, with a new 440-foot waterline. This waterline ran from the well house next to the convent across a county road to the school and now provides an adequate supply of fresh water to the school and students. When we installed the new line. we decided to also install a frostfree faucet in a field in front of the convent so that the school could have a garden and grow watermelons and pumpkins. When we went out to San Fidel last month to present the students at St. Joseph Mission School with the Christmas gift cards that you generously provided, Antonio Trujillo, the principal, told us that while families throughout the State celebrated Thanksgiving, some residents of the Acoma Pueblo went without running water. In October, the Pueblo's main waterline failed. When Antonio heard about this, he offered the residents water from their well. Antonio said that people lined

up at the faucet that we installed this past summer to fill their tanks and containers. Little did we know when we decided to put that faucet in how beneficial it would be to the residents of the Acoma Pueblo during the recent water crisis.

On a very snowy Sunday morning in Colchester, England, only a handful of people showed up at the Primitive Methodist Church; even the preacher didn't make it. Those present were about ready to leave without a service when a young 15-year-old boy came in out of the blizzard. Then one of the men volunteered to lead the worship. He struggled through a ten-minute sermon. At the end, he turned to the young man and shouted: "Young man, look to Jesus Christ. Look! Look!" Unknown to those present at the time, and especially the lay speaker, the young man accepted Jesus Christ into his heart and would go on to become the great nineteenth century English pastor and evangelist, Charles Hadden Spurgeon. Like the struggling lay speaker, you never know what impact your words and acts of kindness will have.

We are called to make a difference in this world, to leave things better than we found them. Think about it January, 2023, Issue 1

-if each person did their best for the Lord each and every day what a difference it would make in the world around us. The way of Jesus Christ is clear: love and service. Examples are all around us. We can't change the world overnight, but each one of us can do our part to make this a better place to live and show God's love through acts of love and kindness to all we meet.

Let us follow these words of wisdom from John Wesley:
"Do all the good you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as you can."

Living as Disciples

The word disciple is used in the Bible to describe someone who closely followed a spiritual leader, or "rabbi", with the intent of learning and doing. While the twelve called by Jesus are known as his disciples, Jesus never intended for the number of disciples to end at twelve. The Great Commission recorded in the gospel of Matthew makes it clear that we are also to be His disciples.

"And Jesus came and said to them, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.' "- Matthew 28:18-20

Have you ever wondered what it means to live like a disciple? I came up with a list of four actions to think about. Perhaps there is an area where you can focus on this month as you walk with Christ to live as one of His disciples.
