REUBEN'S RAMBLINGS

I love baseball. I played it as a child and have had the privilege to coach both of my sons in little league as they were growing up. And now I have had the great opportunity to coach both of my grandsons. This spring with my son Ben we coached Logan's team at Eastdale Little League on Alameda. After the first two practices, Ben and I looked at each other and said that we would be lucky to win one game. But due to the dedication and efforts of those twelve boys, they won nine games and the league championship. As I have shared before, Logan had the game of his life that night. He had four hits, drove in several runs, caught a critical flyball and pulled off the only triple play of the season in the league.

One evening, Judy and I were early for a game and as I sat there and looked out at the ball field, I thought about how baseball is a lot like life. Some of the aspects of the game of baseball also apply to life. Consider the following for example:

1. No one is perfect; no player gets a hit every time at bat. No pitcher or team wins every game. It's the same in life, while we get a few hits and may even score some runs, we will strike out at times. God is patient with us even when we strike out and fall short of being the servant He wants. We worship and serve a God of second chances.
2. Hope springs eternal: the start of every season inspires hope. Every team expects to win the championship. When we accept Jesus Christ into our hearts, we get a new start on life. With this new life comes hope.
3. Don't get discouraged, keep trying. Baseball, like life, is a game of high and low points – homeruns and strike outs. As Christians, we are called to keep going, put our mistakes behind us and walk in faith; remember in Jesus Christ there is hope.
4. Every batter has heard the term "keep your eyes on the ball." At times, life will throw us a change-up, curve ball and an occasional inside fastball that knocks us down. Jesus never promised us a rose garden, but He did promise to always be with us. In Matthew 6:33, He tells us to seek first His kingdom; in other words, keep our eyes on Him.
5. Be a good sport. I told you about the water balloon fight following the championship game. The kids on both teams didn't care who won or lost; they just had fun. In John 13:34-35, Jesus said: "A new command I give you: Love one another." The word Jesus uses here for love is agape which means seeking the best for the other person no matter what they have done or said about us.
6. In our league, everybody gets to play no matter their ability. In the same way, the Church is made up of many different people with different backgrounds and opinions. Each of us are to use our spiritual gifts in the service of the Lord. As the body of Christ, we are to support and encourage each other.
7. Finally, enjoy the game whether you are a player or a spectator. Jesus said that He came that we may have life and have it abundantly. We have only one life to live; let's live it for Jesus Christ.

I once had a T-shirt that read: "Life Begins with Baseball." Many die-hard baseball fans would agree with that statement, but for me life begins with Jesus Christ. Until we full accept Him into our heart, and walk with Him each and every day, we are not truly living. Put Jesus first and let life begin! Play Ball!

She then decided to try making stuffed bears and more blankets —thanks to Linnette Carlson’s gift of some fleece she had on her closet shelf. Next, we were on the hunt for recipients of our creative offerings! We contacted Officer Monica Casaus of the Rio Rancho Police Department who met with Glynda Samford and me to explain how our “Bear and Blanket Kits” project could bring comfort to children in our community whose lives were in disruption for various reasons. Now the ball was rolling! We shopped for fleece. And MORE fleece! Lisa, with the help of Rose Meyer, was sewing up a storm. Officer Monica suggested we include a bag of toiletries in each kit so Judy Ballard lovingly knitted wash cloths to go with the soap, toothbrush, comb, etc. Our project came together like clockwork!

It was our privilege to have Officer Monica attend our meeting June 3rd. She helped us assemble 20 kits in the largest Ziplock bags I have ever seen. (Thank you, Sissy Othick.) Monica talked to us with warmth and passion as her obvious heart for children was revealed. We so appreciated her time. We loaded up her police vehicle with the kits and sent her off with our prayers and gratitude for her most important work.

And once again we see— little is much when God is in it! What began as a small act of kindness miraculously resulted in a big project involving many willing hands. We hope the kits will bring comfort to children on some very tough days.

I am thinking we will do this project again soon. The need is great.

Community of Hope by Pastor Jon Moore

This past week, during one of our weekday Community Breakfasts, Pastor Jon found himself laying his hand on the shoulder of Brian (his real name has been changed to protect his privacy), a former drug dealer and addict, as Jon prayed for Brian and his son. The day before Brian had lost his housing and had discovered his son was doing drugs. In a truly rare moment, tears flowed down Brian's cheeks. On the following Sunday, Brian offered the public prayer during Community of Hope's worship service.

Community of Hope (CoH) is an official new church plant of the New Mexico Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. Finding shelter at First United Methodist Church, in Downtown Albuquerque, CoH seeks to help people experience the "Big Three" from 1 Corinthians 13 – Faith, Hope, and Love – within a Christian community.

We take care of some of the basic needs of people experiencing poverty and homelessness as an expression of God's unconditional Love for all of us. We feed 3 breakfasts and 1 lunch each week, provide various basic needs like clothing and toiletries, and help people obtain things like driver's licenses or birth certificates or pandemic stimulus checks. For some, being loved is a new experience!

We renew people's Hope that there are people and places who will treat them with dignity, meet them where they are... and that the Church really is doing what Jesus Christ calls the Church to do. As we see the re-ignition of hope in people's lives, we end up able to help people prepare for job interviews or provide work clothes or boots for folks beginning new jobs or furnish basic items when our folks get housing. We find that dignity and respect are infectious and inspiring! **AND** there are plenty of people who aren't grappling with poverty or lack of shelter but are still looking for the Hope in Christ found at the center of Community of Hope.

We encourage one another to deepen faith in our weekly worship service, every Sunday at 1:00pm in the Courtyard of FUMC, Albuquerque. All our ministries of love and hope create space for faith to come alongside as opportunities to pray and have spiritual conversation abound. We look forward to re-launching CoH small groups that were stopped when the pandemic started. This past year has also seen us begin new initiatives to reach out with online worship and an enhanced social media presence on the web.

Community of Hope thanks High Desert UMC for partnering with us in providing Sunday lunches. We know CoH has created mutual ministry for us to come together as we love God and love our neighbors. "We're just doing what Jesus wanted His Church to do."

He will sorely miss the professional relationships and camaraderie he had with the wonderful, dedicated staff in the Teen Clinic but knows that will extend beyond the bounds of work. While both are essential to the success of any endeavor, I believe the differences here are measured in levels.


Let's use a simple example of a ham and egg breakfast: The chicken was involved but the pig was definitely committed.

ANSWER FOR JUNE: Who is Hannah of the Old Testament?

She bargained with God, that if he would grant her a son, she would dedicate him to the Lord's work in the temple. She bore a son and called him Samuel ('Heard by God') and dedicated him just as she agreed. Hannah wrote a magnificent poem of gratitude to God; 1 Samuel 2:1-10.

JULY SECOND MILE GIVING HEIFER INTERNATIONAL

Our Second Mile Giving for July is Heifer International. Its mission is to work with communities to end world hunger and poverty and to care for the Earth. Heifer International was founded by Dan West, a farmer from the Midwest and a member of the Church of the Brethren, who went to the front lines of the Spanish Civil War as an aid worker. He found that giving refugees a cup of milk was not enough; what if they had a cow?

Thus, the Heifer Project adopted the philosophy of "teach a man to fish," by providing animals to families instead of handouts. The animals provide both food and reliable income, as agricultural products such as milk, eggs and honey can be traded or sold at the market. Families are empowered to turn hunger and poverty into hope and prosperity. Since 1944, Heifer International has provided livestock and environmentally sound agricultural training to improve the lives of those who struggle daily. They have been in ministry for 75 years providing animals to 20.7 million families in 125 countries. The goal of every Heifer Project is to help families achieve self-reliance.

Your contributions will be used to purchase animals. The current price is as follows: heifer - \$500; goat - \$120; sheep - \$120; rabbits- \$60 or flock of chicks - \$20. Thank you for your continued support to our mission program.
