REUBEN'S RAMBLINGS

Well, we are halfway through Lent with Easter just around the corner. Lent is a forty-day period between Ash Wednesday and Easter, excluding Sundays. It is a time of self-examination, selfreflection, repentance and spiritual growth for Christians. Now I don't remember much about Lent when I was growing up in the rural South. But as I have grown older and become more active in the church, I recognize that it is a special season in the life of the Church and Christians. It is a time when we ask ourselves: "Who is Jesus Christ to me? What is my personal relationship with Him? What must I do to grow closer to Him?"

Of course, Lent means different things to different people depending on their religious backgrounds. In some cases, individuals give up something during Lent in order to spend more time with the Lord in prayer and Bible reading. In addition to giving up something, you can also share something with others. The Great Commission calls for us to share our faith and to help others

know and accept Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior.

However, we as a church sometimes pursue Christ's command with some misconceptions. For example, many churches believe that faith sharing is a program of the local church and assign it to a specific committee; when in fact faith sharing is the real ministry and commission of the entire church, every Christian.

Another misconception is that there is only one way or approach for sharing our faith. As each one of us is unique in the eyes of God, so each of us shares our faith in different ways as led by the Holy Spirit. To stereotype a certain model as the only way puts unfortunate limitations on power of the gospel. Also, you don't need special training or a seminary degree. It's your story, your relationship with the Lord, so share it from your heart.

Finally, many believe that faith sharing, bringing people to Jesus Christ, is the sole responsibility of the clergy. Nothing could be further from the truth. We are all called to tell our story, what Jesus means to us personally. More than seventy-five percent of the people who become Christians do so because of the testimony, actions and

encouragement of someone they know and trust. Survey after survey and study after study report that when new church members are asked why they chose their church, they respond by pointing to the influence of people in their social network. Research also indicates that the average church member can identify at least six to eight unchurched friends, family members and associates who live within reasonable distance of their local church.

I know that we are still under restrictions due to COVID-19, but as we hopefully start getting back to some sense of normality and approach Easter Sunday, I encourage you to reach out to those who are not currently attending a church and invite them to join us on Easter morning. We are currently planning three services on Easter: a sunrise service at 6:30 am in the front parking lot, and our regular 9 am and 11 am services. Share the Good News: He is Risen. He is Risen Indeed! See you Sunday.



AN INSIDE LOOK AT YOUR HDUMC FOOD PANTRY

Since the start of the COVID pandemic, we have had to make many fundamental changes to our process of delivering food to those less fortunate in our community.

Many of our congregation have volunteered at the food pantry over the years and I wanted to give our non-volunteer members a fresh look at our revised processes that allow us to keep staff and clients safe.

We receive food items delivered regularly from Road Runner Food Bank after we place the order online for either purchased items or free commodities (TEFAP) The Emergency Food Assistance Program. Most items fall under the category as free goods; we pay for very few items during the month.

Our goal is to order products that allow us to provide a well-balanced, nutritious offering to our clients. This includes dairy, cereal, fruits, vegetables, and protein.

Unfortunately, we do not have a voice in the products we receive as free goods, so we accept what they have available and set the "menu' from the products on our shelves.

The COVID-safe practices that have been put in place include mandatory masks, social-distancing and direct deliveries to the client vehicles and for the most part, these changes have been well-accepted by everyone. Where we used to allow the clients into the pantry to "shop", we now pack up the full menu we have available and everyone gets the same food items for that month delivered to their vehicle.

We still must follow the mandate of Road Runner Food Bank and register everyone annually, but once registered during normal distribution, we just need a few minutes to verify residential and financial compliance which allows us to minimize social contact with staff.

We are seeing regular increases in client participation each month as COVID continues and with the support of High Desert United Methodist Church, our volunteers hope to serve those in need for the long-term.

FAIR WINDS BIBLE STUDY

Those members of our church who live at senior care communities have an even stricter environment, being often secluded to their apartments and not seeing others for weeks at a time. Fair Winds Community houses 6 of our members, who we have not seen physically for almost a year. Jade Hogan, Activities Coordinator at Fair Winds, has recently performed a survey with the residents at the Community asking when the COVID restrictions are lessened what activities they would like. One of the most frequent requests was for Bible Studies. Calls were made to our members at Fair Winds asking if they were interested in a pre-recorded bible study on Galatians that they could do on their own and four were interested. Jade Hogan volunteered to physically get the information to the residents, stating she felt a bible study would be such a great thing for them. All four of them were allowed to meet in Pat McMillan's apartment and they actually went through the six weeks in about a week. Pat has now purchased another DVD bible study called "Believing God" It is ten weeks. They are on fire! We have not seen them for about a year, so Pat provided pictures of their group. Way to go ladies!

NEW MEXICO FEED THE KIDS

Dear Church Family,

This is a thank-you letter for your support of one of our important and busy ministries--Feed New Mexico Kids!

As of our last count, since August we have provided over 1,100 bags of food for students in Rio Rancho who are food challenged. These bags which contain eleven different easy-to-open food items can mean the difference between a child going hungry over the weekend or not. Over 2,000 calories and 45 grams of protein are crammed into a gallon bag along with napkins, spoons, and a motivational bookmark. All food items are easily opened and easily prepared. We also include information about our food bank and have gained clients from our community.

Preparing these bags has been especially challenging during the pandemic. Once a month a small group of us put on our masks, show up at church and march around the tables and fill bags. We have our "boxers and tapers" who fill cardboard boxes, tape them shut, label and date them and stack them to await distribution. The very caring and dedicated counselors from Lincoln Middle School and Vista Grande Elementary School swing by each month to haul our gifts of food to the schools and make sure they land in the hands of those students who need them. (Recently the counselor from one school told us how one little boy sought her out the very first day of school, even though school was online and students were not on campus, and pleaded for his bag of food). The counselors have been creative and determined to see that their students have the weekend packs.

High Desert United Methodist Church has supported this ministry for almost two years. Feed New Mexico Kids is under the umbrella of Women With Purpose but the entire congregation has caught a vision for our desire to feed the hungry in Jesus' name and has given monies, food items and time. Of course, the need for food has grown but the giving and support of the congregation has grown as well. At this time we send out 200 food packs a month. Our prayer is that if the need increases, we can fill the gap.

Please know you are making a difference to many families in our community. THANK YOU!


