Have you ever thought about how Christians are different? When a person accepts Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior, does their physical appearance change instantaneously? Do all their problems instantly go away? Do they suddenly live in a rose garden? Are they immediately blessed with financial and material riches?

The answer, of course, is NO! Christians live in the same world with the same problems, financial worries, health issues and dangers as everybody else. But there is a difference once Jesus comes to dwell within their hearts and lives. Christians live with the assurance that they are not alone in life's struggles. Jesus told us in Matthew 28:20 that He will be with us forever – not just on the good times but also when the road gets rough and others desert us. Jesus is always there to comfort and guide us. And He promised us in John 14:26 that He would send us a Counselor, a Comforter, the Holy Spirit to be our guide along this journey of life.

Galatians 5:22 gives us a partial summary of those characteristic qualities that a Christian should strive to exhibit in their lives with the help of the Spirit – love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Space does not allow a detailed discussion of each fruit, but let's look at the first two – love and joy.

God is love; the Bible is God's love letter to us. When asked what was the greatest commandment, Jesus responded: love the Lord your God with all your heart and love your neighbor as yourself. Then in John

13:35, Jesus tells us that others will know that we are His disciples (followers) by how we love each other. The ultimate characteristics of Jesus and His followers is love – love for one another, our fellow human beings. This is defined as agape love which always seeks the best for the other person no matter how they have treated us or what they have said about us.

Now joy is distinctly a Christian word and a Christian concept. Joy is not the same as happiness. Happiness is an emotion, the result of what happens to you. Joy is an attitude. Emotions come and go, but attitudes come and grow. Only Jesus gives this kind of joy.

Are Christians then perfect? NO WAY! We are as human as anybody else and will continue to make mistakes. But with the help of the Holy Spirit, we try to move on to perfection, to become more like Jesus in our attitudes, thoughts, words, and actions each day. Christians are not perfect; we are just forgiven! God Bless.

WOMEN WITH PURPOSE

Imagine if you will for a moment that **WWP** was not Women With Purpose, but a Biblical women's study instead. That idea creates no vibrant action image as we now have--but I digress. About four years ago Pastor Nadine and (Ret) Pastor Leslie Barnett approached Wanda Golsan with an idea to lead a women's study, perhaps 'Women of the Bible' or some such. Right leadership selection, wrong focus. Wanda agreed to head up *some* kind of group if the purpose could be *doing*. And the idea of *women doing something for women in need* was launched: seeds planted, germinated, watered, cared for and grown beyond all reasonable expectations to the bumper crop it is today.

Wanda agreed to lead such a group for one year. There has been no suggestion that she step away or down, nor will there ever be. We started in a cramped Sunday School room on Tuesday mornings and expanded to include an evening meeting. Our numbers grew and we struggled with space to meet. But we persevered! As a united front of women we are formidable to anyone with ideas of quashing our *purpose* which is *doing*.

Our first project was to respond to the needs of incoming women at Haven House, the only battered women's shelter in Sandoval County. Often these women (and sometimes children, too) arrive at that facility with no more than what they are wearing. Our intent was to provide necessary toiletries along with a handbag and something strictly feminine, like a silk scarf. From there our hands-on involvement has included feeding the homeless in the International Zone of Albuquerque (Interfaith Bible Institute), Saranam in Albuquerque that deals with issues of homeless *families* (we provide individual birthday parties for the children), The Heart Gallery of New Mexico that acknowledges the aging-out of girls from foster care who are pregnant or have perhaps already given birth, recently released women from incarceration who deserve a hand up to become productive members of their community (we presently serve two such organizations), created comfort packs for children at risk as identified by Rio Rancho police, Feed New Mexico Kids (we are PROUD of that one!), and snack baskets for first responders, police dept, and fire stations to say THANKS!

Enter the ever-dreaded *pandemic*. Well, we just hiked up our pants, masked up, drenched our hands in sanitizer and socially distanced. There will be no delay in HDUMC's **WOMEN WITH PURPOSE** when we have a need we can fill. Did our Lord not charge us with these words, 'feed my sheep?'



PRECIOUS LORD, TAKE MY HAND

Some people think this great old gospel song was written by the famous big bandleader Tommy Dorsey. It wasn't, the author was named Thomas Andrew Dorsey, and he was the son of a Black revivalist preacher.

Thomas was born in a small town in Georgia in 1899. When he was about eleven, the Dorsey's moved to Atlanta where Thomas was quickly enamored by the blues and began playing piano at a vaudeville theater. Later the family moved to Chicago where he attended classes at the College of Composition and Arranging. Soon he was on stage under the name "Georgia Tom", playing barrelhouse piano in one of Al Capone's Chicago speakeasies and leading jazz bands.

Thomas was converted at the National Baptist Convention in Chicago in 1921 and began writing gospel songs and trying to get them published. It was discouraging at first. He later said, "I borrowed five dollars and sent out 500 copies of my song, "If You See My Savior", to churches throughout the country . . . It was three years before I got a single order. I felt like going back to the blues."

He didn't, and gradually his reputation grew, and his work became known. In August 1932, while leading music in St. Louis, he was handed a telegram bearing the words, "Your wife just died." He rushed to a phone to call home, but all he could hear over the line was "Nettie is dead! Nettie is dead!" A friend drove him through the night, and he arrived home to learn that his baby boy had also died.

"I began to feel that God had done me an injustice," Thomas later said. "I didn't want to serve Him anymore or write any more gospel songs." But the next Saturday, while alone in a friend's music room, he had a "strange feeling" inside—a sudden calm and a quiet stillness. "As my fingers began to manipulate over the keys, words began to fall in place on the melody like drops of water falling from the crevice of the rock:

Precious Lord, take my hand

Lead me on, let me stand

I am tired, I am weak, I am worn. . . "

Today, Thomas A. Dorsey is remembered as the "Father of Gospel Music" and the author of hundreds of gospel songs, like "Peace in the Valley"

As we approach Fall and the students and teachers return to school, we hope to see an increase in the number of families returning to the pantry.

Our numbers have steadily declined each month this year due to any number of reasons: the pandemic 1st and foremost, the government stimulus, increased unemployment bonuses to those who lost their jobs, the heat, etc. We really cannot point to any one reason.

We are also seeing a reduction in the amount of TEFAP (free commodities) we receive from Road Runner, due to manufacturing and distribution disruptions originating from the COVID restrictions.

The science tells us that vaccines are effective but with so much of the population pushing back against the vaccinations, we may never return to the “normal” we once knew before COVID,

Even though participation is reduced, HDUMC Food Pantry volunteers will continue to serve those in need and deliver to them whatever food products we are able to get.



HEROES AMONG US . . .

On this past holiday weekend, at Lake Nokomis in Minneapolis, MN; it was a hot day and many families were enjoying the last few days of Summer while swimming at the beach. At some point, two boys disappeared under the water. When bystanders found them and got them to the beach, both were unconscious and not breathing.

The two boys, ages 8 and 11, were at the beach with their father. Once pulled from the water, a lifeguard and a nurse quickly began CPR and maintained the two until the EMT's arrived. The boys were then transported to a local hospital where they remain in critical condition. The names of the boys were not released but I ask for prayers for the medical staff and for their full recovery.

The lifeguard that was on duty at the beach and the nurse who was at the beach with two young children of her own, were both credited with life-saving efforts in an attempt to save these boys from a tragic accident.

As we all gather to reflect on the events of 9-11, we all need to remember that heroes come in all forms and they all deserve our respect and support; the nurses, law enforcement, fire-rescue, military personnel, teachers and so many more that provide a higher level of service, not just while on duty, but they carry with them an inherent commitment to help others.

I can tell you that my hero does not wear a cape, but rather "scrubs" as the nurse that stepped forward that day to provide what I call a "Legacy of Caring" was our daughter – Tiffany.


BACK BY POPULAR DEMAND
