



SEPTEMBER SECOND MILE GIVING READWEST

Our Second Mile Giving for September is ReadWest which has been serving Rio Rancho for over 20 years. ReadWest is a non-profit adult literacy agency which provides free tutoring for adults in basic reading and English as a second language. One out of every five adults in New Mexico reads below the 5th grade level. Following street signs, reading bus schedules, filling out job applications, or reading prescriptions labels can be very frustrating and even frightening to an adult who struggles to read. ReadWest helps adult learners of English with basic vocabulary, communications for many life and cultural situations as well as helps them to become literate in reading and writing English.

Normally students meet one-on-one with a trained tutor once a week for two hours. The cost to train and support a tutor is close to \$150. The cost to provide instruction to a student is close to \$240. Your donation will help improve the literacy of the members of our community, thus allowing them to live more productive and enriched lives. Congratulations HDUMC – through your second mile giving, you all donated an <u>AMAZING \$2,260</u> so that HDUMC was able to purchase <u>5 Heifers and 3</u> <u>goats.</u> International focus is "Ending poverty begins with agriculture. Their mission is to end hunger and poverty in a sustainable way by supporting and

investing alongside local farmers and their communities.

HEIFER INTERNATIONAL – UP CLOSE AND PERSONAL: God's timing & putting the right people in

the right place! In 2000, on my first mission trip I had an up close & hands on experience with a soon to be Momma heifer in Nicaragua! We were in Casa Blanca, Nicaragua building cinder block house in the aftermath of a hurricane and then aftermath floods.

It was typically 114 degrees & we would come in for our lunch of beans, rice & tortillas each day, take a brief 15-20 siesta to rebuild our endurance before returning to the work site. That particular day, we were late & ended up being in our housing area in the village a little later than usual. Soon some panicked villagers came running to us indicating that a Momma heifer was in serious trouble trying to give birth to her calf. Long story short – Momma had been out in the fields when she went into labor many hours earlier. They had gotten her back to the village, but she was in trouble & distressed. The only person in the village that knew how to handle this situation was not there that day. Two of the calf's hoofs had been visible for a long time & she was not able to deliver her baby. At that point it was assumed that the calf was likely no longer alive & concern and efforts focused on saving the Momma.

So, what did I know about pulling a calf? Nothing but God had placed the right people in the right place at the right time! My 2 roommates were veterinarian tech's & had grown up on ranches! I didn't have the knowledge or experience, but I had strength. With most of the village surrounding the pen & watching, the three of us, with <u>no gloves, supplies, equipment other than a rope</u> were going to try to pull that baby calf, as we were now at risk of losing the Momma. After a long struggle, we were able to pull the calf out of its Momma. One of the vet techs grabbed the baby by its hind hooves & began to swing it rapidly in a circle – trying to clear the babies air passages. Well, God is good! To everyone's surprise, baby was alive, but very weak. We were able to deliver the afterbirth, etc. Momma was very uncomfortable & not really wanting the baby to come too close & nurse! We were able to secure Momma's back legs so baby could nurse with one of use holding the baby up as he too weak to stand. Through the night, we took shifts every 2 hours to go & help the baby nurse to build up strength. We named the calf "Rabbit" because of his big ears! He was REALLY CUTE!

We later learned that this Momma heifer was a <u>Heifer International heifer</u> given to the village. The vital importance of this animal & her calf to the village was so real and tangible. Also learned that the village relied on Momma's milk for the village children! To be able to participate in such a way that helped prevent the losing either one of them was an experience of a lifetime and one that the makes me appreciate this important and vital ministry. **PRAISE GOD!**

PASTOR REUBEN'S BOOK REVIEWS:

BOOKS READ VACATION 2021

Words of Life by Adam Hamilton

What if the Ten Commandments were not just a set of ancient rules but also a guide to experiencing the good life today. Jesus saw these commandments not as burdens, a list of "thou shalt not's," but as guideposts to help us experience a good and beautiful life. This book examines the commandments in their historical context – considering the meaning of each commandment in Hebrew, unpacking how Jesus interpreted them, and showing how every "thou shalt not" was intended to point to a life giving "thou shalt."

Jesus the King by Timothy Keller

Keller unlocks new insights into the life of Jesus Christ as he explores how Jesus came as a king, but a king who had to bear the greatest burden anyone ever has. Keller shows how the story of Jesus is at once cosmic, historical and personal, calling each of us to look anew at our personal relationship with God. I found this book to be a commentary on the Gospel of Mark; the author walks you through Mark with insights into the events and teachings of Jesus. I will definitely use this book as a reference for future sermons from Mark.

Tempered Resilience by Tod Bolsinger

During my vacations, I like to read different types of books such as inspiration, Biblical teaching and leadership. For leadership, I chose *Tempered Resilience*; I had read the author's earlier book entitled *Canoeing the Mountains* in 2018. In *Tempered Resilience*, he explores the qualities of adaptive leadership in contexts ranging from churches to nonprofit organizations. He explains both the external challenges we face today and the internal resistance in all churches that hold us back. In this book, he uses the art of blacksmithing to describe how to promote change in a church or organization by showing how raw iron is shaped into something useful such as a knife or chisel.

The Prodigal God by Timothy Keller

Keller is an outstanding biblical teacher; I always gain new insights from his books. In this book he opens up new interpretations from the Parable of the Prodigal Son which he states may be called the Parable of Two Sons. Keller uses one of the best-known Christian parables to reveal the message of Christianity: grace, hope and salvation. The story tells us about two brothers, each of whom represents a different way to be alienated from God and a different way to seek acceptance into the kingdom of heaven. Keller notes that it is a mistake to think that Jesus tells this story primarily to assure the younger brother of His unconditional love. The targets of this story are not "wayward sinners" but religious people who do everything that the Bible requires; those who try to earn their salvation. The message of the Bible is that the human race is a band of exiles trying to come home. The Parable of the Prodigal Son is about every one of us.

20TH ANNIVERSARY OF 9/11

Billy Graham: 3 Lessons to Learn from 9/11

By **<u>Billy Graham</u>** • September 10, 2019 Three days after the United States was attacked on September 11, 2001, Billy Graham spoke words of peace and healing to a shocked nation at the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. His timeless remarks can speak to us today—19 years later—as a country that still has much to learn in this ever-changing world.

The following are three lessons from 9/11, based off Mr. Graham's speech:

1. We may not understand why tragedy occurs, but we must realize God did not create evil.

"I have been asked hundreds of times why God allows tragedy and suffering. I have to confess that I do not know the answer. I have to accept, by faith, that God is sovereign, and that He is a God of love and mercy and compassion in the midst of suffering.

"The Bible says God is not the Author of evil. In 1 Thessalonians 2:7 the Bible talks about the mystery of iniquity. The Old Testament Prophet Jeremiah said, 'The heart is deceitful above all things and beyond cure.'"

2. We need each other.

"What an example New York and Washington have been to the world these past few days! None of us will forget the pictures of our courageous firefighters and police, or the hundreds of people standing patiently in line to donate blood.

"A tragedy like this could have torn our country apart, but instead it has united us. So those perpetrators who took this on to tear us apart, it has worked the other way—it has backlashed. We are more united than ever before. I think this was exemplified in a very moving way when the members of our Congress stood shoulder to shoulder and sang, 'God Bless America.'"

3. There is hope beyond this world.

"Yes, there is hope. There is hope for the present because the stage, I believe, has already been set for a new spirit in our nation.

"We desperately need a spiritual renewal in this country, and God has told us in His Word time after time that we need to repent of our sins and return to Him, and He will bless us in a new way.

"There also is hope for the future because of God's promises. As a Christian, I have hope, not just for this life, but for heaven and the life to come. And many of those people who died this past week are in heaven now. And they wouldn't want to come back. It's so glorious and so wonderful. That is the hope for all of us who put our faith in God. I pray that you will have this hope in your heart.

"This event reminds us of the brevity and the uncertainty of life. We never know when we too will be called into eternity. I doubt if those people who got on those planes or who walked into the World Trade Center or the Pentagon on Tuesday thought that it would be the last day of their lives. And that's why we each must face our own spiritual need and commit ourselves to God and His will.
