REUBEN'S RAMBLINGS

Have you ever given the vision/mission statement of High Desert UMC that is printed on the front of the bulletin much thought: "Loving God, Serving Others, Changing Lives?" Does this accurately describe what we are trying to do here at High Desert? Remember how Jesus summarized all the shalls and shall nots of the Ten Commandments into two simple commands: "Love God and love your neighbor." Jesus also said in Mark 10:45 that He came to serve, not be served. He set the example for us. By loving God and serving others through our outreach programs we are changing lives, making a difference not only in our lives, but also in the lives of others here in Rio Rancho, Albuquerque, San Fidel, Gallup, New Mexico, and the world.

One of the best books that I have ever read on missions is entitled *The Hole in Our Gospel* by Richard Stearns. The concept behind this book is quite simple; it's basically that being a Christian requires more than a personal relationship with the Lord. It also entails a public relationship with the

world. If your personal relationship with Jesus Christ has no positive outward expression, then your faith has a hole in it. Someone once cut out every verse in the Bible that dealt with poverty, injustice, sickness, and oppression; it was full of holes.

It has been said that vision without action is merely a dream. Action without vision just passes the time. But a vision with action can change the world. In the Parable of the Sheep and Goats in Matthew 25:31-46, Jesus gives us a vision and challenges us to put His words and teachings into action. In this passage, the criterion that Jesus uses to separate the sheep from the goats is not that the sheep confessed faith in Jesus while the goats did not, but rather that the sheep had acted in tangible and loving ways towards the poor, the sick, the imprisoned, and the vulnerable, while the goats had not.

Following Jesus' command to love our neighbors, the sheep fed the hungry, gave the thirsty something to drink, invited the stranger in, provided clothing, took care of the sick, and visited those in prison. And this is the goal of our outreach programs with the Pantry, Feed New Mexico Kids, Women with Purpose, Interfaith Bible Center, Gallup Nazarene Church, St. Joseph Mission

School, Gift Basket Ministry,

MorningStar. In addition, we
are also reaching out through
our Second Mile Giving to
Heifer International, UMCOR,
Haven House, Faith Comes by

Gift Cards.

SEPTEMBER SECOND MILE GIVING:

HEIFER INTERNATIONAL

Our Second Mile Giving for September is Heifer International. Its mission is to work with communities to end world hunger and poverty and to care for the Earth. Heifer International was founded by Dan West, a farmer from the Midwest and a member of the Church of the Brethren, who went to the front lines of the Spanish Civil War as an aid worker. He found that giving refuges a cup of milk was not enough; what if they had a cow?

Thus, the Heifer Project adopted the philosophy of "teach a man to fish," by providing animals to families instead of handouts. The animals provide both food and reliable income, as agricultural products such as milk, eggs and honey can be traded or sold at the market. Families are empowered to turn hunger and poverty into hope and prosperity. Since 1944, Heifer International has provided livestock and environmentally sound agricultural training to improve the lives of those who struggle daily. They have been in ministry for 75 years providing animals to 20.7 million families in 125 countries. The goal of every Heifer Project is to help families achieve self-reliance.

Your contributions will be used to purchase animals. The current price is as follows: heifer - \$500; goat - \$120; sheep - \$120; rabbits- \$60 or flock of chicks - \$20. Due to your generous contributions, we were able to purchase 8 heifers, 10 flocks of chicken and 3 sheep last year. Thank you for your continued support to our mission program.

HEIFER INTERNATIONAL - LINN CARLSON'S UP CLOSE AND PERSONAL EXPERIENCE WITH



HEIFER: God's timing & putting the right people in the right place! In 2000, on my first mission trip I had an up close & hands on experience with a soon to be <u>Momma heifer in Nicaragua</u>! We were in Casa Blanca, Nicaragua building cinder block house in the aftermath of a hurricane & then aftermath floods.

After lunch one day, some panicked villagers came running to us indicating that a Momma heifer was in serious trouble trying to give birth to her calf.

Long story short — Momma had been out in the fields when she went into labor many hours earlier. They had gotten her back to the village, but she was in trouble & distressed. The only person in the village that knew how to handle this situation was not there that day. Two of the calf's hoofs had been visible for a long time & she was not able to deliver her baby. At that point, it was assumed that the calf was likely no longer alive & concern and efforts focused on saving the Momma. So, what did I know about pulling a calf? *Nothing* but God had placed the right people in the right place at the right time! My 2 roommates were veterinarian tech's & had grown up on ranches! I didn't have the knowledge or experience, but I had strength. With most of the village surrounding the pen & watching, the three of us, with no gloves, supplies, equipment other than a rope were going to try to pull that baby calf, as we were now at risk of losing the Momma. After a long struggle, we were able to pull the calf out of its Momma. One of the vet techs grabbed the baby by its hind hooves & began to swing it rapidly in a circle — trying to clear the babies air passages. Well, God is good! To everyone's surprise, baby was alive, but very weak.

We later learned that this Momma heifer was a <u>Heifer International heifer</u> given to the village. The vital importance of this animal & her calf to the village was so real & tangible -the village relied on Momma's milk for the village children! To be able to participate in such a way that helped prevent the losing either one of them was an experience of a lifetime and one that the makes me appreciate this important and vital ministry. **PRAISE GOD!**

Operation Christmas Child



It's time again to begin collecting and filling shoeboxes for Operations Christmas Child for Samaritan's Purse.

High Desert has participated in this mission project for several years, where members get a shoebox (any size will work) and fill it with toys, hygiene items, and school supplies. Then bring your shoebox to the church along with a donation of \$10 cash or check made out to HDUMC marked with "Operation Christmas Child" for shipping. All the shoeboxes must be turned in by Sunday November 17, 2024. They will be taken Grace Outreach Church the week of November 18, 2024. They will then be distributed to children in need around the world. There are empty shoeboxes available in the Narthex.

If you would like to pack your own shoebox: There are instructions on how to pack a shoebox on the back of the Shoebox Label which is out in the Narthex. In addition, bring a donation of \$10 for shipping. After all the shoeboxes have been turned in, a check for shipping will be issued to Samaritan's Purse and mailed to them. Then just mark on the label if it is for either a boy or girl and what age group, peel the label off and put it on top of the box.

A few requirements have changed this year:

- 1. Please don't include soap in your shoebox, some chemicals have been banned in some countries.
- 2. Put at least one rubber band around each shoebox, so it doesn't open during shipping.
- 3. Remove all packaging from items put in each shoebox. Some locations don't have a place to dispose of trash.
- 4. Shoeboxes can be wrapped in wrapping paper, just be sure and wrap the lid separately so that when they go to the regional processing center they can easily be opened for inspection.

If you would like for Patty Latter to shop for and pack your shoebox, please submit \$30 to the church and mark "Operation Christmas Child." The cost for each box this year is \$30 which includes \$20 for the contents inside the shoebox and \$10 for shipping. Of course, it is also possible for several members to share the cost of a shoebox.

Last year we collected 133 boxes. Our goal this year is 135 boxes. If you have any questions call or text Patty Latter @ 505-934-4346.

New Mexico Annual Conference 2024 Lay Report to High Desert United Methodist Church, Rio Rancho NM

Although Lisa's report appeared in last month's edition, it bears repeating, in excerpts here:

Summary:

...Bishop Schnase encouraged all of us to stay focused on mission rather than on divisive matters. He further reiterated that there is room in the UMC for progressives, centrists, and traditionalists alike. Kairos Brings God's Light into the Darkness of Prison

The prison environment is a dark place, where prisoners face violence, anger, gangs and loneliness daily.

Kairos Prison Ministry volunteers' step into this darkness to hold a 3 ½ day weekend, with the majority of participants made up primarily of negative leaders within the prison. Through talks, discussions and Chapel meditations **prisoners learn that they**



are worthy of God's love, light and grace. That no matter who they are or what they have done, God forgives them.

When a former negative or gang leader accepts Christ, it can influence the very atmosphere of a prison for the better. As the Kairos Christian community inside a prison grows and begins to gain influence, the incidence of violence often decreases.


