Our jump ropes are made with 4 strands of polyester, which is both durable and stretchy and *usually* readily available. According to Assistant Director Mary Cowley, before we closed for cleaning on 7/1 we had *zero* polyester on hand. When we returned on 7/22, through miraculous and large donations we had plenty and then some!

Mary says, "If you just pause and watch, you'll see miracles!"

We now have just shy of 800 jump ropes on hand and so far this year, we have given out 1,786.
